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MAYOR STRAUSS: Good evening, ladies and gentlemen, thank you for coming out this evening. We have three hearings we want to get through. Mr. Scalero, the floor is yours.

MR. SCALERO: Legal notice, public hearing, Incorporated Village of Mineola.

Please take notice that the Board of Trustees of the Incorporated Village of Mineola will hold a Public Hearing on Wednesday, February 19, 2020 at 6:30 p.m. at the Village Hall, 155 Washington Avenue, Mineola, New York, 11501, or at some other location to be hereafter designated by the Board of Trustees, in order to receive public comment upon the following:

Application of Alexander Joly Peres DaSilva for a special use permit pursuant to Chapter 550 of the Code of the Incorporated Village of Mineola, entitled Zoning, Section 550-12 entitled B-1 Districts, Subsection (B) entitled Special Uses and Section 550-13 entitled B-2 Districts, Subsection (A)(1) to establish a take-out food and drink establishment upon the property known as 135 Mineola Boulevard, Mineola, New York, known and designated on the Nassau County land and tax map as Section 9 Block 414, Lots 2, 314 and 316.

The Village of Mineola does not discriminate

MR. ABBATE: Members of the board, for the

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P.C. I'm an attorney with offices at 88 Sunnyside

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Boulevard in Plainview. As out court reporter Kelly

will tell you, I do not speak slowly, so I will try to temper my presentation as I deliver it to you this evening.

MAYOR STRAUSS: What was your name, sir? You already spoke so fast I missed it.

TRUSTEE WALSH: I'm a little hard of hearing.

MR. ABBATE: I don't have a problem being soft. My name is Tom Abbate, A B B A T E.

This is an application for a take-out food shop at 135 Mineola Boulevard. This is the site where I last appeared before this board to establish an interval training gym facility known as Fit Body Boot Camp, and you graciously approved that application, and it's operating quite successfully today.

The building in which it's located is a long, narrow structure. It's only 22 feet across but it runs to a depth of approximately 200 feet. It's a two story structure. Second floor is occupied by offices, and the Mineola Boulevard frontage is occupied by Fit Body Boot Camp to the tune of about 2,250, 2,500 square feet. There is vacant space in the rear and it's that rear space which is the substance of our application tonight. Enter Mr. DaSilva.

This is my client Alex DaSilva here to my right, and he seeks to take plus or minus 400 square

feet of that rear space and establish a food shop, Mr. Mayor and members of the Board of Trustees for pickup and delivery only.

From a legal perspective, premises is located in the B-2 zone, and we all know under Section 550-13 (A)(1) it incorporates B-1 uses by reference, and in the B-1 you can have a carryout food establishment, that's the term we use, as a special permit, meaning it's deemed to be in harmony with the zone subject to the imprimatur of this board.

The initial question, not from a legal perspective but from a practical perspective, is how will a store in the rear of this long, narrow building survive? And that is the beauty of this application. We're all familiar with this site. When we were all here for this Fit Body Boot Camp, we had an open parking lot, municipal lot, owned by the Village. Now we have the Harrison garage under construction so there is ample parking, and it plays into Mr. DaSilva's hands.

His shop will be truly a carryout food shop, and when I say that we are not proposing to have a single seat within the premises; there will not even be a stool.

The food which is to be prepared is Brazilian

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cuisine, and it mainly revolves around an item known as coxinha. I'm a land use lawyer, I'm not a chef, so I think you deserve to know what it is and I'm not the appropriate person, so I would like to call Mr. DaSilva and have him explain that to you.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Sure.

MR. ABBATE: Give your name and address for the record.

MR. DaSILVA: Hi, this is Alexander Joly Peres DaSilva, A L E X A N D E R J O L Y P E R E S D A S I L V A.

MR. ABBATE: Mr. DaSilva, I just said the magic word, coxinha. Could you tell Mayor Strauss and the trustees what that is?

MR. DaSILVA: The best way to explain a coxinha is sort of like a rice ball or potato croquette. It's a deep fried dough with a filling and the filling can be different types. It can be ground beef, chicken, cream cheese or spinach, for example. The primary one that I'm trying to make is a buffalo chicken dip recipe, which I think would be very delicious and sell.

MR. ABBATE: This is truly quick food; isn't that correct?

MR. DaSILVA: Yeah. It's more, you know, for

parties and caterings. They're bite size and you sell in volume or high quantities.

MR. ABBATE: Mr. DaSilva has photographs over a series of five pages, which I will offer up as one exhibit.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Give them to Mr. Scalero, thank you.

MR. ABBATE: We augment this by other traditional Brazilian fare as your business grows, rice and beans, perhaps, fried yucca?

You have to answer audibly so the court stenographer can hear you.

MR. DaSILVA: That's correct.

MR. ABBATE: Let's talk about the nitty-gritty, the things the Village will be concerned about. What will your hours of operation be? How many days a week will you operate?

MR. DaSILVA: The plan is to open seven days a week from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m.

MR. ABBATE: So lunch and dinner?

MR. DaSILVA: Correct.

MR. ABBATE: So is what I told the trustees accurate that you will not be having any sit-down consumption on premises?

MR. DaSILVA: No, this is going to be a

the proposed name of your enterprise?

MR. DaSILVA: It's after my daughter's name, it's called Adrianna's Kitchen. She wants to be a chef.

MAYOR STRAUSS: How old is she?

MR. DaSILVA: Eleven.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Excellent.

MR. ABBATE: Thank you, Mr. DaSilva. I have no further questions, unless the board wishes to inquire.

MAYOR STRAUSS: I do, I have a couple. Stay there, Mr. DaSilva, if you could.

You're only going to be cooking these rice balls, that's the only thing you're going to be making?

MR. DaSILVA: Chicken balls, let's call them.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Okay. Explain, make sure I have this right, just so I understand it. They're either going to be rice balls with different insides?

MR. DaSILVA: So it's a flour dough with different insides -- chicken, beef, sausage, and then it's breaded and deep fried.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Okay. All right, and what about beverages, are you going to sell beverages, sodas, Gatorade, water?

MR. DaSILVA: Just perhaps compliment.

MAYOR STRAUSS: And no alcohol?

MR. DaSILVA: No.

MAYOR STRAUSS: And I know the other trustees have some questions, so I'll let them ask.

Trustee Cusato.

TRUSTEE CUSATO: Good evening, sir.

MR. DaSILVA: Hi.

TRUSTEE CUSATO: So if I want a ham and cheese sandwich on a roll with mustard, I cannot get that in your place?

MR. DaSILVA: That's not the plan.

TRUSTEE CUSATO: So if I park on Mineola Boulevard, I've got to walk all the way around to get to your place?

MR. ABBATE: Well, that would be one option or you can park in the Harrison Street garage.

TRUSTEE CUSATO: Yes, you're right.

MR. ABBATE: And, moreover, while there's no parking on First Street, there is parking on Harrison, at least as to the south side, and there's metered parking on Mineola Boulevard.

TRUSTEE CUSATO: So right now I'm going around First Street, and I have to go up through Franwin's parking lot, right, and I see the Eleanor Rigby's door, and I see a door marked 216. Is that your door? Where

is your building? I'm trying to find out where you're going to be located?

MR. ABBATE: So you know the former Eleanor Rigby's, which has now been gutted?

TRUSTEE CUSATO: Yeah.

MR. ABBATE: We're immediately abutting that to the north, so we're in between Kucks Deli and the former Eleanor Rigby's, a long bowling alley building by Fit Body Boot Camp.

TRUSTEE CUSATO: So Eleanor Rigby's and the former backyard of Eleanor Rigby's, and then right behind that is going to be your building?

MAYOR STRAUSS: That's right.

MR. ABBATE: Right, we're going in an existing building. We're not expanding the footprint of what's existing. No construction is to take place except on the interior.

TRUSTEE CUSATO: So I would need to call and say I'm going to order whatever-whatever and I would park and pick it up, and that would be it, right, between the hours of, you said, 10 and 10?

MR. ABBATE: Yes.

MR. DaSILVA: Yes, that's the idea.

TRUSTEE CUSATO: So okay. Thank you.

MR. ABBATE: Thank you. Any other questions?

MAYOR STRAUSS: Trustee Durham?

TRUSTEE DURHAM: Thank you.

I think he was trying to talk about the back of the building. So with the parking garage, there's a -- from Franwin's parking lot there's a driveway so is it going down that driveway to access from the back of the building, or is it only accessible from Mineola Boulevard?

MR. ABBATE: No, it would be accessible from If you look at the survey that we submitted as part of our application, you'll see that there's a dedicated easement in the rear. So, yes, you would utilize that easement to access Adrianna's Kitchen.

TRUSTEE DURHAM: And there's like a little small area where like three or four cars can fit and then the door?

MR. ABBATE: And then the door.

TRUSTEE DURHAM: Yeah, so where that little driveway is between the fence and the parking garage is the access point?

MR. ABBATE: That's correct.

That's correct, right?

MR. DaSILVA: That's correct.

TRUSTEE DURHAM: So your signage would go there?

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MR. ABBATE: It would go on the facade of the 1 building, yes. 2 3 TRUSTEE DURHAM: It would go on the facade of the building? 4 MR. ABBATE: Right. And we're not looking for 5 any sign relief. It will comport with all of the specs 6 7 of the Village code. 8 TRUSTEE DURHAM: Even though the building is 9 listed as 135, the access would be off First Street, 10 not Mineola Boulevard, so you wouldn't be walking off Mineola Boulevard to go into this establishment? 11 MR. ABBATE: You physically could not go 12 13 through the Mineola Boulevard frontage to get to 14 Adrianna's Kitchen; you would have to enter and exit 15 through the rear. TRUSTEE DURHAM: That's the famous 216 First 16 Street address? 17 18 MR. ABBATE: Correct. TRUSTEE DURHAM: But it is the 135 building? 19 20 MR. ABBATE: Correct. 21 TRUSTEE DURHAM: Okay. Cooking, it's all deep 22 fried? 23 MR. ABBATE: Answer audibly for the 24 stenographer. 25 MR. DaSILVA: Yes, it is.

TRUSTEE DURHAM: So your kitchen then, you have to set up --

MR. DaSILVA: I think there was some submitted plans as well, and it shows two deep fryers.

TRUSTEE DURHAM: Yes, so it's all --

MR. DaSILVA: There are three machines, also, that actually make the dough, makes the inside, and then there's another machine that forms the two together and puts the inside inside the dough and wraps it, and then there's a third machine that breads it, and then it goes into the deep fryer.

MR. ABBATE: And the kitchen is it outfitted as demonstrated on the plan with one handicap accessible bathroom.

TRUSTEE DURHAM: Main design is catering for parties, large quantities?

MR. ABBATE: That's the primary goal.

TRUSTEE DURHAM: Thank you, that's all.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Trustee Walsh.

TRUSTEE WALSH: Thank you, Mayor. Hello Mr. DaSilva, how are you?

MR. DaSILVA: Hello. Good.

TRUSTEE WALSH: Also, the attorney.

Let me start off, Mr. DaSilva, so you are going to be the person who picks up the materials and

DaSILVA: We haven't discussed that yet. 7 MR. ABBATE: The execution of the lease is 8 contingent upon the successful application this 9 evening. 10 TRUSTEE WALSH: In other words, he's going to be using a van to bring the material there, and then 11 the van will stay outside, it's going to stay in one of 12 13 those four spaces; is that correct? 14 MR. ABBATE: There or in the garage or in the 15 metered parking. 16 TRUSTEE WALSH: Part of your lease, do you 17 have any parking as part of your lease? 18 MR. ABBATE: I don't think the lease has been 19 executed yet. 20 MR. DaSILVA: It's contingent upon your 21 approval. 22 TRUSTEE WALSH: Are you looking to have any of 23 those spaces as part of your lease? 24 MR. DaSILVA: It would be convenient if we 25 did.

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TRUSTEE WALSH: Okay. Now, putrescible waste is not picked up by the Village of Mineola. We would pick up your normal garbage, but the putrescible waste/food waste, how are you planning on getting rid of that?

MR. DaSILVA: I would dispose of it as required by the Village.

TRUSTEE WALSH: So you would get a private company?

MR. DaSILVA: Either have them pick it up or me drop it off.

TRUSTEE WALSH: What percentage of this 400 square feet is going to be kitchen and what percentage is going to be used for customers that come in?

MR. ABBATE: Well, if you look at the plan, you could see that the bulk of it is kitchen. There's just a very small counter area. Maybe you could point this out.

MR. DaSILVA: I would said maybe 15 percent if you look at the plan.

TRUSTEE WALSH: I know that, but just so the majority of it is kitchen; is that right?

MR. DaSILVA: That's correct.

TRUSTEE WALSH: In that you're cooking with oil; is there going to be any special filters that are

needed for smoke, and have you looked into that at all?
That would be a Buildings Department issue.

MR. DaSILVA: Everything will be built to code if the permit is approved tonight.

TRUSTEE WALSH: It would have to be to code with the fire marshal and everything, but have you looked into that? Are you planning to have a special filter system like Churrsqueira Bairrada or some of the other places?

MR. DaSILVA: I'm getting whatever is required to operate the facility.

TRUSTEE WALSH: That's a good answer.

Are you planning on doing large wholesale selling like establishment we will pick up 500 of these a day and, if so, how are they going to get in and out of picking up their stuff?

MR. DaSILVA: It would be delivery only.

TRUSTEE WALSH: So large things would be delivered using the van you spoke about?

MR. DaSILVA: Yes.

TRUSTEE WALSH: And that van then is going to have to be close by, so you don't really have a space to put this van yet; is that correct?

MR. ABBATE: Well, we don't have the lease executed, if that's your question, that's correct. We

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MR. GIBBONS: Is there a proposed lease? MR. ABBATE: I'm not handling the leasing. Is there a proposed lease?

MR. DaSILVA: Everything is contingent upon

MR. GIBBONS: I know it's contingent, but have you looked at the proposed lease?

MR. DaSILVA: We have just discussed verbally.

MR. ABBATE: If this board were to impose any conditions that would require insertion into the lease necessarily, that would be part of our negotiation

TRUSTEE WALSH: Yeah, but you see we're here tonight for a hearing, you know, and the hearing is supposed to encompass everything you're going to do. So you have a concept here, but you don't even have a proposed lease other than you just had a conversation with Mr. Camill or whoever owns the building; is that

MR. ABBATE: Mr. Frame, correct, is the

TRUSTEE WALSH: Correct. I didn't have his name.

MR. ABBATE: Matty Frame.

So what I'm suggesting is that if you were to say to Mr. DaSilva that we grant the application upon the condition that you have one reserved parking space immediately abutting the premises in the rear, that is precisely what we would go back to Mr. Frame with.

TRUSTEE WALSH: And does he own, the person who owns the building, I'll leave his name out of it, does he have those four parking spaces, is that part of his property?

MR. ABBATE: Yes.

TRUSTEE WALSH: Okay, for right now, that's all the questions I have. Thank you.

TRUSTEE CUSATO: You order, you pick up and then you go home, that's the concept here?

MR. ABBATE: Correct, or have it delivered.
TRUSTEE CUSATO: Okay.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Can you come in off the street and order one or two or you have to order it in bulk?

MR. ABBATE: You can come off the street. I can pop in after court and get some coxinha for lunch.

TRUSTEE WALSH: I may have another question.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Go ahead, sir.

TRUSTEE WALSH: Is this more -- we had it once with a gelato place, is this more of a manufacturing place, is that what it is? In other words, you're

going to be manufacturing stuff, and you're going to be taking it and selling it to other places?

MR. DaSILVA: Yes.

TRUSTEE WALSH: So what percentage of your customer base is going to be people walking in and getting five of them, and what percentage of them is going to be your manufacturing in this place and delivering to Kennedy airport or wherever you're delivering?

MR. DaSILVA: Actually, I have no idea, but I would say 75/25.

TRUSTEE WALSH: So 75 percent is a manufacturing, not a restaurant? This is more of a warehouse?

MR. DaSILVA: It is a commercial kitchen.

TRUSTEE WALSH: It is more of a commercial kitchen?

MR. DaSILVA: A place where you can manufacture and handle food.

TRUSTEE WALSH: How much stuff a day do you think you can put out of this 400 square feet without any kind of special filters for smoke and oil? How many fryers are you going to have, for example?

MR. DaSILVA: We have drawn out two fryers.

TRUSTEE WALSH: So basically this is much

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less -- this is more retail --

MR. DaSILVA: Very small-scale operation.

TRUSTEE WALSH: -- than retail?

MR. DaSILVA: At least to start off with, it's going to be very small.

MR. ABBATE: Our output is obviously limited by the size of the kitchen. We're only talking twelve -- 400 square feet of space.

TRUSTEE WALSH: If you're there twelve hours a day, you can make a lot of stuff. Are you looking to make hundreds of pieces -- you must have customers lined up if you're going to go into business? No, you do not?

MR. DaSILVA: I have one customer with a catering hall, possibly.

TRUSTEE WALSH: Okay, I'll leave it at that and let others ask questions.

TRUSTEE CUSATO: Across the street, Winthrop Hospital, are you willing to -- can you handle -- if they want to order, can you handle those doctors, nurses, can you do that or not?

MR. DaSILVA: I would hope so, yeah.

TRUSTEE CUSATO: Thank you.

TRUSTEE DURHAM: Can I?

MAYOR STRAUSS: Yes, sir.

TRUSTEE DURHAM: One more question. How are you packaging it for delivery? And I do not see an area to set up for packaging on your counter space, so what's your plan for packaging? How are you packaging the product for delivery? Is it in catering trays?

MR. DaSILVA: There are many options. We have cups, we have pizza boxes.

MR. ABBATE: I'll offer up two photographs.

This shows the individual containers. Two photographs, one exhibit, but I think the question is more directed so if you have an order of, say, 25 coxinha, how is that going to go out? Is it going out in a box, a container?

MR. DaSILVA: It is going to go out in box. TRUSTEE DURHAM: Thank you.

TRUSTEE WALSH: Because, you know, I see your price range here, I don't know prices, but when I look at something like this, I would think it would cost two or three dollars apiece, but on your price list, you have \$27 to \$85, so you're talking about a large range --

MR. ABBATE: That's not our price list. Those were just representative packaging that Mr. DaSilva downloaded from the internet.

TRUSTEE WALSH: I understand that, but what

you're representing is you can get X amount for \$85.
You can get X amount --

MR. ABBATE: Those are not our prices.

TRUSTEE WALSH: That's what you gave me.

MR. ABBATE: That was just to show you our containers.

TRUSTEE WALSH: What the product looks like?

MR. ABBATE: What the product looks like. He downloaded that from the internet. That comes from some other store.

TRUSTEE WALSH: I just get the impression that this is going to be a kitchen that manufacturers food to send it to other places, and that's a big part of it, right?

MR. ABBATE: Yeah, that's a part of our operation in 400 square feet.

TRUSTEE WALSH: Now, if people come, if you have big volume of stuff, you're not going to be delivering it, because you will be cooking it, so people have to come with trucks and such and pick up; they're going to have to drive where those four parking spaces are and go in there and pick stuff up?

MR. ABBATE: It is the same situation if you go to a pizzeria.

TRUSTEE WALSH: No, no, I'm just asking, is

that the premise?

MR. ABBATE: People will come park legally and pick up their order.

TRUSTEE WALSH: If you go to a pizzeria, you park, get a pie or get a slice, and this, to me, I could be wrong, sounds like somebody who is going to pick a couple of hundred of them up, they're going to need vehicles. You hope a couple hundred.

MR. DaSILVA: You can fit a hundred of them in a smaller box than a pizza even if they're picking up a thousand.

TRUSTEE WALSH: That's all for now. Thank you.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Mr. DaSilva, have you ever run a business like this before?

MR. DaSILVA: Not a food establishment, no.

MAYOR STRAUSS: What do you mean not for this establishment?

MR. DaSILVA: Not food.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Okay. So what made you get into this other than your eleven-year-old daughter wants to be a chef?

MR. DaSILVA: I'm Brazilian. I know this product is being sold around the neighborhood already. I really enjoy the product myself. I make it at home.

I actually purchased it illegally from people making it at home. So I just want to do something legal and proper, and I know it's a good product.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Okay.

MR. ABBATE: You are not allowed, as Mr. DaSilva educated me, to prepare this at home and then sell it for commercial purposes.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Of course.

MR. DaSILVA: Well, the first idea was a food truck, but then after reading the requirements, it says that you need a legal commercial establishment, a kitchen.

MAYOR STRAUSS: To make it.

MR. DaSILVA: Yeah, the Department of Agriculture approval and Building Department, obviously.

MAYOR STRAUSS: So you're doing everything without food trucks, which is a lot better and a lot easier on you.

MR. ABBATE: That's correct.

Folks, again, this will be the format this evening at the hearing. We request the applicant come up to the podium, state your name, affiliation and explain your business and speak clear and slowly for the reporter.

MS. PIETROFORTE: Diane Pietroforte. Actually, I own Sobol of New Hyde Park right now. We're doing very well and, as a matter of fact, prior to picking New Hyde Park, we really wanted Mineola, but it was very hard to find a spot, so as we were about two and a half years in we really love it. We're doing a very nice business. We have a nice community over there, so we wanted to start one in Mineola. So we are doing well enough in that the franchise was very grateful that we were looking to open another one and we finally found a spot in Mineola that we thought would be perfect. It looks like a lot like our other store, so we know exactly how to maneuver through that kind of space, and it's pretty much the same exact footprint that we have at the other store, so we just want to kind of bring it to the community.

We always said that we love the nurses, we love our nurses and doctors that we have coming over to our store, the court people, and it's just a nice --

something different to eat for those long days.

The parking situation over there is actually to our favor, if you will, because our nurses or our court person they might not be able to move their car. Once they're in that parking lot, they tend to want to stay, so a place they can walk, eat, take a couple of minutes and then get back to their lives.

There's a train station, same sort of thing where, you know, the parking is really in our favor over there, I think. And we take care of a lot of the high school kids. They love to gather there and hang out, just kind of --

Our hours of operation are 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. so it's nice and early. There's no real hanging out like into the evening. By 8 p.m. we're all done. We're pretty much closed -- we have our closing shift done by eight. Very simple, no kitchen, blenders, pretty much, freezers. Blenders, freezers, refrigerators, fruit. Fruit, fruit, fruit, a lot of fruit. That's pretty much the basis.

I gave you guys menus. If you're not familiar with acai, it is an item from Brazil that we freeze into sort of a parfait, granola, fresh fruit, you know, we work around the allergies with the kids and we employ a bunch -- probably about 17 to 23 is the

perfect age for us, and we have ten, twelve at a time, and they're great kids. We rely on them as much as they rely on us. And it's going very well, so we figured if we can do it over in the other town too. Same kind of community base feeling in those two towns, in our opinion.

So that's our game plan.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Great. For your benefit and for anybody that's kind of listening to this at home, we televise these meetings, so explain your business a little bit more. What is it? You're making smoothies?

MS. PIETROFORTE: Pretty much smoothies. Acai is becoming more popular now, I have to say, if anybody has had a Sobol. We really dedicate ourselves to the quality of it. They -- people do it in delis and Costco and stuff, but it's a bit of a skill because of the frozen acai. It's the temperature. It's neither a refrigerator nor freezer, so the whole game is to keep it fresh, keep it smooth, and then the fresh fruit on top. It's basically a parfait.

We sell them 7 a.m. We're there every day 7 a.m., and we sell them to people going to work, a lot of nurses come over by us, teachers, that sort of thing. You can put one of the homemade butters on top, almond butter, peanut butter, and it gives it a little

more of a lunch or a meal replacement instead of a pizza all the time or a hero, whatever, whatever you normally eat, and it's very refreshing, and it's one of those things, after you eat, you're not tired. It gives you more energy than before you ate which normally when you eat a lunch, it's probably going to drag you down, so basically people -- and you can customize it to allergies and preferences. We have a bunch of different fruits aside from what it comes with -- banana, strawberry, blueberry, cocoanut, and honey. You can put cocoanut mango, hemp seed and chia. It's basically healthy.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Basically all the fruit stuff?
MS. PIETROFORTE: Fruit and butters.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Seven to 8 p.m. seven days a week?

MS. PIETROFORTE: That's seven days a week we do that, so we don't confuse the customer, and it's seven days a week 7 to 8 p.m.

MAYOR STRAUSS: How many staff do you anticipate working there?

MS. PIETROFORTE: We usually keep around twelve. In the summer we go a little more. You have more kids on the shift mostly.

MAYOR STRAUSS: It doesn't look like you're

going to have any room for parties in there? You're
not going to have kids' parties?

MS. PIETROFORTE: No.
MAYOR STRAUSS: Trustee Cusato?

morning I went on Google to find out what these people are all about, and I realized they had a place on Jericho Turnpike in New Hyde Park, so I went there to find out what you're all about, and you know what, the seating, the tables, are going to be somewhat typical of what's happening in Mineola. So I walked in with nothing and I walked out and I paid for it. Their AB smoothie is absolutely great and you know what --

MS. PIETROFORTE: Acai berry made with almond milk.

TRUSTEE CUSATO: And I was there this morning, so I think you're going to be a great asset to our community, so best of luck.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Trustee Durham?

TRUSTEE DURHAM: Thank you. When you said ten to twelve employees, that's all at the same time --

MS. PIETROFORTE: No.

TRUSTEE DURHAM: -- or spread out?

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MS. PIETROFORTE: That would be my payroll.

TRUSTEE DURHAM: The question is how many
people working in the store at a time?

MS. PIETROFORTE: At a time?

TRUSTEE DURHAM: At a time.

MS. PIETROFORTE: It takes about two in the morning, three -- from about 10:30 to 3:30. I'm going to assume the second store, right, will be four in that spot. Four people, and then night shift three, and then maybe two on a closing shift.

TRUSTEE DURHAM: So four employees is the most during --

MS. PIETROFORTE: Yeah, it's blenders and, like, bowls.

TRUSTEE DURHAM: Do you have any spot for employees to park with your lot or with the lease?

MS. PIETROFORTE: They will probably just use the lot, I would think, right?

TRUSTEE DURHAM: Your employees, is there parking behind the building?

MS. PIETROFORTE: No. I mean, I would assume -- when I work, I would probably park and walk.

TRUSTEE DURHAM: The making of the smoothies and the fruit, the fruit is all stored in freezers or is it fresh deliveries how often?

MS. PIETROFORTE: It's freezers and there's deliveries daily except for one day a week. And it's stored -- the acai is stored frozen and then the bananas, strawberries, blueberries fresh daily.

TRUSTEE DURHAM: They deliver it daily in the morning?

MS. PIETROFORTE: Yes, about three cases of bananas, four cases of strawberries. It's like a hand truck, about that big. [Indicating.]

TRUSTEE DURHAM: From your design where is it going into the building, from the back or from the front? Where is the truck that's delivering this parking?

MS. PIETROFORTE: Probably will go in the front. Probably with the truck on Harrison. Takes about five minutes.

TRUSTEE DURHAM: Is it a van, a box truck?

MS. PIETROFORTE: It's a truck.

TRUSTEE DURHAM: Box truck?

MS. PIETROFORTE: Box truck.

MAYOR STRAUSS: What were the times, I apologize, for deliveries?

MS. PIETROFORTE: The delivery comes about 10:30, 11.

MAYOR STRAUSS: In the morning?

MS. PIETROFORTE: Um-hum.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Sorry.

TRUSTEE DURHAM: That's okay.

So just running through the day, your openers come in, and just go through the business for the day, what your openers are doing.

MS. PIETROFORTE: It really doesn't take very much. It's the acai is done in a bucket. I guess it would be akin to like an ice cream sort of -- it's fruit, but it's sort of assembly, so there's really not a lot of preparation. Everything is stored at a temperature between freezer -- we have acai freezers, they're called, they're on that map there, that are held at that temperature. So everything is pretty much done. You put on a pot of coffee in the morning.

And what do we do in the morning? I don't know, have a banana -- cut bananas.

TRUSTEE DURHAM: The smoothies are made individually. It's not like 7-Eleven slushy machine?

MS. PIETROFORTE: No. We make them. People order them and we make them, so that's all day.

TRUSTEE DURHAM: So they're not in a blender all day?

MS. PIETROFORTE: It's a blender.

TRUSTEE DURHAM: It's a blender?

MS. PIETROFORTE: Like a blender makes it. 1 MAYOR STRAUSS: Trustee Walsh? 2 3 TRUSTEE WALSH: Thank you for coming out 4 tonight. This is a franchise, I take it? 5 MS. PIETROFORTE: Right. 6 TRUSTEE WALSH: It's all franchises. 7 Will you be cooking at all, anything that 8 needs to be heated? Nothing. So Carlos Gracie father developed a new way to fight, more faster, stronger and more effective and then he named it after Brazilian jiu jitsu that's why it's known worldwide now as one of the most effective ways and most effective fighters in the U.S. today than mixed martial arts program. All of them come from Brazil.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you. So you've been in the business -- you've been doing jiu jitsu for eleven years?

MR. LUTES: Yes.

MAYOR STRAUSS: And you've had a business like this before?

MR. LUTES: No, I never own a business, but I've been teaching for the past eight years.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Okay, great. In somebody else's studio, obviously?

MR. LUTES: Yes. I was living in Europe for three years, and then I moved back to New York and teaching for five years.

MS. SANTANDREU LUTES: I worked at UFC for four years, so we know.

MAYOR STRAUSS: What did you do there?

MS. SANTANDREU LUTES: I did --

MAYOR STRAUSS: Fighter?

MS. SANTANDREU LUTES: Yeah. I worked with the children, actually, in the kids' programs.

MAYOR STRAUSS: That's great.

How many staff will you have on hand working there?

MR. LUTES: We planning to have four people in the opening. It's going to be consist of me, Alicia and two other assistants.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Okay, great, and you're going into almost a brand-new building --

MR. LUTES: Yes.

MAYOR STRAUSS: -- just renovated.

MS. SANTANDREU LUTES: It's beautiful.

MAYOR STRAUSS: It's a beautiful building.

And so parking shouldn't be an issue. You have that whole side.

MR. LUTES: We have sixteen parking lots.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Parking spaces.

MR. LUTES: Parking spaces, sorry.

On the lease contract, we have six of them, but upon agreed, that while the other stores are not leased yet, we're going to be able to use all of those parking spaces.

MAYOR STRAUSS: And you have Jericho Turnpike.

MR. LUTES: Exactly, we have Jericho Turnpike

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with the metered parking space and also have right across the street and both sides of Jericho Turnpike. I think that's going to be more than enough parking space.

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MAYOR STRAUSS: When you say you're going to have group and private classes, how many are in a group traditionally?

MR. LUTES: So usually for the kids' class we expect a group of ten to fifteen people, and we going to use the -- Alicia, she is a licensed teacher, so she is very familiar with the code of the State of New York and about how many instructors and how many assistants we need for that class, so as the class grows, it's going to be required to hire more qualified people, and the adults' group class is going to be around twenty to twenty-five people.

MAYOR STRAUSS: And you said they can also have private classes?

MR. LUTES: Exactly, the private classes is usually one on one or two peoples and that's separate from the whole schedule. It has to be fitting while any of those other classes are going to be operating.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you. Trustee Cusato? TRUSTEE CUSATO: Thank you, Mayor, you stole two of my questions, so I have no problem with your

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request.

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MR. LUTES: Thank you.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Trustee Durham?

TRUSTEE DURHAM: I have no issues. I think it's good use for the building.

MR. LUTES: Thank you.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Trustee Walsh?

TRUSTEE WALSH: How are you today?

MR. LUTES: Good.

TRUSTEE WALSH: Looking into the audience before when I saw several more people here then than now, I knew you were going to be the physical fitness guy as well.

MR. LUTES: Thank you.

TRUSTEE WALSH: So are you Brazilian?

MR. LUTES: Yes. It's actually funny --

TRUSTEE WALSH: So Carlos Gracie is Royce's Gracie's father, is that correct, or brother?

MR. LUTES: Yes, he is. Carlos Gracie is Helio Gracie brother. Helio Gracie is father of Royce. So he was the first jiu jitsu, first winner of the UFC, so the Gracie family created the UFC because around the 1990s America whole program over so many different fighters and everybody claiming to be the most effective way to fight. So the Gracie family moved to

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America and they create the UFC, and they started inviting people to fight to see which martial arts would be more effective and Brazilian jiu jitsu is the first advance was the winner.

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TRUSTEE WALSH: You know I've been watching UFC since the beginning, and in the beginning these Brazilian jiu jitsu mostly out of the Gracie camp wore gis and the others didn't, and there was big submissions ending the fights and, you know, it's they're one of the better trained fighters in all.

I just want to ask can you tell me your name, Because only you can go -- only because you please? didn't get any time to speak. What is your name?

MS. SANTANDREU LUTES: Alicia.

TRUSTEE WALSH: And you are also going to be one of the trainers?

MS. SANTANDREU LUTES: Yes. I'm going to work right until I'm level up in my belt, I'm just going to work with the children.

TRUSTEE WALSH: Are you going to be training any kind of children's classes or are you entertaining adult classes or children classes?

MS. SANTANDREU LUTES: Children only for me.

TRUSTEE WALSH: The largest percentage of your business is going to be adults?

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MS. SANTANDREU LUTES: We want to try to -- I mean, the goal is that we do build a solid adult and children's program, but my personal goal is to have a really solid children's program. MS. SANTANDREU LUTES: With fun, of course.

TRUSTEE WALSH: Yeah, with fun, discipline and respectful.

MS. SANTANDREU LUTES: Yes

TRUSTEE WALSH: I've seen that. And I'm very familiar with the building. I'm glad something is going to go in there. It looks terrific as compared to -- this is on Public Access Television, so people may be familiar with the old Midas place.

MS. SANTANDREU LUTES: Yes

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TRUSTEE WALSH: How many of the parking spaces are yours? Can you use any? Because there are several stores going to open up there.

MS. SANTANDREU LUTES: So we have six, but as long as the other two spots are not rented, the other stores because there are three, then we can have all of them.

TRUSTEE WALSH: So you have at least six out of sixteen?

MS. SANTANDREU LUTES: At least, but for now we technically have all of them.

TRUSTEE WALSH: Yeah, because nothing else is in there.

MS. SANTANDREU LUTES: Yes.

MR. LUTES: There's one thing you want to do.

TRUSTEE WALSH: I just had a hip replacement. You're not going to see me.

MR. LUTES: One thing, everybody familiar with

MR. LUTES: Exactly, no.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you. Any other

Folks, come on back up. So you have a

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question about what's the flooring going to consist of?

MR. LUTES: So about the mats, we're going to use one of the best companies we have supplying any martial arts mats in the world today called Zebra Mats and we choose the luxury mat style, that's a chewing stick Zebra mat jiu jitsu specialized for jiu jitsu, so that mat is very soft and it's proper to falls -- break falls forward, falls or any kind of breakdown. Also the underlayer 0.5 inch thick to absorb the impact, so we're going to have the concrete, the underlayer and the mat absorbing completely any, what I can say, any risk of injuries or any falls or takedowns.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Great, thank you.

MS. SANTANDREU LUTES: It's very soft.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Excellent. Any other questions from the board?

TRUSTEE WALSH: No.
