MS. PARDO: Ladies and gentlemen, please silence all pagers and cell phones. In the event of an emergency there are exits located in the rear of the room.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Good evening. We are having a hearing tonight and we'll start off with Ms. Pardo. Our Village Clerk was unable to be here tonight. So we have our Deputy Village Clerk filling in.

Have at it.

MS. PARDO: "Legal Notice, Public Hearing, Incorporated Village of Mineola.

"Please take Notice that the Board of Trustees of the Incorporated Village of Mineola will hold a Public Hearing on Wednesday, September 13, 2017 at 6:30 p.m. at the Village Hall, 155 Washington Avenue, Mineola, New York 11501, or at some other location to be hereafter designated by the Board of Trustees, in order to receive public comment upon the following:

"Application of Elmer A. Argueta for a Special Use Permit pursuant to Chapter 550 of the Code of the Incorporated Village of Mineola, entitled 'Zoning', Section 550.12, entitled 'B-1 Districts', Subsection (B), entitled 'Special Uses', to establish a retail food and drink (grocery) store upon the property known as 90-12 Jericho Turnpike, Mineola, New York, known and designated

1	on the Nassau County Land and Tax Map as Section 9, Block
2	336, Lot 418."
3	"The Village of Mineola does not discriminate
4	on the basis of handicapped status in administration or
5	access to or employment in its projects and activities.
6	Joseph R. Scalero has been directed to coordinate
7	compliance with non-discrimination requirements of the
8	Federal Revenue Sharing regulations.
9	"At this scheduled meeting of its Board of
10	Trustees reserved decisions from previous meetings, if
11	any, may be acted upon by the Board of Trustees.
12	"At the aforesaid time and place all interested
13	persons will be given an opportunity to be heard.
14	"By Order of the Board of Trustees of the
15	Incorporated Village of Mineola. Joseph R. Scalero,
16	Village Clerk.
17	"Dated August 18, 2017."
18	MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you.
19	Mr. Whalen, report on mailings?
20	MR. WHALEN: Mayor, the Affidavit of Mailing is
21	in order. It's been signed and notarized. No issues.
22	MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you.
23	Mr. Gibbons, anything?
24	MR. GIBBONS: Yes. Nassau County Planning
25	Commission has given us a local determination on the

application and I would ask for a motion declaring this 1 action a Type II action under SEQRA. 2 MAYOR STRAUSS: Motion? 3 MR. PEREIRA: Motion. MR. CUSATO: Second. 5 6 MAYOR STRAUSS: Motion by Trustee Pereira. 7 Second by Trustee Cusato. 8 All in favor? 9 MR. DURHAM: Aye. 10 MR. PEREIRA: Aye. 11 MR. CUSATO: Aye. 12 MR. WALSH: Aye. 13 MAYOR STRAUSS: Aye. 14 Opposed? Carried. 15 16 OK. Ladies and gentlemen, this will be the 17 format for this evening's hearing: The applicant will come forth and present their application. They will 18 state their names -- anybody approaching the podium, 19 please state your name, your address and your part in the 20 21 application, or your reason for being up there. And then I also ask anybody to please speak clearly and slowly so 22 the reporter can accurately record the comments and 23 statements. 24 25 Gentlemen.

1	MR. SCHNUR: Good evening, gentlemen, and thank
2	you. My name is Bradley Schnur.
3	MAYOR STRAUSS: Can you adjust the microphone?
4	MR. SCHNUR: Sure.
5	MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you very much.
6	MR. SCHNUR: Is that it?
7	MAYOR STRAUSS: That's much better.
8	MR. SCHNUR: My name is Bradley Schnur. I'm an
9	attorney. My business address is 400 Jericho Turnpike,
10	Suite 226, Jericho 11753. And here to my right is the
11	applicant, Elmer Arqueta, in connection with the
12	application for a Special Use Permit.
13	The nature of this permit is that Mr. Argueta
14	is seeking to open up, in the facility known as 90-12
15	Jericho Turnpike, Mineola, a mini market. A mini market
16	that's going to sell grocery type products, but not any
17	type of hot food. The type of products that are going to
18	be sold here really cater to people from Central and
19	South America, which is a large part of and known part of
20	the community.
21	The premises were previously used as a hair
22	salon, and there would be very minor conversion in order
23	to allow it to be used for the purpose that Mr. Argueta
24	intends.

Mr. Argueta did make a prior application in

25

1	connection with this premises, but did not follow the
2	procedure properly, which is why you may have in your
3	notes that there was a prior application which was
4	denied. This subsequent application was prepared and
5	submitted on or about August 17, 2017, along with the
6	copy of the plans, copy of the local site map, and a list
7	of all the addresses of the potentially affected parties.
8	We would ask that, based on the application, if
9	there are no objections, Mr. Arqueta's application be
10	granted and that he be allowed to convert the space for
11	the intended purpose.
12	MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you.
13	What are the hours of operation expected to be
14	for the building, the store.
15	MR. ELMER ARGUETA: My name is Elmer.
16	MAYOR STRAUSS: Don't speak too close to the
17	mic.
18	MR. ELMER ARGUETA: My name is Elmer Argueta,
19	address 215 Cleveland Avenue, Mineola.
20	Just open 6:00 to 10:00.
21	MAYOR STRAUSS: 6:00 in the morning till 10:00
22	o'clock at night?
23	MR. ELMER ARGUETA: No. No. 6:00 in the
24	morning to 10:00.
25	MAYOR STRAUSS: Till 10:00.

1	MR. ELMER ARGUETA: Mm hmm.
2	MAYOR STRAUSS: Is that seven days a week, five
3	days a week?
4	MR. ELMER ARGUETA: Seven days a week.
5	MAYOR STRAUSS: OK. How are you going to get
6	deliveries into the building, through the front or the
7	back?
8	MR. ELMER ARGUETA: Through the front.
9	MAYOR STRAUSS: Through the front. OK.
10	All right. How much staff are you going to
11	have? Are you going to have one person working, two
12	people working?
13	MR. ELMER ARGUETA: Just me.
14	MAYOR STRAUSS: Just you.
15	MR. ELMER ARGUETA: Yes, and my wife.
16	MAYOR STRAUSS: OK. Have you ever done one of
17	these stores before? Have you ever opened up one of
18	these stores before?
19	MR. ELMER ARGUETA: Um
20	MR. SCHNUR: Have you ever operated a grocery
21	or mini-mart before?
22	MR. ELMER ARGUETA: Yes no.
23	MR. SCHNUR: No. Have you had one previously?
24	MR. DANIS ARGUETA: Excuse me. May I?
25	MR. ELMER ARGUETA: My English

1	MR. SCHNUR: His brother, who speaks Spanish
2	MAYOR STRAUSS: Yes, of course. He can come
3	up.
4	State your name and your address, and you
5	certainly can translate.
6	MR. DANIS ARGUETA: My name is Danis. My
7	address is 187 Spindle Road in Hicksville. He's my
8	brother. So
9	MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank for helping him out.
LO	Appreciate it.
11	DANIS ARGUETA: No problem.
L2	No he has not opened anything, but he works in
13	restaurants. So he knows.
L4	MAYOR STRAUSS: And he lives in Mineola now?
L5	MR. DANIS ARGUETA: He lives in Mineola.
16	MAYOR STRAUSS: All right. Great. Thank you.
L7	I don't have any other questions. I'll put it
L8	over to the Deputy Mayor.
19	MR. PEREIRA: Good evening. Thank you.
20	So you will not be cooking any food?
21	MR. ELMER ARGUETA: No.
22	MR. PEREIRA: No food.
23	You will not be competing with the deli and the
24	Subway. You're not going to be selling the same
25	products.

1	MR. ELMER ARGUETA: No. Not compete. Want to
2	do is, like, just grocery and drinks.
3	MR. PEREIRA: Will you have fresh vegetables,
4	things that can go bad, or only rice and beans?
5	MR. ELMER ARGUETA: Rice.
6	MR. PEREIRA: But are you going to have
7	vegetables also, things that can spoil, things that can
8	go bad?
9	MR. SCHNUR: Don't answer for him, but
10	translate.
11	MR. DANIS ARGUETA: No
12	MR. SCHNUR: No. Translate to Elmer what the
13	Deputy Mayor asked, and then he can answer.
14	(Brother translates for the applicant.)
15	MR. ELMER ARGUETA: Yes.
1.6	MR. PEREIRA: You will.
1.7	What are you going to do with the garbage? How
1.8	are you going to dispose, how are you going to get rid of
19	things that you have to throw out? Are you going to use
20	the Village's garbage collection, the Village is going to
21	pick up the garbage, or are you going to contract your
22	own garbage collection?
23	MR. SCHNUR: The shop that is part of his
24	lease is that a third-party sanitation company would be
25	carting the trash away his and any other buildings that

I do not believe -are there. 1 2 MR. PEREIRA: I find that interesting because 3 if you drive by the property any day there is, you know, 50 bags out front on Jericho, which that's our job to 4 pick it up and that's fine. He can use the Village's 5 sanitation. However --6 7 MAYOR STRAUSS: He's supposed to use private. MR. WHALEN: He's supposed to use a private 8 9 carter. 10 MR. SCHNUR: Right, and it was a requirement in the lease that it's for a private carter. 1.1. MR. PEREIRA: OK. As long as he knows that. 12 MR. SCHNUR: I will make sure of it. 13 MR. PEREIRA: Make sure he knows that. 14 15 MR. SCHNUR: Especially with food that's prone to spoilage. 16 MR. PEREIRA: Right. 17 So I don't know if you know this at this point, 18 but you wouldn't know how often that pickup would be. 19 other words, traditionally -- and I don't know that these 20 stores do not have basements -- a lot of times, 21 especially in the hot summer months, they will store the 22 23 garbage in a walk-in freezer and put it out when it's 24 going to be picked up. We certainly don't want this in

that rear space between the shopping center and the homes

1	to be, you know, stinking
2	MR. SCHNUR: Right. It would draw animals.
3	MR. PEREIRA: All kinds of things.
4	MR. SCHNUR: And I will remind him of that, and
5	we'll sit down and go through all of that.
6	MR. PEREIRA: You know, the site plan that you
7	have here is very rudimentary.
8	Is there going to be a walk-in box of any kind,
9	a freezer?
10	MR. SCHNUR: No. There's going to be
11	refrigeration units for beverages, for the beverages that
12	are there. It's not going to be a freezer. Most of the
13	products that he's going to be selling are prepackaged
14	boxed food. He gave you examples of rice.
15	MR. PEREIRA: Rice and beans and pasta.
16	MR. SCHNUR: We will have a refrigerator, you
17	know, separate for small things. But things will not be
18	left out in the open. There will not be a large
19	freezer-refrigerator box like you would find in a butcher
20	shop or restaurant.
21	MR. PEREIRA: In terms of signage in front of
22	the store, are there any intended changes? Other than
23	the name, obviously.
24	MR. SCHNUR: We spoke about this. Other than
25	the name, there's no, you know, nothing that doesn't

blend in with what the landlord's requirements are, and certainly whatever he does would be within the Village Code. He would make the proper application, if necessary. It's not going to be flashing lights or anything like that.

MR. PEREIRA: Right. OK.

Mr. Argueta, if you're a mini-mart that's selling just groceries, why are you opening at 6:00 a.m.?

That's kind of early. You know. People normally don't go grocery shopping at 6:00 a.m. My concern is just to not be a disturbance to the neighbors behind you, especially on Saturday and Sunday. I don't know how many people -- you may find that once you open the business you may change your hours of operation, but what is your rationale for opening at 6:00 a.m.?

I could understand if you were a deli and you were making egg sandwiches, or you were providing food for people who were going to work but, if you are a traditional grocery store, why are you opening so early? Especially on weekends.

And again, you're entitled to open and run your business essentially any way you see fit, but it just seems to me that -- are you going to sell coffee and bread?

MR. ELMER ARGUETA: Yes.

1	MR. PEREIRA: OK.
2	MR. SCHNUR: More of a morning stop, bakery
3	type of thing. But I asked them, his brother, if he can
4	just clarify the questions to make sure that Mr. Argueta
5	understood the prior question regarding the hours,
6	because you raised a point why would somebody come and
7	buy groceries at 6:30 in the morning. So I just wanted
8	to make sure that he's clear on the question.
9	So can you translate the question?
10	(Brother translates for the applicant.)
11	MR. SCHNUR: So
12	MR. DANIS ARGUETA: OK. I'm sorry. He just
13	wants to clarify that when you asked him about the hours,
14	he said from 6:00 a.m. to 10:00, but he was from 6:00 to
15	10:00 p.m. He just wanted to clarify that.
16	MR. PEREIRA: Wait. From 6:00 p.m. to 10:00
17	p.m.?
18	MR. DANIS ARGUETA: No. I'm sorry. 6:00 a.m.
19	MR. PEREIRA: No. We were clear. We
20	understood that. We didn't think he was only open for
21	four hours.
22	MR. SCHNUR: Initially it came out to me as if
23	he was going to be open from 6:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m.
24	MAYOR STRAUSS: No. I understood that.
25	But to Mr. Pereira's point, we're just not sure

why you would want to start at 6:00 o'clock. But that's up to you. You know, it's a business decision.

MR. PEREIRA: You're entitled to open at 6:00 o'clock. We can't tell you not to open at 6:00 o'clock. But, you know, in the process of being a good neighbor, especially on weekends, once you open you may want to reconsider, you know, for the sake of the neighbors in terms of noise and traffic and movement. You know, if you're opening up at 6:00 and you don't have to . . . Traditionally on weekends people like to sleep in a little later. You're not going to have people going off to work. Landscapers and people who normally would go to work, on Sunday they're not going to go that early, even on a Saturday.

So just a suggestion that you're going to be right in front of homes where people live. Where you live, on Cleveland Avenue, you don't want your neighbor at 6:00 in the morning to start, you know, making noise on Sunday. Well you may not care because you're going to be at the store but, you know, you would care if you weren't there.

So you're going to have two employees, you and your wife.

MR. ELMER ARGUETA: My wife, yes.

MR. PEREIRA: OK. Are you going to have video

1	surveillance inside the place? Are you going to have
2	cameras installed?
3	MR. SCHNUR: What kind of security are you
4	going to have?
5	MR. PEREIRA: Security.
6	MR. ELMER ARGUETA: Yes.
7	MR. SCHNUR: Alarm, cameras?
8	MR. ELMER ARGUETA: Camera, yes.
9	MR. PEREIRA: Are you going to have an alarm?
10	Right?
11	MR. ELMER ARGUETA: I think he have it already.
12	MR. PEREIRA: There's already an alarm there?
13	OK.
14	OK. That's all my questions. Thank you.
15	MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you.
16	Before I ask Trustee Cusato to see what he has
17	to say, I just want to ask: Do you have access to the
18	basement?
19	MR. ELMER ARGUETA: No. No basement.
20	MAYOR STRAUSS: No basement. OK. Thank you.
21	Mr. Cusato?
22	MR. CUSATO: Thank you, Mayor.
23	Good evening, gentlemen.
24	So you said that there's no cooking on
25	premises; is that correct?

1	MR. ELMER ARGUETA: Yes.
2	MR. CUSATO: But you're serving rice and beans.
3	MR. SCHNUR: No. No. That's product
4	that's going to be sold in packages, not cooked, but you
5	could buy a box of rice or a bag of beans. He's not
6	selling rice and beans as hot meals
7	MR. CUSATO: Oh. OK.
8	MR. SCHNUR: within the space. It's more of
9	a grocery store, convenience store, where you can pickup
10	a box of Spanish rice and bring it home. There's not
11	going to be any hot cooked food.
12	MR. CUSATO: OK. Actually, I have no other
13	questions. Thank you.
14	MAYOR STRAUSS: Trustee Durham?
15	MR. DURHAM: Thank you.
16	My only question: The drinks, any alcohol?
17	MR. ELMER ARGUETA: No. No alcohol.
18	MR. DURHAM: No alcohol. So it's just milk,
19	orange juice.
20	MR. ELMER ARGUETA: Just drink, the bottles of
21	the drink, the big ones, the small ones. Something like
22	that. You know, water.
23	MR. SCHNUR: Soft drinks, juices, water, and in
24	the morning coffees, international coffees.
25	MR DURHAM: So vou!]] have coffee urns going

1	during the day for the coffee?
2	MR. SCHNUR: How are you going to serve the
3	coffee? Is it going to be plugged in during the day? A
4	thermos? How are you going to serve it?
5	MR. ELMER ARGUETA: No. I just machine a three
6	cup. Whatever it have.
7	MR. SCHNUR: He's saying just a machine that
8	makes three cups at a time.
9	MR. DURHAM: OK. Well, good luck.
10	MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you.
11	Trustee Walsh?
12	MR. WALSH: Yes. Thank you.
13	Hello. How are you?
14	Let me ask the attorney a question. You
15	mentioned something that he's going to be open at 6:00
16	a.m., and I heard you say the word bakery. Is he going
17	to be selling any bakery goods, or he's selling
18	coffee. Is he going to be selling bakery goods, or
19	buttered rolls, or anything like that in the morning?
20	MR. SCHNUR: Other than coffee in the morning
21	MAYOR STRAUSS: Let the brother interpret so he
22	understands.
23	(Brother translates for the applicant.)
24	MR. SCHNUR: He intends on having, you know,
25	bagels, muffins, that type of

MR. WALSH: So that's not a grocery store. You know. I mean, you said it's going to be a grocery store, but you're going to be selling buttered rolls and bagels and muffins and coffee. And what else would you be selling in the morning? No eggs, right?

MR. ELMER ARGUETA: No eggs.

MR. WALSH: So you'll be selling -- you'll be somewhat in competition with the deli that's there who also sells breakfast; is that correct?

MR. SCHNUR: The question is that there's a deli that sells breakfast, coffee, bagels, rolls. Are you going to be competing with them if you were going to be selling coffee?

MR. WALSH: Well he will, in fact, be competing with them. I mean, you know, it's not a question. I thought -- I was under the understanding that it's just going to be a grocery store. And grocery stores that I'm familiar with -- and I'm familiar with small grocery stores -- don't usually sell buttered rolls and muffins and the like.

So the reason for him being open at 6:00 o'clock in the morning is because when people, you know, landscapers that line up at the place next door and everything else, and he's going to be there to service these people with breakfast in the morning as well as

1	having a grocery store; is that correct?
2	Have the brother
3	(Brother translates for the applicant.)
4	MR. WALSH: So the answer is yes, that he will
5	be selling products in the morning?
6	MR. DANIS ARGUETA: Yes. But can I answer?
7	MR. WALSH: Yes. Please do. I would rather
8	have you explain.
9	MR. DANIS ARGUETA: You know, the way he is
10	planning to open, I mean, the product that he's going
11	to be if he open in the morning, he's not going to be
12	selling the product that the next deli selling because
13	it's going to be unique. Whatever they selling, they're
14	selling breakfast. They're selling rice, cooked rice.
15	They're selling beans.
16	MR. WALSH: I know the deli. I've been in
17	there. I know.
18	MR. DANIS ARGUETA: Yes. But he's telling me
19	that the only thing he's going to have is just the
20	coffee, hot coffee, and just maybe a few bagels that
21	people want to pick up.
22	MR. WALSH: Bagels, buttered rolls and muffins,
23	and that's it.
24	MR. DANIS ARGUETA: Yes, that's it.
25	MR WALSH. Now we're going beyond the scope of

1	being a grocery store. You understand that, right?
2	Is he going to be selling any kinds of meat
3	like a butcher store would have? Any kind of steak or
4	codfish, or dried codfish, or anything like that?
5	MR. ELMER ARGUETA: No.
6	MR. DANIS ARGUETA: No. No.
7	MR. WALSH: OK. And just as a comment I'd like
8	to make: Do you have natural gas in that store?
9	You have propane tanks behind that store; am I
10	correct there?
11	How do you get your gas? It's from propane
12	tanks, right?
13	I looked at it
14	MR. DANIS ARGUETA: I'm not sure. I'm not sure
15	how.
16	MR. WALSH: The reason why I say this, and it
17	has nothing to do with you, it's not your issue, but I
18	remember a hearing with the same landlord at the same
19	location, or right next to it, many years ago and it was
20	a question about natural gas not being brought into the
21	building and there's propane tanks behind there. And
22	there's a house there. And it's not your shortcoming.
23	It's a shortcoming of the landlord, in my opinion, who
24	seems to always do things the less expensive way.
25	So you will be getting your gas through propane

1	tanks outside. When you look outside you see propane
2	tanks, and that's since 2017 I think that the building
3	still has propane tanks as opposed to natural gas. It's
4	just a shortcoming of the landlord in my opinion.
5	I have no other questions. Thank you, Mayor.
6	MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you.
7	Anything else you wish to yes.
8	MR. PEREIRA: Just one more question.
9	There's going to be no seating inside, right?
10	People can't if they take coffee or a bagel, they go.
11	They don't stay.
12	MR. ELMER ARGUETA: Yes. Correct.
13	MR. PEREIRA: No table. No chairs. No
14	seating.
15	MR. ELMER ARGUETA: No tables. No chairs.
16	Just go.
17	MR. SCHNUR: It's a small space, relatively
18	speaking. It's going to have it's on the plan you
19	know, shelving for the product. It's going to have a
20	small counter and cash register. And that's essentially
21	it.
22	MR. PEREIRA: Yes. It's a very, very, small
23	space.
24	MR. SCHNUR: Yes.
25	MR. WALSH: But just if I can say something to

1 Mr. Pereira's point before.

You're going to be opening up at 6:00 o'clock in the morning. You're on the outside edge of the neighborhood there. And landscaping trucks pull up along that street there, you know, as we both know, and they're going to be going to your store at 6:30 or 7:00 o'clock in the morning and buying coffee and buttered rolls and such. And to me that's just a stretch beyond having a grocery store. That's why it would be -- you know, you would think that you would open up at 8:00 or something, or 9:00, like a normal grocery store, a small grocery store. At 6:00 o'clock in the morning, seems to me the idea behind that is to cater to people that want to get breakfast from you, and that's a stretch beyond a grocery store. That's all.

MR. DANIS ARGUETA: Can I translate?

MR. WALSH: Can you tell him that, please?

(Brother translates for the applicant.)

MR. DANIS ARGUETA: He's reconsidering. He didn't realize how early. But he said now he's saying that he probably reconsider opening, instead of 6:00, 8:00 or 9:00.

MR. SCHNUR: Based on the comments that are made tonight, he will take some of the comments and suggestions under advisement and he's not going to, this

1	evening, determine. He still has a long way to go, if
2	this application is approved, even to get this store
3	open.
4	MAYOR STRAUSS: We appreciate that because, as
5	the other trustees mentioned, there's concern about the
6	residents in the neighborhood starting out that early.
7	Thank you.
8	MR. SCHNUR: Definitely. Thank you.
9	MAYOR STRAUSS: Any other comments from the
10	Board?
11	Gentlemen, if you could have a seat briefly.
12	We'll open it up to public comment.
13	MR. SCHNUR: Thank you.
14	MR. ELMER ARGUETA: Thanks.
15	MAYOR STRAUSS: I'll open it up to public
16	comment. Anyone wishing to make a comment, please
17	approach the podium. Speak slowly and clearly for the
18	stenographer.
19	Anybody wishing to come down to make public
20	comment at all? No?
21	Gentlemen, come on back up.
22	Anything else you'd like to say?
23	MR. ELMER ARGUETA: No.
24	MR. SCHNUR: Just to thank you for your time
25	and, based on the information presented this evening, as

1	well as in the application, we would ask that the Village
2	does grant Mr. Argueta the special use that he's applied
3	for.
4	MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you.
5	I'll entertain a motion to approve.
6	MR. PEREIRA: Motion.
7	MAYOR STRAUSS: Motion by Trustee Pereira.
8	Do I have a second?
9	MR. WALSH: Second.
10	MAYOR STRAUSS: Second by Trustee Walsh.
11	Ms. Pardo, can you poll the Board?
12	MS. PARDO: Trustee Durham?
13	MR. DURHAM: Yes.
