MAYOR STRAUSS: Mr. Scalero?

MR. SCALERO: Ladies and gentlemen, please silence all pagers and cell phones. In the event of an emergency there are exits located in the rear of the room.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Evening, ladies and gentlemen.

If anybody is here for the hearing regarding 331 Wills Avenue, it has been canceled at the request of the applicant. So we'll look to reschedule on that. So we're only going to have the one hearing this evening.

entitled 'Special Uses', and Section 550.13, entitled 'B-2 Districts', Subsection (A), for the purpose of establishing a Starbucks with the sale of food and beverages upon the property known as 210 Station Plaza North, Mineola, New York, known and designated on the Nassau County Land and Tax Map as Section 9, Block 422, Lot 10.

"The Village of Mineola does not discriminate on the basis of handicapped status in administration or access to or employment in its projects and activities.

Joseph R. Scalero has been directed to coordinate compliance with non-discrimination requirements of the Federal Revenue Sharing regulations.

12	MAYOR STRAUSS: Motion by Trustee Pereira.

14	MAYOR STRAUSS: Second by Trustee Cusato.

16	MR. DURHAM: Aye.
17	MR. PEREIRA: Aye.

23	Ladies and gentlemen, this will be the format
24	for tonight's hearing: The applicant will make their
25	presentation. The Board will ask any questions that we

feel we need to ask. And then we'll open up to public comment.

I request anybody that's approaching the podium this evening to please speak clearly, slowly, and state your name and your address for the reporter.

Is there someone -- thank you, sir.

MR. MACDONALD: Good evening.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Good evening.

MR. MACDONALD: Mayor, Members of the Board, my name is Neil Macdonald, partner with WFC Architects, with offices located at 12-1 Technology Drive, Setauket, New York. I'm here today on behalf of the applicant, Starbucks Corporation.

If it pleases the Board, I have a brief presentation, and I also have with me today
Christopher Crans, the New York State Registered
Architect and Designer for the project, as well as
Lindsay Trimarchi, Store Development Manager with
Starbucks, and they're available to answer any questions you may have as well.

As indicated in the notice, the subject application of Starbucks Corporation is for a Special Use Permit pursuant to Chapter 550 of the Code of the Incorporated Village of Mineola, entitled "Zoning", for the purpose of establishing a Starbucks with the sale of

food and beverages upon the property located at 210
Station Plaza North, Mineola, New York, designated on the Nassau County Land and Tax Map as Section 9, Block 422,
Lot 10.

Currently the property consists of a two-story building with multiple retail tenants across from the Mineola train station served by the Long Island Railroad. The existing front facade is an aluminum storefront and stone veneer, and the rear facade is brick, and the building has a small outdoor courtyard in the rear.

The proposed Starbucks would be a conversion of the existing Mineola Card and Convenience Store. The new store will occupy the same exact square footage, approximately 890 square feet of space on the ground floor and, similar to the existing use, the proposed Starbucks will be a grab-and-go store, as this store will primarily serve commuters and local residents. No public seating will be provided.

Regarding the menu, no Starbucks items will require extensive preparation. All beverages are prepared for immediate service in response to customer orders. All food products, including breakfast sandwiches, fruit and snack plates, sandwiches, paninis, wraps, and salads, are preassembled, prepackaged, by an approved commercial manufacturer and received ready to



eat. No washing of fruits, vegetables or other food items occurs on the site. There is no cooking, cooling or reheating of any products. Oven-warmed foods are heated per the customer order, and there are no holding units.

Starbucks has submitted an application for approval of plans for construction or renovation of a food service establishment to the Nassau County

Department of Health and was approved on March 28, 2016.

It is Starbucks' intent to submit a food permit application to Nassau County Health Department once approval has been obtained from the Village.

From a design perspective, both the exterior and interior will benefit from a significant improvement and upgrades. The exterior signage, which currently consists of an array of varying types of back-lit acrylic neon signs, posters and banners, will be transformed to a more modest word mark. I have a copy for the Board, a copy of a photograph of the existing storefront, if I may.

(Same handed up to the Mayor.)

MR. MACDONALD: On the display board I have an elevation of the proposed Starbucks storefront and the existing storefront, which is currently in a state of disrepair and will be entirely replaced with new a



storefront.

Inside the space will benefit from -- I'll just put the floor plan up -- from a complete renovation. It will receive all new high-grade floor, wall and ceiling finishes, as well as new high-efficiency lighting and mechanical systems.

Hours of operation will be seven days a week from 5:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m.

MR. GIBBONS: I'm sorry. Can you repeat that?

MR. MACDONALD: Seven days a week from 5:00

a.m. to 10:00 p.m. A typical shift would consist of a

maximum of 3 employees.

Garbage will be placed in covered cans and placed at appropriate times for curbside pick up. And the deliveries will be curbside by small van or box truck and staged and sequenced based on the need for small delivery size, typically on hand truck through the front door. And these deliveries will occur off-hours.

So in summary, it is a very similar use to the existing grab-and-go convenience store that is there, and we think it's going to be an improvement to the community, and respectfully request a Special Use Permit.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you.

MR. MACDONALOD: Happy to answer any questions you may have.



1	MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you. Thank you for
2	selecting Mineola.
3	The store is a franchise? Is the owner here?
4	MR. MACDONALD: Yes. We have Lindsay
5	Trimarchi, from Starbucks, here to answer any questions.
6	MAYOR STRAUSS: So she's going to be operating
7	the store?
8	MR. MACDONALD: Would you like to?
9	MR. GIBBONS: It's my understanding that the
10	Starbucks are not franchised. They're all operated by
11	the parent; is that correct?
12	MS. TRIMARCHI: Yes, that's correct.
13	So, Lindsay Trimarchi, 93 Mill River Road,
14	Oyster Bay, New York 11771.
15	I represent Starbucks. I work on the real
16	estate team, and I chose this location. I don't have an
17	operator here, but I'm very familiar with the operations
18	and can hopefully answer any questions you have.
19	MAYOR STRAUSS: So it's not a franchise?
20	MS. TRIMARCHI: It's not a franchise.
21	So Starbucks has 73 company-owned stores on
22	Long Island, and this would be one of them.
23	MAYOR STRAUSS: OK. You mentioned that the
24	store will have a new storefront and signage and things
25	to what's there now. We're currently beginning a

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storefront standardization facade program, and we would like to know if you would be amenable to conforming to what we're looking to do there and standardize the storefronts along that whole strip and going into the other parts of our downtown.

MR. MACDONALD: We're certainly happy to take a look at it. You know, what we propose we think is very modest in comparison to what's there now.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Right.

MR. MACDONALD: So if you can share those standards with us.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Yes. It's a pretty good deal, actually. Through grants we'll pay, like, 75 percent. So, not that you guys need it, but that's what we're looking to do.

Curbside deliveries. Curbside, I don't think one exists there. It's a very congested area. The parking is usually full 24/7.

Where would the deliveries be actually made without double-parking and creating more congestion in an already incredibly congested area.

MR. MACDONALD: That's why the deliveries are typically scheduled off-hours. So anywhere from, say, 10:00 p.m. to 3:00 a.m., usually when the area is less congested.

As you know, the site doesn't have any capability for a floating dock or off-street parking.

MAYOR STRAUSS: No public seating at all inside? So it's strictly grab-and-go?

MR. MACDONALD: Yes. It's a very tight store, as you can see.

We have the floor plan here. Primary entrance is here, and basically you cue around, place your order, and then pick up your drinks here. And there's a condiment bar here to add sugar to your coffee. And, you know, there's not a lot of room for anything else. The back part of the store is storage, refrigeration and so forth.

MAYOR STRAUSS: We have historically had a tremendous amount of parking and traffic issues in that area which we can't seem to make go away. In our Village Code we have a part of it that says that we require the applicant, if needed, to pay for a traffic study expert and we'd ask you to do that. We'll provide you with a company, you know, on your dime, and we'll need to get a subject-matter expert's opinion on the traffic flow in that area with it being a Starbucks.

It's just tremendously tough down there on any given day or time. We have school buses that go through there for Hofstra and Adelphi. We have Winthrop

University Hospital makes their deliveries to the hospital through that street. I'm sure you've been there. It's just an incredibly busy location.

MS. TRIMARCHI: If I could speak to that?

MAYOR STRAUSS: Yes. Please.

MS. TRIMARCHI: So, upon choosing this location, we found typically -- we have very limited parking -- but because of the train station and the hospital and the new residential around it, we don't feel that we'll be capturing much traffic. We're going to be having foot track of people who are already there catching the train or using the hospital.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Yes. I tend to agree with most of that, with the exception of I drop off my family member, or my friend, and while you get out of the car and go to the platform I'm going to get out of my car and run into Starbucks.

MS. TRIMARCHI: Right.

MAYOR STRAUSS: And it's not like you're pouring a cup of coffee and you're out in three minutes. You're mixing. You're pressing. You're steaming. You're triple-shoting. You're doing whatever you do. So that takes some significant time. And to leave a car parked in an area where it shouldn't be parked in an already very, very tight location, we'd just like to have

1	somebody, a subject-matter expert, speak on any pitfalls,
2	if there are. Maybe there aren't. But we'd like to have
3	somebody do that for us.
4	MS. TRIMARCHI: Understood.
5	MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you.
6	How many staff are you going to have on hand
7	there?
8	MS. TRIMARCHI: Three at any given time.
9	MAYOR STRAUSS: Where are they going to park?
10	MS. TRIMARCHI: I'm not sure where they'll
11	park. I assume that there's I know there's municipal
12	parking, and if they live in the area they'll have a
13	parking permit.
14	MAYOR STRAUSS: If they live in the Village
15	they're entitled to purchase a parking commuter pass.
16	MS. TRIMARCHI: Right.
17	MAYOR STRAUSS: But then those spots are gone
18	probably by 6:30, 7:00.
19	MS. TRIMARCHI: Right. I'm not really sure.
20	MAYOR STRAUSS: The rest of it is metered.
21	MS. TRIMARCHI: OK.
22	MAYOR STRAUSS: So two hour meters. And
23	there's a Intermodal Center on the south side of the
24	tracks which you can park all day, or I think it's 12
25	hours for \$6.

1	MS. TRIMARCHI: Right.
2	MAYOR STRAUSS: Parking is at a premium there
3	too.
4	MS. TRIMARCHI: Right.
5	MAYOR STRAUSS: OK. I'll let some of the other
6	trustees ask questions.
7	MR. PEREIRA: Thank you, Mayor.
8	Good evening. Thank you for coming down.
9	Will this be the only Starbucks in Mineola?
10	But you did have Starbucks in Mineola not too
11	long ago on Old Country Road.
12	MS. TRIMARCHI: Correct.
13	MR. PEREIRA: And you had another one a quarter
14	of a mile away in the Country Glen Center as well.
15	MS. TRIMARCHI: That we closed.
16	MR. PEREIRA: Carle Place.
17	Yes, that you closed.
18	MS. TRIMARCHI: Right.
19	MR. PEREIRA: Right. You closed both of those.
20	Right.
21	And now you're looking to put this have you
22	looked at now, your being with the real estate team, I
23	guess you scout out locations.
24	MS. TRIMARCHI: Correct.
25	MR. PEREIRA: Did you look at any other

MS. TRIMARCHI: We specifically scouted this location due to the proximity to the train station, because Dunkin' Donuts services Long Island Railroad passengers and Starbucks doesn't really have much of the opportunity. So we wanted -- with the thought this was a good opportunity, given that it's an express station, that, you know, we could service some of the Long Island MR. PEREIRA: So there were no other considerations given in and around the train station. This is the only location you looked at? MS. TRIMARCHI: Oh, on that strip? MR. PEREIRA: Within a tenth of a mile of the train station, whether on the north side or the south This was the only location. MR. PEREIRA: This was the only location. MR. PEREIRA: OK. You didn't consider the new buildings that are being built and that have commercial MS. TRIMARCHI: We just felt that this had better visibility. The newer construction, we had just

of brought to us that there was new construction going on, but we thought that this was the most competitive position.

MR. PEREIRA: OK. Because, you know, to seque to new construction: On the other side of the bridge, where you would be, is the Citibank building. There's going to be a building there called the Village Green.

OK? And they're going to exit on the south side of the building. They're going to be coming through that plaza, not all of them, but a considerable number of them will come through that plaza and exit out, very much as the Mayor just described the deliveries for the hospital come through there.

So the reason why the Mayor -- and I agree with him -- why we would want to have some type of traffic study and parking study done is because we want all those pieces to be put together.

There's also been some talk about adding a third rail to the railroad, to the main line. That is going to change the physical appearance of the plaza. How would that impact traffic? How will that impact parking? Will we lose parking? We don't know that.

So we want to have a subject matter expert tell us, Well, when the building is built with 199 units with access to this plaza, what kind of impact will that have



on traffic, what kind of numbers will that generate. And these will be people who do drink Starbucks who will stop and maybe double-park or maybe walk. I don't know. But we have to look at that.

We've all lived here 40 years, 50 years, 60 years. So we know what it looks like when a train comes down. Nobody parks. They double park. Wait for their family member. You know, they kind of park side-by-side. You can barely squeeze through.

And as the Mayor said, I can certainly see someone, Well, the train is five minutes late. I'm just going to run out and get a coffee.

so it's problematic. I welcome and would love and I think our downtown is going to be the perfect place for a Starbucks. I really do. I think it's the kind of clientele. And the demographic is going to be, and is starting to be, the Starbucks demographic. I'm not so sure that that location -- across from the ticket booth, with the parking issues and the traffic issues that are there now, that will probably only increase with the new construction -- if that's the place where I would even certainly feel more comfortable on the side street, on the street leading down to the plaza. OK? So, you see what I'm talking about?

20	What do you do with the things that expire,

23	Those things get picked up by the person who

25	MR. MACDONALD: Yes. They'll be carted away.

20	o'clock because most of the other businesses are closed,
21	except the bar is not closed, as long as we adhere to
22	that. But at the same time you also have tenants above
23	you, correct? People live on the upper floors.
24	Will someone be there to get these deliveries?
25	Does the delivery person have a key?

1	MR. MACDONALD: The delivery person has a key.
2	So they let themselves in. And they'll stock any of the
3	perishable items and leave the dry goods for stocking in
4	the morning when the crew gets in.
5	MR. PEREIRA: OK. I assume that you're not
6	purchasing the building. This is a lease.
7	MS. TRIMARCHI: Correct.
8	MR. PEREIRA: Are you able to tell me what the
9	length of the lease is, or would be?
10	MS. TRIMARCHI: It's a standard Starbucks
11	lease. I'm not sure if
12	MR. PEREIRA: Five years? Ten years? Fifteen
13	years?
14	MS. TRIMARCHI: It's a ten-year lease.
15	MR. PEREIRA: Ten-year lease. OK.
16	MS. TRIMARCHI: I don't know if I was allowed
17	to say that, but
18	MR. PEREIRA: OK.
19	MAYOR STRAUSS: We won't tell anybody.
20	MR. PEREIRA: OK. I'll reserve any more
21	questions that I have.
22	MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you.
23	MR. PEREIRA: Thank you.
24	MAYOR STRAUSS: Mr. Cusato?
25	MR. CUSATO: Thank you, Mayor.

Good evening.

MR. MACDONALD: Good evening.

MR. CUSATO: You know, one of the things that drew my attention over this past several months is Starbucks' interest in doing coffee, wine and beer.

Ironically, this past Saturday there was an article in Newsday and there are stores in Miller Place and Hauppauge, and on and on, and now in Long Beach.

Any intent on doing wine and beer in Mineola?

MR. MACDONALD: Not at this location. There's no seating. There's no space for it. It's just not appropriate for this location.

MR. CUSATO: OK. Thank you. That's the only question I have.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you.

Mr. Durham?

MR. DURHAM: As Trustee Pereira said, I think there are several areas down there that are more suited for a Starbucks because of the traffic congestion in that area.

I definitely like the idea of having a Starbucks in the downtown, and I think it would be a welcomed addition. But I think with the traffic and the congestion -- I mean, I go down there and pick up my son sometimes, and it's hard to come through underneath the

bridge, and there's all the cars are double-parked for the train. If we add more cars to that, I think that the congestion is a serious problem. And I definitely would want to see what the engineering report or traffic study would say about that and the number. Or they can go to see other Starbucks and see the number of cars that pull up per hour and have the numbers for us on that to take and see what type of influx that we're going to have with traffic and additional cars into that downtown area.

I think that's my only statement.

MS. TRIMARCHI: Right. We do have another Starbucks, as you know, in Garden City. We also have a full café Starbucks in Westbury, in Westbury Galleria. So we have other Starbucks where people would rather stay. I completely -- just as a point, I completely understand your point.

MR. DURHAM: But Starbucks is a destination.

People go out and they leave their house and go to

Starbucks with that in mind, that they're going to

Starbucks. And then, so, that's a destination place.

And then, but then we're now putting in that. We have so many people that are dropping off people. And then they're going to say, Hey, wait a second. Starbucks.

Whatever. I might as well stop here. I mean, that's a good thing that you want, whatever. But if there's no

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parking for them, they're going to take and double-park and they're going to jam that area. So definitely we need to take and see what the influx of traffic is going to be in that. I definitely want to see a traffic study.

> MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you.

Mr. Walsh?

MR. WALSH: Thank you.

Good evening.

MR. MACDONALD: Good evening.

MR. WALSH: Going last, everything has been asked already.

I do want to speak a little bit about -- well, first of all, can you give me other examples of Starbucks located at train stations in Nassau County?

MS. TRIMARCHI: We have one Starbucks in Port Washington that's at a train station.

MR. WALSH: Which is across the street on Main Street, in Port Washington.

MS. TRIMARCHI: On the same side of the street as the train station, on Main Street.

MR. WALSH: OK. So that's not -- OK. where it is. I didn't think of that. But there's nothing along the main line.

See, Port Washington is a different type of train station for me. Port Washington is a place where the train stops, sits. It serves the people from Port
Washington. Mineola is a -- was the second most
populated train station behind Hicksville. I believe it
is now most populated, or it will be at some time in the
near future.

So for me -- and it may be repeating what the Mayor said, but I want to highlight a few things. One, every hour on the hour a bus the size of a school bus comes from Hofstra University to pick up students and drop off students. So every half hour they're at Hofstra and half hour at the train station. So does --

MR. PEREIRA: Adelphi.

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MR. WALSH: -- Adelphi, the university, has a bus about every 45 minutes, a little bit smaller than Hofstra University. The loading dock at Winthrop Hospital, every single thing that comes in or goes out of Winthrop Hospital comes parallel to the Mineola Boulevard bridge on that street -- if you're familiar with it -- makes a turn through that Station Plaza North and goes to the loading dock around the corner. Tremendous amount of stuff there.

Also, the Long Island Railroad often brings several trucks the size of a small box truck to a van to clean the platform, clean the area, clean the stores, and they sit there for long periods of time double-parking

next to, you know, where commuters wait.

Every single time a train comes in heading towards Manhattan, or every half hour a train comes in heading towards Manhattan. And every time a train comes in, about five or ten minutes before the train comes in, a minimum of 15 to maybe 25 cars pull into Station Plaza They block the street that parallels the railroad North. tracks, which is Station Plaza North, the road that goes down to Main Street, and you can hardly get out of there. You know what I'm saying? You could hardly get into the plaza because people park -- they double-park. They stop They talk to the person in the car. And they their car. don't let people out. People, as you may know, sometimes are rude and they just stay in their car and they're not concerned with who's beeping.

I just foresee people double-parking their vehicles, getting out of their vehicle, maybe double-parking in front of the angled parking, getting out of their vehicle, going into Starbucks fast, before the train comes, or they'll think it's fast, and just clogging up the area. So there's so much stuff that goes through there, and I believe that people will get out of their vehicles, go into Starbucks, and just leave their vehicle running, or not running, and just make it even worse, because I drive down there every day. I know the

area. And sometimes it's very difficult to get through.

You say that it will be a walk-up, and I believe that a lot of the people will be walk-ups, but I also believe that more people will use Starbucks than use the current store to exit their vehicle and go into Starbucks.

So that's my concern. Thank you.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you.

Any other comments from the Board?

MR. PEREIRA: That was the question I was going to ask them.

These are the types of things that we need to know, if we can compare to other Starbucks locations and similarly located, and we can get a better idea what we're dealing with.

And as Mr. Macdonald said, yes, the current use is a grab-and-go kind of place, but we certainly are not going to compare this to Starbucks in terms of volume, in terms of draw.

As Trustee Durham said, people go to Starbucks. People leave their houses, make phone calls or get on social media and, like, I'm going to Starbucks, does anybody need anything? Or I feel like having a frappuccino, so I'm going to Starbucks. Nobody is saying that here.



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So it's a different use, although it's a similar use. It's a permitted use. We understand that. And I certainly don't want you to get the idea -- we're undergoing transformation in the downtown that I think is going to be great. I think Starbucks would be a great addition to the downtown. And I certainly foresee a downtown where there may be a Starbucks where people can sit. A traditional Starbucks, where maybe you will serve wine and beer. I don't know. And I know that that's not the application that's before us now.

And our concern is really -- my concerns revolve around traffic, parking, safety. Those are the things that I'm most concerned about. I'm not concerned with the use. I'm not concerned with a coffee shop down there. I'm not concerned with Starbucks. I think it fits in the downtown. I'm just not sure that it fits in this location, considering what's there now and what will be there in two or three or four years. And then we're going -- you'll be gone, you'll be somewhere else, and we're going to have to sit up here and answer to why the traffic is this, or why the parking is that, or why people are running across and putting themselves in danger.

> So those are my comments. Thank you. MAYOR STRAUSS: Any other comments from the



Board?

I ask at this time if you guys can have a seat and we'll open up to any public comment. Any questions that may be raised, please record them and then we'll answer them at the end of the public comment session.

Anybody in the first row? Second row? Third row? Fourth row? Fifth row? Sixth row? Seventh row?

Come on back up.

MR. MACDONALD: That was quick.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Yes.

Do you have anything else you need to say?

MR. MACDONALD: We appreciate the Board's

comments. And certainly, we'll endeavor to perform that

traffic study. And my office will reach out to you for

recommendations in that regard as well.

You know, I think the use here is, in fact, mitigated by the fact that, you know, it is a very pedestrian locale. Proximity to the train station makes it so. Its proximity to the hospital makes it so. And I think that, you know, that separates it and differentiates it in many ways from a typical Starbucks where people will park and stay and create an added level of congestion in that regard. The transient nature of this particular installation I think is something that will, we think, you know, not impact to the degree of

concern that you've expressed, but we understand your concerns.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Appreciated.

I think I can speak for the Board. We're excited to have you come down to that downtown area. I'm not so sure that this will be the best place for us as far as traffic and pedestrian flow and things, but let the expert bear that out.

Any other comments from the Board?

MR. PEREIRA: No.

MAYOR STRAUSS: I'll look to --

MR. GIBBONS: Mayor, just so there's no confusion, the way we do it is we will retain the parking expert, traffic expert. Before we retain the expert, we'll share with you what the projected cost is. If that's OK with you, then we'll then proceed. OK?

So I assume your contact information is in the Building Department file?

MR. MACDONALD: Correct.

MR. GIBBONS: Then I will get in touch with you.

MR. MACDONALD: Great.

MR. GIBBONS: Thank you.

MR. MACDONALD: Thank you so much for your time.

1	MAYOR STRAUSS: You're very welcome.
2	We'll look to continue the hearing. I guess
3	we'll set a date when we get back the parking and traffic
4	study.
5	Is that appropriate, Mr. Gibbons?
6	MR. GIBBONS: Yes. For now we're just going to
7	continue it to the May meeting.
8	So if anyone is watching, either in the
9	audience or at home, this is for the May meeting.
10	So you don't have to redo your notices. If for
11	some reason the study is not completed at that time, we
12	would adjourn the matter in public so the people would
13	know the next date.
14	Does the Village Clerk know when the next
15	hearing date is?

17	MR. GIBBONS: May 11.
