1 MR. SCALERO: Ladies and gentlemen, please 2 silence all pagers and cell phones. In the event of an emergency there are exits located in the rear of the 3 room. 4 MAYOR STRAUSS: Evening, ladies and gentlemen. 5 Thank you for coming out this evening. 6 7 We have one hearing and it is on rezoning of the Village by the Village, or for the Village. 8 9 Mr. Gibbons, can you read the proposed law? 10 MR. GIBBONS: Sure, Mayor. 11 "Proposed Local Law amending Section 550-16 of 12 the Municipal Code of the Incorporated Village of 13 Mineola, entitled 'M District (Light Manufacturing and 14 Industrial', to regulate marijuana retail stores (in the 15 event that the New York State Legislature legalizes the 16 recreational use of marijuana). 17 "550-16. M Districts (Light and Manufacturing and Industrial). 18 19 "Subsection E. In addition to the uses set 20 forth in subsections A, B, C and D of this 550-16, the 21 following uses shall be allowable in the M District: 22 "(1) Purposes and considerations. The Village 23 Board recognizes that several states have permitted the 24 distribution of marijuana for recreational purposes. 25 Village Board recognizes that the legalization of

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marijuana in New York is the subject of a current discussion and community forums organized by the State, and both the New York State Governor and New York State Commissioner of Health have recommended that the recreational use of marijuana be considered for legalization in New York. The Village Board is generally concerned that, despite any potential State regulation, marijuana may fall into the hands of those for whom it was not intended, such as children. For these reasons the Board finds that it is important and prudent to assure that marijuana related businesses are sufficiently distant from schools, parks, day care centers, houses of worship and residential zones. This 550-16E shall not be applicable to medical marijuana as defined in New York Public Health Law Section 3360 made available to patients through a medical marijuana dispensary authorized by the New York State Department of Health to dispense or distribute medical marijuana in accordance with Article 33 of the Public Health Law and Part 1004 of Title 10 of the New York Codes, Rules and Regulations. This 550-16E only pertains to marijuana for recreational purposes.

"(2) Definitions. As used in this Subsection E, the following term shall have the meaning indicated:

"Marijuana Retail Store: A building, structure or premises engaged in the sale, use or distribution of

marijuana and/or marijuana products for non-medical use. A building, structure or premises shall be considered a marijuana retail store regardless of whether products in addition to marijuana products are offered for sale, use or distribution at the building structure or premises, and regardless of the amount of marijuana or marijuana products available for sale, use or distribution at the building, structure or premises in comparison to other products offered for sale, use or distribution at the building, structure or premises.

- "(3) The use as defined in Subsection E(2) above is to be restricted as to location in the following manner in addition to any other requirements of this Code:
- "(a) The above use shall not be located within a two-hundred-foot radius of any area zoned for residential use.
- "(b) The above use shall not be located within a one-half-mile radius of any other such use.
- "(c) The above use shall not be located within a five-hundred-foot radius of any school, church or other place of religious worship, park, playground or playing field.
- "(4) The restriction enumerated in Subsection E(3) (b) "above --

1	And just to remind you, that restriction is:
2	The above use shall not be located within one-half-mile
3	radius of any other such use.
4	" may be waived by the Board of Trustees of
5	the Village if the applicant shows and the Board finds
6	that the following conditions have been met:
7	"(a) That the proposed use will not be contrary
8	to the public interest or injurious to nearby properties,
9	and that the spirit or intent of this Subsection E will
10	be observed.
11	"(b) That the establishment of an additional
12	use of this type in the area will not be contrary to any
13	program of neighborhood conservation or improvement,
14	either residential or non-residential.
15	"(5) No more than one of the uses as defined
16	above shall be located on any lot."
17	Mayor, there's also a corollary to that Local
18	Law, and that is:
19	"Proposed Local Law amending Section 550-3 of
20	the Municipal Code of the Incorporated Village of
21	Mineola, entitled 'Word Usage; Definitions', to define
22	'Marijuana' and 'Marijuana Product'.
23	"550-3 Word Usage; Definitions.
24	"(a) Word Usage. Words in this Chapter are
25	defined for the purpose thereof as follows: Words in the

present tense include the future; the singular number includes the plural and vice versa; the word 'lot' includes 'plot'; the word 'building' includes the word 'structure'; 'structure' shall be construed as though followed by the words 'or part thereof'; and the word shall is always mandatory.

"(b) Terms Defined. As used in this Chapter, unless the context or subject matter otherwise requires, the following words shall have the following meanings:

"Marijuana - The term marijuana shall have the same definition ascribed to marijuana in Section 3302 of the New York Public Health Law.

"Marijuana Product - Marijuana and/or any material, substance or other thing derived in any manner from marijuana, or which contains marijuana as a component part in any amount or concentration."

MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you.

Folks, in a nutshell, we're not looking to ban medical use of marijuana. Personally, to do so I think is foolish. If someone needs medical marijuana because of their condition, whether they're an adult or a child, they should get it. They should have access to it. It's heavily regulated currently by the State of New York. You have to be licensed. They only give out a certain amount of licenses, and if it's eased in that pharmacies

are allowed to provide medical marijuana to their patients, then I think they should do so. My personal opinion.

What we're looking to regulate here is the recreational -- re-zone here -- is the recreational use of marijuana. We're not banning it. We're just simply saying: If you want to sell it in the Village of Mineola, by all means, you're welcome in the M zone, down in our industrial area.

Deputy Mayor?

MR. PEREIRA: Thank you, Mayor.

Couple of things. I have a question for Mr. Gibbons.

Mr. Gibbons, so according to this, a business that is currently selling vaping products and oils and things of that nature, pods, JUULs, although they are grandfathered in their prior nonconforming use, they can not now begin to sell marijuana products. They would have to move.

 $$\operatorname{MR}.$$ GIBBONS: They would have to be in the M zone to sell marijuana, yes.

MR. PEREIRA: OK. My second question to you is: One of our M zones abuts another residential village. That 200 feet would take that village into consideration?

MR. GIBBONS: Yes.

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MR. PEREIRA: OK. That's our neighbors to the north, East Williston.

And finally, on a personal note, I think it behooves us to do this preemptively. Of course what's coming out of Albany, all indications are that marijuana use will be legalized, which brings me to something else, and the language, and we're using the language, and I wish we didn't have to.

You know, you hear a lot about the recreational use of marijuana. When I think of recreation I think of my kids playing and doing something for fun. We don't say: Recreational drinking. We don't have liquor stores and we call them recreational liquor stores, or recreational smoke shops. I wish that we would stop using the word recreational because it's a serious drug, just like alcohol is, just like tobacco is, and just like opioids are. They're regulated, and they're legal, and they are dispensed in a way that's controlled and overseen, whether it be by the Department of Health or the State Liquor Authority. But I think it's a misnomer to label it -- and I know that the media and proponents like to label it -- as recreational marijuana use. I don't think it is recreational, just like alcohol is not recreational. If someone chooses to drink, there are

things they shouldn't choose to do, such as drive. And if someone chooses to ingest marijuana, whether it be through smoking it, or eating it, or any other way, or vaping it, that there are things that they shouldn't be

doing either.

So that's just my kind of personal opinion, and I wish that we would get away from that as a country, as a state, and here too.

But this is all, of course, contingent on what looks like, as I said, the legalization of marijuana use in the state. And we are being proactive by protecting our quality of life and by making sure that, you know, these businesses are away from schools, away from parks, away from where families and children gather.

And the question may be: Well, why don't you do that for liquor stores or other businesses? Because we don't have the authority to do that, right, because the State Liquor Authority grants permits to a liquor store. We don't. We can't control where a liquor store goes. And perhaps that may happen some day with these businesses as well. We don't know that. But at this point it hasn't happened, and I think it's smart of us to do this. OK.

As the Mayor said, we're not putting restrictions on medicinal use of marijuana, or any

medicinal dispensaries that may come down in the future. And we're not banning, as other government entities have done, banning the use of something that potentially could be legal within this next year. It's not really for us to decide. If the State decides that it's legal, then it's legal, and we have to abide by that. And I think that we have to respect business owners that want to come into the community and invest and open up a business, whatever that business is. But we have to make sure that it's done responsibly.

So I am in favor of this, and hopefully we won't have to enforce it. That would be great. That would be great.

Thank you, Mayor.

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MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you.

Trustee Cusato.

MR. CUSATO: Good evening, everybody.

You know, I don't know how much more I could add to what's already been said. It looks to me that the state is pushing forward on this matter. Today's Newsday: Governor Makes Pot Pitch. You know what, we need to react to this potential decision, and we need to be prepared, and we need to protect our community.

You know, when you can walk into a delicatessen and buy six cans of beer, no one says anything and the

1 result can be the same thing. You know. So I'm in favor 2 of our proposal. 3 MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you. Trustee Durham. 5 MR. DURHAM: Thank you. Thank you all for coming out tonight. 6 7 I'm also in favor of doing this, take and keep it contained in an area that's not going to affect --8 it's going to be away from the schools, away from 9 10 churches. If somebody wants to go into the area and 11 purchase the stuff for their recreational -- as Mr. 12 Pereira said, I shouldn't say recreational -- for their private consumption and use, so be it, that they can take 13 and go there and purchase it if it comes to that. But we 14 15 need to take and keep it away from the general area where 16 our youth are and have it in an area where if somebody 17 wants to go and purchase it that they can. 18 So I'm in favor of what we're doing. 19 MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you. 20 Trustee Walsh. 21 MR. WALSH: Thank you, Mayor. 22 What we're doing here tonight, and what we have 23 to remember what we're doing here tonight, is code 24 change. That's what we're doing. We're doing a code 25 change.

1	I think it's a good code change. I think it's
2	a necessary code change. And I think that we should
3	address this tonight with a vote.
4	And that's all I have to say. Thank you.
5	MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you.
6	I'll open up to public comment. I ask anybody
7	wishing to speak, please approach the podium, state your
8	name and your address for the reporter.
9	Anybody in the first row? Second row? Third
10	row? Fourth row? Fifth row? Sixth row? Seventh row?
11	Sir?
12	MR. ERIC: Hello. Jay Eric, 28 Chester Street.
13	MR. CUSATO: 28 Chester Street?
14	MR. ERIC: Chester Street.
15	MAYOR STRAUSS: What town is that?
16	MR. ERIC: Locust Valley.
17	MAYOR STRAUSS: Locust Valley.
18	MR. ERIC: Do any one of you know what today is
19	the anniversary of?
20	MR. CUSATO: Sorry?
21	MR. ERIC: Do you know what today is the
22	anniversary of?
23	MR. PEREIRA: January 16th
24	MAYOR STRAUSS: No.
25	MR. ERIC: The Volstead Act. Prohibition. And

1 you know what? It was the 18th amendment. 2 You know what the 21st amendment is? 3 MR. PEREIRA: Repealing it. MR. ERIC: The repeal. 4 Why? 5 It doesn't work. Marijuana prohibition doesn't 6 work. It does more harm than good. 7 Now there's two things I know to be true. 8 9 New York State is going to legalize marijuana and, two, you're going to pass your local ordinance. I think 10 that's a forgone conclusion -- can you hear over there? 11 MR. GIBBONS: Yes. 12 MR. ERIC: So you're going to pass this. 13 What I think you need to know is: 14 conversations always come down to the children. Always. 15 I think everyone up here, most people agree, if an adult 16 wants to use marijuana in the privacy of their home most 17 people don't have a big problem with that. 18 What you need to remember is why kids use 19 marijuana. About a third of kids, since they've been 20 21 keeping records, will try it. About ten percent will do it, and about five to eight percent of our population 22 will become addicted to something. 23 24 Children use marijuana. First reason is

because their peers do it. Second reason is because

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their parents do it. And the third is availability.

I could walk into Mineola High School, any of the colleges, my high school, Levittown Division, and get marijuana in about five minutes. You're not stopping the availability. You're giving it a bad onus.

I understand you're not in favor of it being near a school. I don't think anyone -- you brought up the alcohol, liquor stores. You don't regulate liquor stores not because you can't, which you can't, but no one is going to buy marijuana simply because a store is near. It's not done that way. They won't be allowed. It'll be against the law for children to go into any place. They won't be allowed in.

And this whole idea that we need to keep it away from churches like it's dangerous, like it's radioactive or something.

So my basic message is: It's not going to be a problem. Every state that's legalized it, ripple effect minor. No problem.

That's it. Thank you.

MAYOR STRAUSS: We don't believe the sky is going to fall if it's legalized. We just want to control it a little bit in our Village. Thank you.

Anybody else in the seventh row? Yes, sir.

MR. GRILO: My name is Joe Grilo, 318 Wellington Road, here in beautiful Mineola.

Just one statement that was said, that this gentleman could go into Mineola High School and in five minutes pick up marijuana. I don't know if that's true or not but, by inferring that, I think he's giving our wonderful school district a bad name. I don't think that's going to happen, walking into Mineola High School and pick up marijuana.

This law is fantastic. We don't know what's going to happen in the future, but we have to be prepared. And by going to changing the code, being prepared, we'll be ready to see what happens when this finally evolves.

I'm a long-time resident of Mineola. We have all our laws and regulations, and it's those laws and regulations that are making this the greatest place, in my opinion, to live. And I think this is just going to add to our safety and our well-being and our happiness in this community.

Thank you very much for the effort that you've made. Thank you.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you, Mr. Grilo.

Folks, like any law, if this gets passed tonight, it can be altered in the future. If there is a

1	need for it and there is a different opinion of the
2	issue, it can always be adjusted.
3	Anybody else wishing to make public comment?
4	Yes, sir?
5	MR. HOARE: Frank Hoare, 374 Beebe Road,
.6	Mineola.
7	I heard I don't know where I heard it from.
8	My son, who is in law enforcement, said it. He heard
9	that the Town of North Hempstead is banning the sale of
10	marijuana; is that true?
11	MAYOR STRAUSS: That's what I
12	MR. GIBBONS: Yes.
13	MAYOR STRAUSS: That's my understanding.
14	MR. HOARE: Now what's the affect on us, then?
15	MR. GIBBONS: There is none. As far as I know,
16	the ban, what the town does, does not regulate
17	incorporated villages. They only deal with the
18	unincorporated parts of the town.
19	MR. HOARE: All right. OK. So, but if we
20	now say we wanted to ban it, would that
21	Not that we are or we aren't. I mean, what
22	you're doing is fine.
23	is that a precedent that we could, since the
24	town is banning it?
25	MAYOR STRAUSS: I don't think that would be a

wise move, but I'll defer to our counsel. 1 2 MR. GIBBONS: We're waiting to see how the particular legislation evolves. 3 The governor mentioned yesterday there might be 4 an opt-out provision for certain municipalities who don't 5 want it within their borders. We kind of have to wait 6 7 and see how it goes and, as the Mayor said, react when we see the legislation. 8 9 MR. HOARE: OK. Thank you. 10 MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you. Anybody else wishing to make public comment? 11. Yes sir. 12 13 MR. MORTENSEN: Dennis Mortensen, 300 Andrews Road. 14 15 Mayor, Trustees, Honorable Counsel, I'm here to 16 talk to you about our favorite neighbor, CVS. 17 MAYOR STRAUSS: And we're having a hearing 18 about marijuana law re-zoning. MR. MORTENSEN: I am so sorry. 19 MAYOR STRAUSS: That's OK. 20 We'll have a public meeting at 7:30. 21 22 MR. MORTENSEN: Oh. Well then I'll say my piece about marijuana. 23 24 MAYOR STRAUSS: Have at it. 25 MR. MORTENSEN: How about it.

We realize that there's parks in the east end of Mineola, football fields, a school. I don't think that's a good area. I think if you decide to allow this, it should be like Windsor Avenue and etcetera, because the only thing that would be close to that would be the East Williston ball field.

MAYOR STRAUSS: All right. Thank you.

Anybody else wishing to make comment?

Anybody from the Board wishing to make comment?

MR. PEREIRA: Mayor, if I could, just to address the issue before.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Yes.

MR. PEREIRA: I don't think I did, and I don't think anybody on the Board today made a moral judgment on legalizing versus keeping marijuana illegal, elicit.

Many of us probably believe that perhaps that's the way it's going anyway.

What we're doing here, as Mr. Walsh said, is really dealing with a zoning regulation and, hence, is why we don't have to follow North Hempstead's lead. We control our own zoning. And just like we -- and those of you who come to meetings here -- we control body shops and spray booths and all of those things, where they can go. In a similar way we control where any number of

businesses are allowed. We have B-1 districts, M-1 districts, residential, R-1's, R-2's, two-family homes, etcetera. That's what zoning is all about.

And I think, in a way, it may actually help someone who is opening up this type of business. They may not want to be on Jericho where there may be some stigma associated, at least initially, with someone walking in and out of these types of businesses. So perhaps in the M-1 district people will be more apt to shop in these types of locations because they may not want to see their neighbors seeing them coming in and out of these places.

But as the Mayor said, that's now. It could be two years from now, five years from now, ten years from now, it could be, as Mr. Cusato said, people can buy it at the deli. We don't know that. We don't know what the state is going to mandate, how they are going to allow --how much flexibility they're going to allow local municipalities. We may be doing this for nothing, but I'm glad that we're doing it so that we can always go back and adjust it if we have to. But if we're not ahead of the game, then we leave ourselves compromised going forward. And you can see other municipalities, you know, not having it and people flocking there.

So this is not really, for me at least, it's

not a matter of whether I agree personally or not with the legalization of so-called recreational marijuana.

That's not the factor here. The factor is about zoning and about maintaining the character of this Village as we see it.

And as I said before, and the gentleman brought up Prohibition, if we -- we're not able to regulate liquor stores. We're not able to dictate where they go. If we could, most municipalities probably would have a say where they think liquor stores can go. Right? And in this case right now, we do have some control. So I think it's imperative that we exercise our local control to formulate our community as we best see fit, those of us who live here, those of us who have lived here for our entire lives.

But I also think -- I agree with the Mayor that I don't think that it would be smart to just outright ban something that the state is going to legalize because that's just not going to stand up in court.

Thank you, Mayor.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you.

Anybody else wish to make comment?

I'll entertain a motion to approve the law and the change to the existing law.
