17	Ladies and gentlemen, this will be the format
18	for this evening's hearing: The applicant will make
19	their presentation. There will be an interaction with
20	the Board, and then we'll open it up for public comment
21	and questions.
22	I ask anybody that's approaching the podium to
23	please speak slowly and clearly for the reporter and
24	state your name and affiliation and address.
25	Who is up? Sir?

1 MR. BJORNEBY: Good evening to the Board.

My name is Eric Bjorneby, architect, from EAB Architectural Designs, 4250 Veteran's Highway, Holbrook, New York 11741.

I'm the architect of record. We filed an application to change an existing occupancy of medical into an optical-medical office with retail in the front.

The project is on the corner of Lincoln and Mineola Boulevard. It's zoned B-2 business. The first floor is approximately 1,415 square feet and the basement is 621 square feet. About approximately 40 percent of the first floor will be used for retail. The rest of the space will be used for medical examinations, eye examinations. There's a small lab and it's pretty much all related to an optical store.

The majority of the work is the interior, partition work. And the building I believe was — there's an application from 1992 that had changed the occupancy to medical. So it's been medical use since 1992. The proposed optical store is moving from an existing location at 145 Mineola Boulevard. So it's only moving a few blocks north.

The hours of operation will be from Tuesday through Thursday from 10:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m., on Wednesdays and Fridays from 10:00 to 6:00, Saturday would

1	be 10:00 to 4:00, and they are closed Sundays and
2	Mondays.
3	They expect to have three to four employees per
4	day on average. Two of those employees take the Long
5	Island Railroad, which is approximately six blocks away.
6	The existing site has five on-site parking spaces as well
7	as, beyond the corner, they have ample off-site parking.
8	And it's an optical-medical space, and there's
9	no hazardous materials that will be disposed of on a
10	regular basis.
11	MAYOR STRAUSS: OK. Thank you.
12	How many clients will there be at once?
13	If you could approach the podium and state your
14	name, address and affiliation.
15	MS. NAPOLITANO: My name is Melania Napolitano.
16	I'm the owner.
17	We see about we schedule patients every 20
18	minutes. So we see about three patients an hour.
19	MAYOR STRAUSS: So you're moving to a bigger
20	facility?
21	MS. NAPOLITANO: Yes.
22	MAYOR STRAUSS: Great. You're doing well.
23	MS. NAPOLITANO: Thank you.
24	MAYOR STRAUSS: And thanks for staying in
25	Mineola.

1	MS. NAPOLITANO: No problem.
2	MAYOR STRAUSS: Deputy Mayor?
3	MR. PEREIRA: No. No questions, Mayor. This
4	seems like a pretty straightforward application.
5	MAYOR STRAUSS: Trustee
6	MR. PEREIRA: I only have one question.
7	The foot care is out, then. It's going to be
8	only occupied by this new business.
9	MR. BJORNEBY: Correct.
10	MR. PEREIRA: OK. That's it.
11	THE COURT: Trustee Cusato?
12	MR. CUSATO: Yes.
13	So, was your office next to Kuck's Deli? Is
14	that you?
15	MS. NAPOLITANO: Yes.
16	MR. CUSATO: OK. So you're moving, like, four
17	blocks down?
18	MS. NAPOLITANO: Yes.
19	MR. CUSATO: OK. Thank you.
20	MAYOR STRAUSS: Trustee Durham?
21	MR. DURHAM: I have no questions.
22	MAYOR STRAUSS: Trustee Walsh?
23	MR. WALSH: Yes. This seems to be a good use
24	for that area. I have no questions, Mayor. Thank you.
25	MAYOR STRAUSS: Great. Thank you.

1 If you would sit down, sir, we'll open up for 2 public comment. Don't go too far. 3 Anybody in the first row? Second row? Third Fourth row? Fifth row? 4 5 Yes, ma'am. 6 MS. DAMATO: My name is Deborah Damato. 7 at 205 Mineola Boulevard. 8 And my question is, when there was the 9 podiatrist in there, we had a very big problem at 205 10 Mineola Boulevard exiting the back of our building 11 because of all the traffic and the lack of parking spaces behind this new building. I don't know the address. 12 1.3 my concern is the same. How do I get out of my building 14 so that I can get onto the street without having an 15 accident? Because you've got the deli with trucks. 16 You've got very limited spots. I think you will have only five. And there's no parking on the street. It's 17 18 alternate parking. So that's my concern. 19 MAYOR STRAUSS: So what would you suggest would 20 be the answer for the parking? 21 The cars that are currently preventing you from 22 exiting the rear of 205 Mineola Boulevard, are they 2.3 legally parked? 24 Not always. MS. DAMATO: 25 MAYOR STRAUSS: Have we reached out to law

1 enforcement, or. . . 2 MS. DAMATO: Many times. 3 MAYOR STRAUSS: -- or complained to us? I haven't gotten a phone call from anybody in 4 5 the building --6 MS. DAMATO: You've gotten e-mails from me over 7 the course of --MAYOR STRAUSS: Which we addressed with the 8 9 parking sign. Didn't we have an adjustment for the 10 parking --MS. DAMATO: Yes. 11 12 MAYOR STRAUSS: -- sign? 13 So that's been taken care of. MS. DAMATO: Well the sign is there, but people 14 15 still park there. And I called -- I think the quy's name is Lenny -- whenever I am frustrated enough because cars 16 were parked there, even though the sign is there. And if 17 you go closer to the building on both sides of the street 18 19 there's still -- I guess my bottom line is: We need to enforce it. If there's no parking on Monday, Wednesday 20 21 and Friday, then that's the only day cars, you know, 22 should or shouldn't be there, and I don't feel that it is 2.3 being enforced properly. 24 I'm very thrilled. I've been to your store. Ι

had no idea that you were the person. And great for

Mineola, absolutely. But we need to make sure. When the podiatrist was there -- not to say it will be the same -- but you had cars parked and then patients would park behind that. So it was a total traffic jam. And especially if there was a delivery truck at the same time making deliveries to the store. People like myself -- who are retired, so I leave my house any time of day -- I couldn't get out. So that's my concern.

MAYOR STRAUSS: OK.

MS. DAMATO: And I hope -- I guess the message is -- the code enforcement does something.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Absolutely. Just so you know, ma'am, we hired a parking supervisor for the Village.

We're increasing our parking enforcement team. So there will be more enforcement throughout the Village, downtown, Jericho Turnpike, side streets, and hopefully yours too, and we'll enforce the code that's there.

Hopefully you'll get some relief.

MS. DAMATO: Yes. You know, I have to share a story because it really -- I was -- the Italian restaurant, I don't know the name of it, it's nearby your store.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Nick's?

MS. DAMATO: Nick's. OK.

I was waiting for the light at that

2	street is and the code enforcer was coming off of Mineola
3	Boulevard and the florist who is no longer there as
4	far as I can tell parked where it said "no parking
5	from here to corner". They parked, and the code enforcer
6	and the Mineola florist guy waved. And I'm like, really?
7	That to me is just not the way it should be.
8	So I leave that with you.

MS. ARMAND: Thank you.

Hi. How are you? My name is Regina Armand and I'm here with my business partner, Pierre, and we're looking to open our aerial dance and fitness studio in Mineola. My home address is 233-09 Neptune Avenue, Rosedale, New York 11434.

So a little bit about me. I have a background in dance and fitness, and over the past eight years I've been studying, teaching and competing in aerial arts in Manhattan. More recently, over the past five years, I've been teaching out in Long Island and Queens.

Basically, the number one question is: What is aerial art? So basically, aerial art is just a form of dance and fitness that takes place with equipment in the air. So it's like similar to Cirque du Soleil, if you think about the stuff hanging or the hoop, but just geared more towards the everyday person.

So not only do we specialize in aerial arts, some of our other, like, popular classes include, like, yoga, zumba, handstands, dance classes, as well as flexibility classes.

So we've found, like, a really great space in Mineola. And I'm happy to answer any other questions or concerns that you guys have.

1	MAYOR STRAUSS: All right. Thank you for
2	choosing Mineola. We really appreciate it. Hopefully
3	you'll be successful here and you'll find a home.
4	What are your hours of operation?
5	MS. ARMAND: Hours of operation will be Monday
6	through Friday from 5:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m., on Saturdays
7	and Sundays it would be from 9:00 a.m. until 3:00 p.m.
8	MAYOR STRAUSS: You know you're going to fight
9	with Jericho Terrace, right? Parking?
10	MS. ARMAND: We're hoping we could, like, you
11	know, be in business with them. I feel like it would be
12	a really good
13	MAYOR STRAUSS: They're a great partner.
14	MS. ARMAND: Yes.
15	MR. WALSH: I'm sorry. I didn't hear on
16	Saturday. What time on Saturday?
17	MS. ARMAND: Saturdays from 9:00 to 3:00 p.m.
18	MR. WALSH: Thank you.
19	MAYOR STRAUSS: How many staff will you have on
20	hand?
21	MS. ARMAND: We will start up with six people
22	on staff, including myself and my business partner.
23	MAYOR STRAUSS: Do you have a following? Do
24	you have a core group already?
25	MS. ARMAND: Yes.

1	MAYOR STRAUSS: How big is that?
2	MS. ARMAND: It's about maybe anywhere from 20
3	to 50 clients, loyal clients, who are based in Mineola as
4	well as other surrounding areas.
5	MAYOR STRAUSS: Great.
6	Now, you're on Horton Highway attached to the
7	Nude Furniture place on the corner.
8	MS. ARMAND: Yes.
9	MAYOR STRAUSS: How many spots behind that
10	building do you have?
11	MS. ARMAND: So there's currently 30 spots
12	behind there and it's shared between the tenants.
13	Currently there are only two tenants, though. The
14	furniture store is no one is there right now. But
15	there are 30 spots. And then there's also parking on
16	Jericho, as well as the side streets, and none of those
17	are in front of any residential houses.
18	MAYOR STRAUSS: All right. OK.
19	Deputy Mayor?
20	MR. PEREIRA: Thank you.
21	And this is currently the photography place.
22	MS. ARMAND: Elegancia. So the
23	MR. PEREIRA: Wedding party.
24	MS. ARMAND: Yes. It's like event planning.
25	MR. PEREIRA: Right. Right. And it used to be

the trophy place, for those that remember that. 1 2 This seems pretty -- again, a good use of that space. I have seen some of this stuff, and I've 3 heard about it. It almost gives me pain just to think 4 about it but, if people want to do it, that sounds good. 5 6 Music, this would be contained within the 7 facility. And there is a business south of you and 8 there's a business north of you. There are no residents 9 abutting your property. So I don't think that would be -- but you're not going to have doors open --10 MS. ARMAND: 11 Yes. MR. PEREIRA: -- and music blasting. 12 MS. ARMAND: Absolutely. Yes. 13 14 MR. PEREIRA: Now you said you have 20 to 50 15 people who are followers, but they're not all going to 16 show up at the same time. 17 MS. ARMAND: Exactly. 18 MR. PEREIRA: How many people per class 19 traditionally? MS. ARMAND: So traditionally we'll have three 20 21 different rooms. In one room the max will be three 22 clients. In the other room the max will be ten. And then in the last room the max would be ten as well. 23 2.4 at max we'll have 25 people in the building at once, and

it could be as small as three people as well.

1	MR. PEREIRA: Right. That's ideally.
2	MS. ARMAND: Yes.
3	MR. PEREIRA: And we hope that happens for you.
4	MS. ARMAND: Thank you.
5	MR. PEREIRA: Yes. I don't see a problem with
6	this.
7	Thanks, Mayor.
8	MAYOR STRAUSS: Trustee Cusato?
9	MR. CUSATO: Good evening.
10	MS. ARMAND: Hi.
11	MR. CUSATO: I have no problem with your
12	request.
13	So, how does this differ from the normal marine
14	barracks training? You know, the new stuff called
15	marine
16	MS. ARMAND: I'm not familiar with it.
17	MR. PEREIRA: I think he's talking about, like,
18	cross-fit.
19	MS. ARMAND: Oh. Cross-fit. It's very
20	similar. It ties over very nicely, except this one is
21	done with equipment. With more of, like, cross-fit,
22	they're very focused on, I feel like, more strength. But
23	this is more like for fun and extracurricular and things
24	like that. So it's similar but different.
25	MR. CUSATO: So you're hanging off the ceiling.

1 I mean, what --MS. ARMAND: I actually brought -- you know, 2 it's very good to see a visual representation. I did 3 4 bring in some photos. MR. CUSATO: Again, I have no -- I'm just 5 6 trying to understand. 7 MS. ARMAND: No. Of course. Of course. 8 That's why I brought this, just in case. So I brought 9 some photos which anyone here can see as well. Is it OK 10 if I just hand it to you guys? MAYOR STRAUSS: Yes. Give it to Mr. Scalero. 11 12 MS. ARMAND: Some of them came out blurry. You can blame UPS for that one. But that's me and that's 13 14 also my six year-old niece who I train in aerial arts as 15 well. And then -- so it's just an idea of what you can 16 see of pretty much what we do. 17 MR. CUSATO: All right. Thank you so much. 18 MS. ARMAND: You're welcome. 19 MR. CORBETT: And if the Board's OK, I'd like to make a motion to buy Mr. Cusato a membership. 20 21 MR. CUSATO: But I have vertigo issues. 22 MAYOR STRAUSS: You won't fall. You're tied up. 23 Anything else, Mr. Cusato? MR. CUSATO: I'm fine. Thank you. 2.4 MAYOR STRAUSS: Trustee Durham? 25

1	MR. DURHAM: Thank you.
2	So it's all non-weight related. So it's all
3	stretching and with the aerial things with the
4	MS. ARMAND: Yes, that's correct.
5	MR. DURHAM: So there's no weights. There's no
6	banging of weights that would affect the neighborhood or
7	anything like that?
8	MS. ARMAND: No, No banging.
9	MR. DURHAM: That's it.
10	MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you.
11	Trustee Walsh?
12	MR. WALSH: Yes. Thank you.
13	Now, just a few questions. You are the owner
14	of the business?
15	MS. ARMAND: Yes. Co-owner.
16	MR. WALSH: I was just going to say: What
17	about this poor individual over here who hasn't gotten to
18	say a word yet. He's a partner with you in the business,
19	right?
20	MS. ARMAND: Yes, he is.
21	MR. WALSH: Pierre; is that correct?
22	MS. ARMAND: Yes.
23	MR. WALSH: Good luck, Pierre. I haven't heard
24	a word. You're fine sitting there.
25	You know, you currently have a business now, is

1 that correct, or you don't have a business? 2 MS. ARMAND: I do. Like, my -- I teach at 3 other studios. So I don't currently have my own 4 business, but I teach at other aerial studios where I --5 MR. WALSH: So you're a teacher and this is 6 your first venture into a business. 7 MS. ARMAND: Yes. 8 MR. WALSH: You know, I certainly wish you luck 9 because we sit here often, for years and years, and see people start businesses and -- this is different than 10 I've seen before -- people sometimes invest a lot of 11 12 their money and don't make it. You know. And I wish you luck, if the application is approved. And you know, 13 sometimes it's because they're repetitive things. Yours 14 15 seems to be a little different. If you have a following, 16 you know, maybe you'll make it. I hope you do. 17 you luck. 18 MS. ARMAND: Thank you so much. 19 MAYOR STRAUSS: Anything else, ma'am? 20 MS. ARMAND: No. MAYOR STRAUSS: You can have a seat. We'll 21 22 open up to public comment. . 23 Anybody in the second row? Third row? Fourth row? Fifth row? 24 25 Yes, ma'am.

MS. BENEDETTO: Good evening. My name is Linda 1 2 Benedetto. I live at 241 Horton Highway, Mineola. 3 I like the idea of what you do. Sounds really 4 cool and a fun thing. 5 My question is that I don't really -- my 6 statement is that I don't really think it's a good 7 location for it. 8 I've lived on -- I've been in my house for 9 about 45 years, and it is a very busy street. We have 10 Chaminade people coming -- I know during the day you won't be there. But we still have people visiting the 11 hospital. Winthrop is at the end of my street, and 12 13 there's a lot of traffic going there. 14 As it is, we have a very long red light and 15 that builds up a lot of cars waiting to make left turns, 16 right turns, or go straight, and sometimes they come down 17 all the way to my house. I'm maybe the tenth house down, and they're lined up. And they start honking. They're 18 19 making U-turns to try to not wait anymore for that red light to make turns around. And I don't think with 20 people coming -- if you're going to have maybe 25 people 21 22 in your class, possibly --23 MAYOR STRAUSS: Ma'am, if you'd address us. 24 MS. BENEDETTO: Oh. I'm sorry.

MAYOR STRAUSS: That's OK.

MS. BENEDETTO: I'm sorry. I don't want her to think that I don't like what she's doing. I was trying to talk to her. OK.

But I'm concerned with the parking. If people will be coming off or being dropped off, I don't think there's going to be enough parking spots there in that lot there, and I don't think everyone who maybe would be dropping someone off will go into the lot. I think they're going to be stopping there, I think, to let their students or whoever the people are that they're driving get out. And already we sometimes have delivery trucks for the Nude Furniture that don't come into the lot, or stop there, or people picking up furniture from the Nude Furniture place --

There's a side door where you can take furniture. I bought things from them. So I know you can use their side door.

-- and they kind of stop there or will double-park there. And there are cars coming left -- I mean making a right turn or a left turn that can't even get into Horton Highway as it is.

I'm just concerned with more people coming to that area that are going to be stopping or waiting to pick up kids. I'm thinking of dance studios. I won't look at you anymore. I just think it will create more of

a problem there. That's my main concern.

Like I said before: I think it's a great idea, but maybe in a different spot. I don't think that's the kind of place that, with a lot of people coming and going, and cars, I don't think it should be there. I don't think it works. As you all know, we have a lot of problems already with Mineola and parking and traffic. So that's all.

MAYOR STRAUSS: It's a popular and busy place, Mineola.

MS. BENEDETTO: Yes, it is. It is. But we want to make it nice for the people who live there. And to have to come down my street or wait, having cars constantly in front of my street because somebody is blocking the way and cars can't get right or left onto Jericho, it isn't good. So I'm concerned with that.

MR. WALSH: Can I ask a question?
MAYOR STRAUSS: Yes.

MR. WALSH: I was just wondering -- I'm aware of the problem that you're talking about also. I drive down there every day. But do you find these problems to be during the day or at night? More so during the day, heavy traffic hours?

MS. BENEDETTO: On Saturday, with the weddings, yes.

1	MR. WALSH: But that's the problem of Jericho
2	Terrace, not the other business. But what I'm trying to
3	MS. BENEDETTO: But where would these people
4	park, or where
5	MR. WALSH: What I'm trying to say is that
6	between 5:00 p.m. and 10:00 p.m. most of the stores in
7	that area are closed.
8	MS. BENEDETTO: Yes.
9	MR. WALSH: So it's not like they're competing
10	for parking with the stores in the area.
11	Now Jericho Terrace is a hole other kettle of
12	fish, and that doesn't involve their application.
13	MS. BENEDETTO: On Saturday it would.
14	MR. WALSH: No. But Jericho Terrace is a
15	separate situation. It brings traffic to the area.
16	MS. BENEDETTO: I'm not talking about Jericho
17	Terrace.
18	MR. WALSH: I was just wondering if your
19	problem was more so during the day than at night.
20	MS. BENEDETTO: Saturday.
21	MR. WALSH: No. No. Monday to Friday.
22	MS. BENEDETTO: Well she's only there on the
23	evenings during the week, right? So that shouldn't be a
24	big problem, but
25	MP WALSH. Recause they come in at 5.00 at

1 night --2 MS. BENEDETTO: I know. 3 MR. WALSH: -- to 10:00 at night. 4 MS. BENEDETTO: Yes. 5 MR. DURHAM: Saturdays they're done at 3:00. 6 MS. BENEDETTO: From when? 9:00 till --7 MR. DURHAM: 9:00 to 3:00. 8 MS. BENEDETTO: Till 3:00. 9 MR. WALSH: 9:00 to 3:00 on Saturday. 10 MS. BENEDETTO: OK. I just --11 MAYOR STRAUSS: No. No. We appreciate it. We 12 appreciate your time, absolutely. MR. WALSH: I'm just asking when you see it 13 14 more. 15 MS. BENEDETTO: It is mostly during the day, 16 but it does happen in the evening because the after 17 school sports people are coming up Horton Highway to get out from different -- visiting schools, and our own local 18 19 parents, they have to park somewhere for Chaminade, which 20 I know is a big problem, and also for the Winthrop people 21 come up my street to go home and it builds up cars 22 because of that long red light. Maybe we can fix the 2.3 light and it would be helpful, but I'm just concerned with the traffic up at the corner and not being able to 24

turn right or left, come in, come out, and people parking

1 and honking in front of me house because they can't get 2 to where they want to go. That's all. 3 MAYOR STRAUSS: All right. Thank you, ma'am. 4 Appreciate it. 5 MS. BENEDETTO: OK. You're welcome. 6 MAYOR STRAUSS: Anybody else in the fifth row? 7 MS. GRASER: Good evening, gentlemen. My name 8 is Jacqueline Graser. I live on 244 Horton Highway for 9 45 years, and my main concern is the parking, the 10 traffic, as Mrs. Benedetto explained. I agree with every 11 bit of it. 12 Between the terrace, the furniture store, and 13 now having two dance schools from Monday to Sunday? 14 is horrible. You cannot turn. They're delivering. 15 have to wait. Trucks. Traffic. Left. Right. Coming 16 from Horton Highway down. The ambulances going to the 17 hospital. It's unbelievable. It's too much traffic, too 18 much congestion in that corner. Something has to be 19 done. 20 I don't mind the school, but the parking. 21 Where are they going to park? And the traffic and two schools from Monday to Sunday. 22 MAYOR STRAUSS: Ma'am, they have parking behind 23 24 the building, and they have parking on Jericho Turnpike 25 on both sides of Horton Highway.

1	MS. GRASER: They all come and park in front of
2	my house, even halfway in my driveway on the side, on
3	Jefferson. This is a constant parking lot there
4	MAYOR STRAUSS: All right. Folks, if anybody
5	is
6	MS. GRASER: From Monday to Sunday.
7	MAYOR STRAUSS: if anybody is illegally
8	parking anywhere, you need to notify the Police
9	Department and have them respond.
10	MS. GRASER: But I do. I do.
11	MAYOR STRAUSS: OK. And I hope they come and
12	they address the matter.
13	MS. GRASER: They don't even respect the sign.
14	They park across the street like they don't care. Like
15	today somebody got a ticket and I said: Good. At least
16	somebody is doing something.
17	MAYOR STRAUSS: Right.
18	MS. GRASER: But with this now, two schools,
19	and 15 I heard 50, I'm sometimes having trouble with
20	my ears. I mean, where are they going to park? They
21	cannot park
22	MAYOR STRAUSS: What's the other school you're
23	talking about?
24	MR. PEREIRA: What schools? What two schools?
25	You're saying: Two schools. What two schools?

1	Are you talking about Chaminade?
2	That's not a school. It's a dance studio.
3	MS. GRASER: Aerial dance and fitness.
4	MR. PEREIRA: It's a studio. It's not a
5	school.
6	MS. GRASER: OK. Well, studio, school.
7	MR. PEREIRA: And what's the other one? You're
8	saying two schools. What's the other school? You're
9	saying two schools, which two schools?
10	MS. GRASER: Aerial dance
11	MR. PEREIRA: It's all one business.
12	MS. GRASER: and gym.
13	MR. PEREIRA: No gym.
14	MAYOR STRAUSS: It's the same thing. It's not
15	a gym.
16	MR. PEREIRA: It's the same business.
17	MR. DURHAM: Same business.
18	MR. PEREIRA: It's the same business.
19	And if I may, for both you and Ms. Benedetto, I
20	understand, you know and same thing with the previous
21	hearing. This is an opportunity
22	MS. GRASER: I mean, if they're going to stay
23	away from our street and we're not going to have trouble
24	with the parking and all, they can open two schools. The
25	problem is the congestion, always, from Monday to Sunday.

1 You come home from Jericho Turnpike to make your street, 2 cars on both sides. And this is going to happen. 3 is going to happen even worse now. 4 MR. WALSH: They're not open on Sunday. 5 MR. PEREIRA: Ma'am, may I say something? 6 I? 7 And I understand the frustration. Same thing 8 with the last application. There's an application here 9 for a business to open where a business existed for 10 decades, right? I know. MS. GRASER: 11 12 MR. PEREIRA: OK. 13 MS. GRASER: But --1.4 MR. PEREIRA: Can I finish, please? And I think -- because I've been here for over 15 16 40 years as well -- I think that you would be 17 hard-pressed to find a better business and better 18 business hours to help your issues, rather than to 19 complicate them. I think that these hours, 5:00 p.m. to 20 10:00 p.m., actually are probably the most beneficial 21 business operation that you could find to help you with 22 that because it runs counter to the rest of the 23 businesses when they are at their busiest. 24 This could be a doctor's office. This could be 25 a law office. This could be any number of businesses as

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of right. It used to be the trophy place, now it's a wedding planning place, which are open from 9:00 to 5:00 Monday through Saturday. This is 5:00 p.m. when, as Ms. Benedetto says, most of the problems probably happen during the day and are over by 5:00 or 6:00.

Although Mrs. Armand said that, you know, she can fit ten here, and ten here, and three here, and six there, those would be under ideal conditions. I don't think, under the best circumstances, she's going to expect 30 cars to pull up in any one-hour period.

So those are issues that we will deal with in terms of code enforcement. And you as residents can, you know, inform us that these things are going on when people park illegally. And as the Mayor said, call the police every single time. But to punish a business that is trying to -- you know, this young woman and her partner here are investing their life's work into opening a business and we're bringing up issues that are really not part of their application, And they're really not exacerbating, in my opinion -- in my opinion -- the I think, if anything, they probably can problems. alleviate the problems somewhat because they are operating off hours. They are not operating during normal business hours. So those 30 spots in the back of the building will probably suffice, I think, in my

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As Mr. Walsh mentioned before, you know, we have a lot of gyms and a lot of fitness facilities in this community. They don't all succeed. And I certainly hope that this one succeeds, as I hope they all do, but it's not as if this is going to be, you know, the next big thing where, you know -- and I don't mean to bust your bubble -- but, you know, we're not going to have thousands of cars. I think -- and one of the reasons why I was for it is because when I heard the business hours. I think that's great. That's after Chaminade is done. That's after the middle school is done. That's after a lot of people are out of work. It's before Jericho Terrace has their weddings, which would start at 7:00 or 8:00, but then Jericho Terrace, the weddings, would end at 11:00 or 12:00. So these people would be out there sandwiched in between. I couldn't find a better idea.

Could you think of a better -- obviously the landlord is not going to keep the store open. So what would you suggest go there? What would you like to see there?

MS. GRASER: You said that this is a difference. Before the store was there for so many years. It's a store. People come, buy and go. This is something different. It's a school. It's going to be a

constant traffic. That's the difference. 1 2 MR. PEREIRA: OK. That's your opinion. 3 MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you. 4 Anything else, ma'am? 5 MS. GRASER: No. MAYOR STRAUSS: No? OK. 6 Thank you. Anybody else in the fifth row? Sixth row? 7 Seventh row? 8 9 Ma'am, come on back up. 10 Any other comments from the Board? MS. ARMAND: Yes. I would like to address the 11 parking issue. That has been one of our main concerns. 12 13 MAYOR STRAUSS: Ma'am, talk to us. 14 MS. ARMAND: Sorry. That's been one of our main concerns. So we've been looking for a place for 15 over a year now just because I had to check off some of 16 17 our points, and the first one has been parking because, 18 the same thing, we don't want our clients to be searching 19 for parking. So this space was actually perfect for that because of the 30 spots. At max we'll have 25. 20 21 And what I've been doing for the past few weeks is I'll drive over here and I'll check what the parking 22 is like. I've talked to both of the neighbors. 2.3 business hours are done at 3:00. So the parking lot 24

won't be occupied. And then, as I drive down Jericho

between the hours of 5:00 to 10:00 p.m., there's usually 1 2 no one parked there at all on both sides of the street 3 and on the side streets across from the building. 4 that's something that I've, like, thoroughly checked 5 because it's also very important to us. 6 And we would definitely do our best to make 7 sure that the clients don't park in front of any 8 residential houses. So we definitely will want to work 9 with the community and not against. 10 MAYOR STRAUSS: OK. Great. Thank you. 11 Any other comments from the Board? 12 MR. WALSH: Yes. 13 What percentage of your clients are going to be 14 young people that may be dropped off by their parents and 15 not have a car. 16 MS. ARMAND: So we think half of that, which I 17 didn't address before, but about half --18 MR. WALSH: Just speak a little slower. 19 MS. ARMAND: Oh. Yes. Sorry. 20

So of the 25 max that we could have in an ideal situation, about half of those would be drop-off students. So they wouldn't actually need to park a car or anything like that.

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MR. WALSH: So a good percentage will be children, because I've seen that in the past. And you

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know, in the past there was a hearing, going back quite some time, about a gas station that was a little ways down. And they did quite an extensive traffic study.

And they saw that more than 90 percent of the people came off Jericho Turnpike and went back onto Jericho Turnpike.

People were concerned that the neighborhood would be invaded by people making turns going through their neighborhood. And your location is immediately off Jericho Turnpike. So I think that, first of all, at night there's spaces. During the day the spaces are not open on Jericho Turnpike, but at night they are. And I think that the majority of your people will be coming off Jericho Turnpike and going back onto Jericho Turnpike, especially those dropping children off.

So, you know, I think the idea that the business is mostly at night is a positive for your application and for that immediate area, as opposed to another business that would be there during the congested time of day.

That's all. Thank you, Mayor.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you.

MR. DURHAM: May I?

MAYOR STRAUSS: Yes, sir.

MR. DURHAM: Classes, how many classes? How long does a class run? How many classes do you have

1	scheduled? Do you have set-up time and break-down time
2	during this 5:00 to 10:00, or do you have classes solid
3	from 5:00 to 10:00?
4	MS. ARMAND: Each class is an hour, and from
5	5:00 to 10:00 there will be about three classes that take
6	place in each of the rooms. So about three classes
7	between the hours of 5:00 to 10:00.
8	MR. DURHAM: So they're spaced out.
9	MS. ARMAND: They're spaced out. So there's 15
10	minutes for clients to leave and then drive their cars
11	away, and then there's another 15 minutes for other
12	clients to come in, find parking and then get into class.
13	MR. DURHAM: So a half hour between classes.
14	MS. ARMAND: Yes.
15	MR. DURHAM: Thank you.
16	MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you.
17	Anything else, ma'am?
18	MS. ARMAND: No.
19	MAYOR STRAUSS: Anything else from the Board?
20	I'll entertain a motion to approve.
21	MR. WALSH: I'll offer the motion.
22	THE COURT: Motion by Trustee Walsh.
23	MR. PEREIRA: Second.
24	MAYOR STRAUSS: Second by Trustee Pereira.
25	Mr. Scalero, poll the Board.

24	York 11749. I'm here tonight on behalf of the operator,
25	future hopefully tenant, if approved tonight, Fresenius

Medical Care North America.

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We are requesting a Special Use Permit for a dialysis clinic located at 1 East Jericho Turnpike. It is the southwest corner of Jericho Turnpike and Roslyn Road. The property is currently zoned B-1, where a clinic is permitted by Special Use Permit from the Board of Trustees.

The applicant is proposing to reuse the existing building with interior alterations to convert the former Walgreen's retail space into the dialysis clinic. As such the building character, size, location, design and site layout has already been found appropriate and in harmony with the surrounding properties which are commercially zoned to the north, northeast and east of the subject lot. There are single-family residences to the south, southeast and west along Washington Avenue. Along Jericho Turnpike there's a single-family residence immediately to the west, followed by commercial properties to the west of that, all located within the B-1 zone.

The existing building has been vacant since 2015, when Walgreens moved diagonally across Jericho Turnpike. And the proposed use is a community concept offering a medical service that is otherwise only available at Winthrop Hospital. It fulfills a need in

the community, and the operator has already been granted the "all contingencies met" letter from the New York

State Department of Health to operate the dialysis clinic at this location.

The use is in conformance with the surrounding character and will not cause excessive traffic or assembly of vehicles or people. It will not provide any change to the prior use in terms of noise, light, vibration, odor or size, nor will it impair future development or values of the surrounding properties.

As I mentioned, the existing building will be remaining. So the size will not change. The parking lot will remain as is. The traffic access will not be causing any additional conflict in traffic.

The existing utilities that currently service the property will service the property for gas, electric, water, sewer, and on-site storm water disposal.

David Ohliger is here on behalf of Fresenius Medical Care, if you do have any questions. And if you have any questions for me, I'd be happy to answer them.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you. Thank you for selecting Mineola.

Is this the first dialysis center that you'll be opening up? Is it your second? Do you have experience in the field?

1 MR. OHLIGER: My name is David Ohliger. I'm 2 actually the Northeast Project Manager for Fresenius 3 Medical Care. So I concentrate solely on the construction aspect of the clinic. 4 5 So this is going to be -- we have quite a few 6 clinics in both Nassau and Suffolk slated, but this is 7 the first clinic in Nassau that we've built in some time. MAYOR STRAUSS: How many other clinics are 8 9 there? 10 MR. OHLIGER: Altogether, in the New York metro 11 area, there's approximately 50 Fresenius Medical Care clinics. 12 13 MAYOR STRAUSS: That's great. 14 What were the hours of operation? 15 MR. OHLIGER: These clinics typically take a 16 while to ramp-up, both patient and staff. It usually 17 takes almost two years before we're at capacity. We 18 start dialyzing patients for the first couple of months 19 just Mondays, Wednesdays, Fridays, between the hours of 20 8:00 and 1:00 p.m. and then, as the need grows in the 2.1 area, we add additional shifts. 22 MAYOR STRAUSS: Well, there's plenty of 23 parking. 24 Deputy Mayor? 25 MR. PEREIRA: Thank you.

1	Thank you very much, and I certainly like to
2	see that that building will be rehabilitated. And as far
3	as rehabilitation, since you're in the construction
4	end and not that this has anything to do with the
5	application or the approval what kinds of improvements
6	will you be doing to the property, the building, the
7	parking lot, if any.
8	MR. OHLIGER: So the interior of the building,
9	obviously you're getting a full tenant fit-out to suit
10	our needs. And the entire facade will be painted, new
11	finishes. There will be some new windows, sliding door
12	assembly. It's going to look like a clinic.
13	MR. PEREIRA: What about the lot? Will you
14	resurface the lot?
15	MR. OHLIGER: The lot is getting a full

coming to Mineola. I, unfortunately, am very familiar with dialysis. I have a close family member who's been on dialysis for several years, and I know that Winthrop is at near capacity and they have three shifts. And so I think it's good that patients have another choice in the vicinity.

Eventually how many chairs will you have?

MR. OHLIGER: This is a 19-plus-one facility,

which means 19 in center stations, plus one separation

room, which is a New York State Department of Health

mandate. There will also be two home therapy suites

where we train patients to perform home therapy, dialysis

at home.

MR. PEREIRA: OK. And now, I know that there are some early morning shifts and midday shifts, and eventually those patients that are still healthy enough to work, you know, you can accommodate them in late afternoon, early evening, shifts as well. That's the goal eventually? You're saying Monday, Wednesday, Friday, at this point 8:00 to 1:00, but at other points then the second wave would come in and the third wave?

MR. OHLIGER: Yes.

MR. PEREIRA: So ideally, two years down the line, when you're at max, what would the hours of operation be then, give or take. You know, you're not

bound to it at this moment, but --1 MR. OHLIGER: Yes. I can't -- you know, it 2 3 really depends on, obviously, the operation of the clinic 4 and the patient to staff ratio, but --5 MR. PEREIRA: Because I know my mother-in-law 6 goes at 4:00 in the morning. MR. OHLIGER: 7 Yes. 8 MR. PEREIRA: Right? And then I know that 9 there are later ones. And that brings me to the next 10 question about deliveries and taking out of medical waste 11 or medical supplies. When would that happen? That's the 12 thing that I'm more concerned about. Obviously this is not going to produce any 13 14 noise, or any smells, or any inconveniences --15 MR. OHLIGER: No. 16 MR. PEREIRA: -- like that. The only 17 inconvenience that I could see is if there are trucks 18 backing up at 3:00 in the morning, beep, beep, you know, 19 that kind of thing. When would that be done and how often would 20 21 that be done? 22 MR. OHLIGER: You know, in more of the borough 2.3 areas of New York City we have to do more of those early 24 type of deliveries and dropoffs just because of parking 25 restrictions. But somewhere like this, where we have our

1	own separate building door and parking lot, I don't think
2	we'd see that early morning activity.
3	MR. PEREIRA: OK. Excellent. Thank you.
4	MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you.
5	Trustee Cusato?
6	MR. CUSATO: Thank you.
7	Good evening to both of you. I have no problem
8	with your request. I have some questions.
9	So how long is the dialysis process? Is it,
10	like, a three-hour thing? I mean, what's the process
11	involved as far as time?
12	MR. OHLIGER: Typically a patient treatment is
13	between three and four hours.
14	MR. CUSATO: OK. So do they normally get
15	dropped off, or they park their are they able to drive
16	home after they're process, or does someone drop them off
17	and pick them up?
18	MR. OHLIGER: That depends on the severity of
19	the patient's health.
20	MR. CUSATO: OK. Now, you indicate that you
21	have 20 patient stations, and I might have missed what
22	you said, but can you do 20 people at one time?
23	MR. OHLIGER: Yes.
24	MR. CUSATO: OK. So now, the front signage is
25	going to say Forensic Care, or it's not going to say

1	Bohler Engineering? The signage on the building is going
2	to show
3	MR. OHLIGER: Fresenius Kidney Care.
4	MR. CUSATO: OK. Now, you stated that the
5	building is going to stay pretty much what it looks like
6	now, but I did notice that you're going to have some kind
7	of opaque film on the inside of some windows?
8	MR. OHLIGER: Correct.
9	MR. CUSATO: Is that what is that film going
10	to show?
11	MR. OHLIGER: It's basically just a UV coating.
12	MR. PEREIRA: For privacy.
13	MR. OHLIGER: Yes. It's going to screen. It
14	serves two purposes. One is privacy and one is
15	MR. CUSATO: It's for decoration, or not?
16	MR. OHLIGER: No.
17	MR. CUSATO: It's more privacy than decoration.
18	MR. OHLIGER: Well it's also UV coating. So it
19	helps the solar in the building.
20	MR. CUSATO: OK. And I notice that you had a
21	water treatment area. What does that mean, water
22	treatment.
23	MS. OHLIGER: It's our water treatment
24	equipment. We have a delegated room where all the water
25	treatment equipment is installed.

1	MR. PEREIRA: To purify. The water has to be
2	used sterile water has to be used for the
3	MR. OHLIGER: Yes. It's a reverse osmosis
4	process in dialysis.
5	MR. CUSATO: Again, I just have questions.
6	Now, you have a basement in this building,
7	correct?
8	MS. OHLIGER: We do.
9	MR. CUSATO: And that's just for storage or
10	something?
11	MR. OHLIGER: We will have our own storage on
12	the first floor. We really won't be using the cellar at
13	all.
14	MR. CUSATO: OK. And I notice that you have a
15	transformer room. Does that mean do you need a
16	generator, some kind of backup generator?
17	I'm just concerned when the generator kicks in
18	it may be too noisy for our residents.
19	MR. OHLIGER: There will be no generator at
20	this facility, but there will be a generator connection
21	box so, in case of an emergency, we can hook a generator
22	up to the facility.
23	MR. CUSATO: So you'll bring something in?
24	MR. OHLIGER: Correct.
25	MR. CUSATO: And will that be a noisy thing for

1	our residents or a quiet thing?
2	MR. OHLIGER: Typically the generators that are
3	used in New York are rated for the use and have a sound
4	enclosure.
5	MR. CUSATO: All right. Thank you.
6	MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you.
7	Trustee Durham?
8	MR. DURHAM: Thank you.
9	The patients coming, do you have a percentage
10	at your other locations that come by ambulance or
11	vehicles like that that have to stage on the property?
12	MR. OHLIGER: We do, but without knowing, you
13	know that's a very that's as per area. So it would
14	be hard to gauge that.
15	MR. DURHAM: Just from one of your other
16	locations, just approximately the percentage of patients
17	that come
18	MR. OHLIGER: Unfortunately, I can't comment to
19	that because I'm really on the construction end of
20	things. So I'm not there for the day-to-day operations.
21	MR. DURHAM: Are you setting up in
22	construction with the parking lot, are you setting up
23	dedicated spots for ambulances and staging for the
24	ambulances that will be delivering patients?
25	MR. OHLIGER: Handicapped parking.

1	MR. DURHAM: Handicapped parking. The
2	ambulances would be staged in handicapped parking, or
3	MR. OHLIGER: They could drop off in a
4	handicapped parking spot, or they could pull right up to
5	the front vestibule and drop off, depending on the
6	severity of our patient.
7	MR. DURHAM: So it will be more like a drop-off
8	service. They'll drop off. They won't stay around and
9	MR. OHLIGER: No. The ambulance drop off is
10	just a drop off, typical of a hospital situation.
11	MR. DURHAM: And you said the process time
12	takes three to four hours. So with your initial 8:00
13	a.m. to 1:00 p.m. Monday to Friday, the most you would be
14	doing is 60 patients a week to start?
15	MR. PEREIRA: No. Most patients do go three
16	days.
17	MR. DURHAM: Yes, but OK.
18	So you're talking, then, it's 20 patients.
19	You're gearing up to start with just 20 patients.
20	MR. OHLIGER: Yes. The process of that gear-up
21	is slow because it has to go through the state and we
22	have to get certified by the state. It starts with one
23	patient. Then it slowly builds through the certification
24	process.
25	MR. DURHAM: And approximate number of staff

1	that you would have on?
2	MR. OHLIGER: Again, it correlates with the
3	patient with the patient, you know
4	MR. DURHAM: To start.
5	MR. OHLIGER: services.
6	That's an operational question. I can't answer
7	that question.
8	MR. DURHAM: Can you?
9	MS. DeLUCA: I don't know.
10	MR. OHLIGER: That's a state-mandated patient
11	to staff ratio. At this point I'm not sure what it is.
12	It could be three to one. It could be five to one. I
13	don't keep current with that.
14	MR. DURHAM: OK. So then, staff parking.
15	Where are you setting up your staff that's coming in,
16	where are you setting up the staff parking?
17	MR. OHLIGER: Staff parking is within the same
18	parking lot.
19	MR. DURHAM: Within the same parking lot. Will
20	they be closer to Jericho Turnpike
21	MS. OHLIGER: Correct. Our patients get the
22	closer parking.
23	MR. DURHAM: All right.
24	MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you.
25	Trustee Walsh?

1	MR. WALSH: Yes. Thank you, Mayor.
2	Hello. Good evening.
3	Just so I understand, you are the civil
4	engineer, is that correct, and you represent the company
5	as the construction end of it?
6	MS. OHLIGER: Correct.
7	MR. WALSH: OK. How many such centers does
8	your company own in this immediate area? I might have
9	missed it.
10	MR. OHLIGER: Approximately
11	MR. WALSH: You sound a little muffled.
12	MR. OHLIGER: Approximately 50.
13	MR. WALSH: Approximately 50.
14	MR. OHLIGER: Fifty, five-zero.
15	MR. WALSH: OK. How many of those are you in
16	the position of being a tenant and how many are you in
17	the position of being an owner of those properties?
18	Are you tenants more so than owners?
19	MR. OHLIGER: We are only tenants.
20	MR. PEREIRA: You are only tenants.
21	So you have no intention of buying the
22	property.
23	MR. OHLIGER: None.
24	MR. WALSH: OK. Good.
25	And, you know, in the past I know I heard

you say that you're going to do the work and, you know, the driveway and everything, but in the past at that location we had had trouble with the previous tenant not always shoveling the snow, not always. . . you know. In the beginning, when they went in there, they made nice landscaping and then it just became a disaster, grass growing high.

Your company is in charge of the maintenance for the entire property?

MR. OHLIGER: The landlord is in charge of repaving the parking lot and he's in charge of the maintenance of the landscaping, as per our lease arrangement.

MR. WALSH: Is the landlord present here tonight?

MR. OHLIGER: He is not.

MR. WALSH: OK. Because its just the point that we did have trouble in the past with that location. It looked very sloppy. And also, that location was a major pharmacy-type of store. They didn't really have enough parking. It's kind of assured.

I think this is a good use of that property.

And that's what we're here for. We're here for land use,

not as -- what you can answer. I think that there's a

great need for dialysis. I think that there's a great

need for people to have dialysis near where they live. 1 2 And so I hope that your application is approved. I think 3 it's a good use of the land, and that's what we're here for, land use. 4 5 Thank you very much. 6 MR. OHLIGER: Thank you. 7 MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you, Trustee Walsh. 8 Any other comments from the Board? 9 MR. PEREIRA: My only question would be: If 10 you get approved tonight, when do you see that this would 11 all happen? Within the next six, eight, 12 months, 16 12 months? When would you hope to kind of get the ball 13 rolling and open? 14 MR. OHLIGER: Once we gain permits, our 15 construction process is five months. 16 MR. PEREIRA: Great. 1.7 MR. CUSATO: I'm sorry, is what? 18 MR. PEREIRA: Five months. 19 MR. OHLIGER: Five months. 20 MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you. 2.1 Any other comments? 22 Yes, ma'am. 23 MS. DeLUCA: Would I be able -- because I think 24 what Trustee Durham was getting at, asking the number of 25 employees and parking, was if the parking lot can handle.

And I want to put on record that there are 40 parking spaces available in that parking lot. So, even if it did happen to be a one to one ratio, which is not the case, there would be enough parking to have 20 employees and 20 patients at a time. So, it will be less employees than that.

MAYOR STRAUSS: OK. Thank you.

MR. PEREIRA: Just to further explain it, most patients are dialyzed three times a week. So it's the same patient. It's not -- so when you're open Monday, Wednesday, Friday, and you're servicing 20 patients, you're not servicing 60 patients. You're really servicing the 20 patients three times. So it's the same patients.

In my experience, usually you have techs and you have nurses who put the patients on, and you may have a doctor who is on call on the premises. So it's usually two or three to one, if that.

And again, these things are mandated by the state and they're regulated by the Health Department and all of that. And those things, I'm sure, will all be taken care of, as they probably are in the other 50 that you own or that you operate.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you.

Have a seat. We'll open it up for public

18	MR. PEREIRA: Yes.
19	MR. SCALERO: Trustee Cusato?
20	MR. CUSATO: Yes.
21	MR. SCALERO: Trustee Walsh?
22	MR. WALSH: Yes.
23	MR. SCALERO: Mayor Strauss?
24	MAYOR STRAUSS: Yes.
25	Congratulations. Welcome to Mineola. Thank

1	you for selecting Mineola. We are excited that finally
2	something is getting in there and kind of rejuvenate that
3	corner a little bit.
4	Please, again, as you heard me say with the
5.	other applicants this evening, stay close to our Building
6	Department. You have plenty of customers, but reach out
7	to the Chamber of Commerce. Maybe they'll even make a
8	little splash for you, as we will with the other
9	applicants that were approved tonight.
10	Congratulations.
11	MS. DeLUCA: Thank you very much.
12	MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you very much.
13	MS. DeLUCA: Have a good night.
14	MAYOR STRAUSS: I'll entertain a motion to
15	close the public hearings.
16	MR. WALSH: Motion.
17	MAYOR STRAUSS: Motion by Trustee Walsh.
18	MR. PEREIRA: Second.
19	MAYOR STRAUSS: Second by Trustee Pereira.
20	All in favor?
21	MR. DURHAM: Aye.
22	MR. PEREIRA: Aye.
23	MR. CUSATO: Aye.
