MR. SCALERO: Ladies and gentlemen, please silence all pagers and cell phones. In the event of an emergency there are exits located in the rear of the room.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Good evening, ladies and gentlemen.

Mr. Scalero, I believe you're up.

MR. SCALERO: "Legal Notice, Public Hearing, Incorporated Village of Mineola.

"Please take Notice that the Board of Trustees of the Incorporated Village of Mineola will hold a Public Hearing on Wednesday, April 15, 2015 at 6:30 p.m. at the Village Hall, 155 Washington Avenue, Mineola, New York 11501, or at some other location to be hereafter designated by the Board of Trustees, in order to receive public comment upon the following:

"Application of Edward W. Dickman, Architect, for a Special Use Permit pursuant to Chapter 550 of the Code of the Incorporated Village of Mineola, entitled 'Zoning,' Section 550.12, entitled 'B-1 Districts,' Subsection (B), entitled 'Special Uses,' for the purpose of converting a portion of retail space in order to host parties on the mezzanine level upon the property known as 275 Jericho Turnpike, Mineola, New York, known and designated on the Nassau County Land and Tax Map as

- Application re 275 Jericho Turnpike -

17	MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you, Mr. Scalero.
18	Mr. Whalen, notifications been made?
19	MR. WHALEN: Yes, Mayor. We have the requisite
20	Affidavits of Mailing. That's been notarized. There
21	were 89 mailed, 64 returned and two went unclaimed.
22	MAYOR STRAUSS: Great. Thank you.
23	Mr. Gibbons, anything on your end?
24	MR. GIBBONS: No, Mayor.
25	MAYOR STRAUSS: Great.

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Ladies and gentlemen, this will be the format for this evening's meeting, like they always are: The applicant will make their presentation, they'll interact with the Board, and then we'll open up to public comment.

I ask that anyone approaching the podium speak clearly, slowly, for the court stenographer, and state your name and address for the record.

Anybody representing the applicant like to come forward?

MR. DICKMAN: Mr. Mayor, Members of the Board, my name is Edward Dickman.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Excuse me. A little louder, if you could.

MR. DICKMAN: Mr. Chairman, Members of the Board, my name is Edward Dickman, Architect, 10 Grace Avenue, Great Neck, New York. I'm representing Great Neck Games and Mr. Victor Hatami, the owner of those games, for the application before you this evening.

This building was built about three, three-and-a-half years ago. It got a C of O for use. And what happened was some of Mr. Hatami's neighbors and friends wanted to be able to have some kind of functions there.

We have a mezzanine upstairs which accommodates 2,500 square foot. It's sprinklered and alarmed. It's

got two sets of stairs out of the building. And so we wanted to be able to utilize it for small parties for the operation of the building.

Mr. Hatami is here this evening to give you an overview of what he is, how long he's been here, what they do, and I would like to present him to make the presentation to you.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Sure.

MR. HATAMI: Thank you, Ed.

Good evening, gentlemen. My name is Victor
Hatami. My address is 5 The Crest, Woodbury, New York
11797.

I have been a business owner in Mineola for the last 33 years. My company does party production, rent and sell video games, pinball machines and party props.

As technology has changed we have adjusted our business accordingly. There is no more demand for pinball machines and video games as used to be. As you know, if you carry a phone you have all the games, and if you have a computer you can play all the games without purchasing them.

So we renovated our store in 2013. We obeyed all the rules and regulations that we were supposed to do. And we believe that we have a great building in Mineola.

Since we renovated our place our taxes got more than double. We pay approximately over \$10,000 a month real estate tax, school tax, and so on. We were promised when we started building that our taxes would be grandfathered for ten years, but last year we got our bill which was doubled up. We went to the county and they told us that Mineola School opted out and there's nothing you can do about it and you got to pay the taxes.

So we were looking for more revenue. When my grandchild was born we did a small party -- one year birthday party for her over there -- and it was very, very successful. And since then people ask us to do small party over there. So in order to have extra revenue we did some of those parties, which is very, very small. And then we got some bar mitzvahs, little ones, so on. So we've been very successful doing it, and we really need the revenue to exist.

We've been very, very good in this town. We help all the charities, schools, hospitals, Fire Department, Police Department. We have currently four people working for us from immediate residents, Mineola. And we support all the businesses here. I would like to be here another, hopefully, 33 years. So we would like to get permission from you guys to operate.

MAYOR STRAUSS: All right. Anything else you

1	need to say, or are you done with your presentation?
2	MR. HATAMI: That's about it.
3	MAYOR STRAUSS: I have a couple of questions
4	for you, Mr. Hatami.
5	MR. HATAMI: Sure.
6	MAYOR STRAUSS: We appreciate your choosing
7	Mineola 33 years ago. I don't know when Great Neck Games
8	actually appeared over there. I'm sure somebody else on
9	the Board remembers.
10	What are your hours of operation for the
11	parties?
12	MR. HATAMI: Normally most of them are on a
13	weekend, some may be on Friday, and we usually do it from
14	6:30 to 9:30, 10:00 o'clock.
15	MAYOR STRAUSS: What about Saturdays and
16	Sundays?
17	MR. HATAMI: That's mostly on a weekend, not
18	on a weekday. What I'm saying to you is Saturday and
19	Sunday.
20	MAYOR STRAUSS: I'm sorry.
21	So Saturday you wouldn't have any afternoon
22	parties. You would only have evenings from 6:30 to 9:30?
23	MR. HATAMI: Most of them would be evening,
24	yes.
25	MAYOR STRAUSS: Most of them. So what time do

1	you open in the day?
2	MR. HATAMI: We open up 9:00 a.m.
3	MAYOR STRAUSS: 9:00 a.m. on Saturdays?
4	MR. HATAMI: Correct.
5	MAYOR STRAUSS: And Sundays?
6	MR. HATAMI: Sunday we're closed.
7	MAYOR STRAUSS: OK. So you wouldn't have any
8	parties scheduled, or you have no business hours
9	scheduled for Sunday, but if there's a party you'll open?
10	MR. HATAMI: Correct.
11	MAYOR STRAUSS: How big are the parties? Is
12	there a limit? Ten, 15 kids, 20 kids?
13	MR. HATAMI: It varies between we don't do
14	anything less than 20, and it goes up to 75.
15	MAYOR STRAUSS: Seventy-five?
16	MR. HATAMI: Correct.
17	MAYOR STRAUSS: Wow. What age groups are we
18	talking about?
19	MR. HATAMI: Usually we have one year birthday
20	parties, which people come in, maybe they are 12, 13
21	years old. Some adults come with them sometimes.
22	MAYOR STRAUSS: OK. Where are all these people
23	going to park?
24	MR. HATAMI: I have 19 spots in my parking
25	spot. All the parking that we do is valet parking. And

1	also, I made a deal with next door neighbor, the bank.
2	And they have almost 30 spots, because valet parking. So
3	between the two spots we have 50 parking spots. And
4	those valet parking, when they come in, they can even
5	double park and so on you know how valet is meaning
6	in our lots.
7	MAYOR STRAUSS: Right.
8	MR. HATAMI: And I have a paper from the bank
9	stating that I can park over there.
10	MAYOR STRAUSS: Explain the valet service to
11	me. I know how it operates, but where are they going to
12	be situated? Are they going to be situated in front of
13	your building, in front of the bank?
14	MR. HATAMI: No. No. Inside the parking.
15	MAYOR STRAUSS: Inside your parking lot.
16	MR. HATAMI: Correct.
17	MAYOR STRAUSS: All right. So how are the cars
18	that are being valeted are you going to valet cars in
19	the bank lot?
20	MR. HATAMI: Correct.
21	MAYOR STRAUSS: So when somebody pulls into
22	your parking lot
23	Because there's a fence separating, I think,
24	your property from the bank's property.
25	MR. HATAMI: Correct.

1	MAYOR STRAUSS: how are the cars getting
2	from your property to the bank's property?
3	MR. HATAMI: They drive.
4	MAYOR STRAUSS: They go around through the
5	neighborhood?
6	MR. HATAMI: Correct.
7	MAYOR STRAUSS: And all the way back.
8	All right. I'll let some of the other trustees
9	go.
10	Mr. Pereira?
11	MR. PEREIRA: Thank you, Mr. Hatami, and good
12	evening.
13	Could we ask for you to enter that letter that
14	you have from the bank into the record, please?
15	MR. HATAMI: Sure.
16	MR PEREIRA: Good. So that it becomes part of
17	the permanent record.
18	(Said letter was marked Exhibit A by Mr.
19	Scalero and is located at the end of this transcript.)
20	MR. PEREIRA: Now I know that, obviously,
21	you've been around here almost as long as I've been
22	around here. So I remember Great Neck Games. And
23	certainly you're a fixture in the community. And we
24	appreciate that. And we thank you for choosing to do
25	business in Mineola and for the improvements that you've

made on your building.

I do have to say that I was on the Board when you came before us last time. And although you do paint a very rosy picture, there were some issues back then. There were some issues with compliance. And there were occasions where there were problems, I believe, with the Fire Marshal as well because of separation in the walls. But that's in the past.

But I certainly do want to bring to light there were some issues with closing the garage door on Wellington, and the fence and the bushes in the back.

And so let's tell the full picture of the history.

But nonetheless, the building is there. The building is beautiful. You do keep a nice, clean place, and it certainly beats, you know, having an empty lot there.

However, there are a few questions in regards
-- and although this is not within our purview, but I'd
still like to know where you stand with this.

Have you had to, then, go before the Fire

Marshal once again, or will you have to get approval from

Nassau County if we do allow for these parties? Does

that change your use as far as the Fire Marshal is

concerned? Because now you are having assemblies.

You're having public assemblies. Does that change? Did

you have to go, or do you have to go to Nassau County?

MR. HATAMI: After you guys give me the OK,
then I have to go, yes.

MR. PEREIRA: OK. And you're saying that that room upstairs meets code with 75 people? I mean, I haven't been in there. But looking from the outside, you're allowed to legally have 75 people in the facility?

MR. HATAMI: I believe so. The amount of square footage I have, I think --

MR. PEREIRA: Yes. But the Fire Marshal at some point would tell you what your maximum capacity is.

MR. HATAMI: Correct. Correct.

MR. PEREIRA: OK. Now obviously, when you run the operation that you've been running until now, you have minimal refuse that you produce. Now once you're having parties for up to 75 people you're bringing in pizza boxes and food and putrescible waste and all that. What are we doing to address that? Because currently you're not producing a lot, except for maybe paper and, you know, office-type of garbage. But now you're going to be producing cups and soda cans and bottles and pizza, pizza boxes and sandwiches and cake and all of that.

MR. HATAMI: Right. We have made arrangement with the people, people who collect our garbage, to come and collect.

1	MR. PEREIRA: So you have a private carter.
2	MR. HATAMI: Correct.
3	MR. PEREIRA: So this will continue to be
4	done
5	MR. HATAMI: Correct.
6	MR. PEREIRA: privately. It will not be put
7	on the curb and we don't have to look at it.
8	MR. HATAMI: Correct.
9	MR. PEREIRA: Great.
10	Now Sunday parties. You know, I have three
11	young children. I'm always throwing parties, you know.
12	And it's very unusual to have a Sunday party because
13	usually it's a family day. Sunday evenings, kids have
14	school the next day.
15	How many Sunday parties do you expect or have
16	you had? Is there a high demand for Sunday parties?
17	I mean, it's really a lot to ask the neighbors
18	to go from allowing a business that's been operating six
19	days a week to now operate seven days a week. Many
20	people on Sunday have friends over, barbecues, picnics,
21	and it's really an inconvenience when you may potentially
22	have 75 people all of a sudden invading the neighborhood,
23	if you will.
24	Is that something that you would be willing to
25	perhaps negotiate? I mean, your business is closed on

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1	Sunday. Are you going to open it on purpose for a
2	two-hour party?
3	MR. HATAMI: My business is seven days a week,
4	24 hours.
5	MR. PEREIRA: Right, because you have parties
6	off site.
7	MR. HATAMI: Correct.
8	We do approximately 25 to 30 parties average a
9	week, and a lot of them are on Sundays, even though the
10	office is closed, but our warehouse is open and our
11	trucks are going in and out all these years. And we
12	don't get much for Sunday, like you said, but we do get
13	some.
14	MR. PEREIRA: OK. Now just for clarification
15	because, again, I was on the Board and I don't know what
16	just so that I can educate myself.
17	You were promised that your taxes would be
18	abated for ten years? Who promised you that?
19	MR. HATAMI: It was supposed to be
20	grandfathered.
21	MR. PEREIRA: And what entity promised you
22	that?
23	MR. HATAMI: Honestly, I don't know. Two
24	people came in from the county when we went to apply wher
25	we were doing. They told us that we going to do it for

said, Well, if you want to do the parties -- exact word I

ten years, grandfather. And then, when we got the bill 1 we went there and we said, This is not what we were 2 promised. And they said, Yes. We did promise you this. 3 But the school opted out, and we're not going to do it. MR. PEREIRA: Because I don't know that 5 problem. 6 I'll pass it on. OK. 7 MAYOR STRAUSS: Mr. Cusato? 8 MR. CUSATO: Thank you, Mayor. 9 Good evening, sir. 10 MR. HATAMI: Good evening. 11 MR. CUSATO: You know, I'm a little annoyed 12 You know, we gave you permission to open up a 13 building, but you went and engineered it into a yard. 14 Then you decided you're going to have parties on your 15 own. 16 Why would you do that? How many parties have 17 you had since you opened this? 18 MR. HATAMI: Your Honor, we had several 19 parties. 20 When I started doing parties I did go here, to 21 town, and I asked for application to have -- they said, 22 What do you need the application for? I said, I will 23 need it to do parties what I'm going to do. So they 24

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1	don't remember, but they told me that, Why don't you do
2	what you're doing till we tell you when you need to come
3	to us. And when I got the notice that I should come to
4	do the parties, so I came here and obey. Everything that
5	they told me I obey.
6	MR. CUSATO: So someone told you that it's OK
7	to have parties until we say no; is that what you're
8	saying?
9	MR. HATAMI: Honestly, when I went over there
10	they told me, You don't need to fill out the application
11	yet till you hear from us. Then, when I heard from you
12	guys, I came. I obey all the rules, everything that you
13	told me, yes.
14	MR. CUSATO: OK. So now you have two stairways
15	to get from the first floor up to your mezzanine level.
16	MR. HATAMI: Correct.
17	MR. CUSATO: And I guess they exit through the
18	side door. There's no back door, Right? So they exit
19	onto Wellington.
20	MR. HATAMI: There is back doors.
21	MR. CUSATO: What? There is a back door?
22	MR. HATAMI: Yes.
23	MR. CUSATO: All I see is, like, a garage door.
24	I don't see a back door. Do they not let me just
25	MR. DICKMAN: There is a

1	MR. CUSATO: Looks more like a garage door,
2	like a bay door, as opposed to an open door.
3	MR. DICKMAN: No. There's an exit door in the
4	back.
5	MR. CUSATO: Where?
6	MR. DICKMAN: There's an exit door in the back.
7	MR. CUSATO: OK. OK. I'm not going to
8	MR. DICKMAN: And there's an exit door on the
9	side.
10	MR. CUSATO: OK. OK.
11	MR. WALSH: Right here.
12	MR. CUSATO: Where? That's not a door.
13	Again, now looking at your plans, on page A3 it
14	shows Proposed Mezzanine.
15	MR. DICKMAN: Yes, sir.
16	MR. CUSATO: OK. Now, if you look to the
17	bottom corner, it says Proposed Cellar. What is that all
18	about?
19	MR. DICKMAN: There was an existing cellar
20	there under the old building, before we renovated the
21	building
22	MR. CUSATO: OK.
23	MR. DICKMAN: And we put a cellar under the
24	warehouse when we built the warehouse.
25	MR. CUSATO: OK.

1	MR. DICKMAN: So that's what's there right now.
2	MR. CUSATO: Then it shouldn't say proposed.
3	It should say right? I mean, the far right corner,
4	you see it says proposed?
5	MR. DICKMAN: That was
6	MR. PEREIRA: The original plan.
7	MR. DICKMAN: the plan that was submitted
8	when we got the approval for the warehouse.
9	MR. CUSATO: OK. OK. I'm just trying to find
10	out what's going on here.
11	MR. DICKMAN: It's there already.
12	MR. CUSATO: OK. OK.
13	I see you have bathroom facilities up on the
14	top floor for and that's enough for 75 people?
15	MR. DICKMAN: We have two bathrooms. We have
16	two separate bathrooms that are available for the people
17	that come there. Yes, sir.
18	MR. CUSATO: OK.
19	All right. Thank you, Mayor.
20	MAYOR STRAUSS: Thanks, Mr. Cusato.
21	Mr. Durham?
22	MR. DURHAM: You mentioned that the hours of
23	operation of the parties would end at 9:30. Though, yet
24	I know firsthand, living over there, I pulled out one
25	night and at about 11:00 o'clock at night there were cars

double-parked right in front of you, and there were about 15 cars outside of the building waiting for people at 11:00 o'clock, about maybe between 11:00 and ten after 11:00, for a party to exit on a Saturday night. So I know the 9:30 time is not to be held true. If you're having parties there --

MR. HATAMI: This definitely is possible that sometimes it's ten to 10:00, 10:30 at night.

MR. DURHAM: OK. Because I was going to say that night I didn't see anything with valet parking because, like I said, I saw everybody that was just the parents waiting. And like I said, they were double-parked on Jericho. I drove around. And that was one of the things, because I called to try and find out what was going on there that all the people were there waiting for. And that was one of the reasons we found out about some of the parties going on.

MR. HATAMI: Right. Sometimes the parents come to pick up their child. You know, a bunch of them, you know, come in as a rule. Somebody will pick them up.

MR. DURHAM: We can't have them double-parked on Jericho Turnpike.

MR. HATAMI: Right. I can make sure of that, that they come to the parking lot.

MR. DURHAM: That's all I have.

1	MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you.
2	Mr. Walsh?
3	MR. WALSH: Yes. Thank you.
4	Good evening. How are you tonight?
5	MR. HATAMI: Thank you.
6	MR. WALSH: The 2,500 square feet that you
7	spoke about, that's the area that's going to be used for
8	the parties, or that's the entire area of the inside of
9	the property?
10	MR. HATAMI: No. No. Just
11	MR. DICKMAN: That's the mezzanine.
12	MR. WALSH: That's the mezzanine, 2,500 feet.
13	MR. DICKMAN: Yes, sir.
14	MR. WALSH: So you will be having your parties
15	strictly in the mezzanine level; is that right?
16	MR. HATAMI: Correct.
17	MR. WALSH: And you're saying that you're going
18	to have up to 75 children. So 20 to 75 children, we have
19	to think about 75. That sounds quite large to me for
20	that area.
21	Now let's talk about parking. I didn't get a
22	chance to see this letter from the bank. I don't know if
23	it says exactly how many parking spaces you're going to
24	get from the bank. Does it say?
0.5	MP HATAMI. It does not say, but they're

1	giving us the parking lot after their hours any time that
2	we need it.
3	MR. WALSH: When they close they're going to
4	allow you to use their parking lot.
5	MR. HATAMI: Correct.
6	MR. WALSH: What time do they close on
7	Saturday?
8	MR. HATAMI: Saturday 1:00 o'clock.
9	MR. WALSH: So from 1:00 o'clock Saturday. And
10	Sunday, all day Sunday.
11	MR. HATAMI: Sunday they're not open.
12	MR. WALSH: You can use their parking lot.
13	And how many spaces do you think they have? I
14	don't think they have 50.
15	MR. HATAMI: Actually, we counted. They have
16	exactly 30.
17	MR. WALSH: They have 30 spaces. OK.
18	How many spaces do you have?
19	MR. HATAMI: We have 19.
20	MR. WALSH: Nineteen. But I also see quite
21	often your trucks parked there, and they take up not only
22	the bay doors but then other spaces that are in the back
23	of your property. So you can't always use 19 of your
24	spaces; is that correct?
25	MR. HATAMI: The 19 space is parking spot. The

1	three trucks that I have, they parking in the bay. Has
2	nothing to do with that. And also
3	MR. WALSH: When they park in the bay they cut
4	off those back parking spaces so you can't pull into
5	them.
6	MR. HATAMI: Correct. But because most of my
7	trucks are all out on Saturday and Sunday doing the
8	deliveries and so on. When we have a party and so on we
9	make sure that our truck is not there.
10	MR. WALSH: OK. So then when the trucks come
11	back you see this well, everything is vague.
12	MR. HATAMI: Correct.
13	MR. WALSH: Believe me. And that's
14	MR. HATAMI: I understand what you're saying.
15	MR. WALSH: Well, for example, let me just say
16	this: All your trucks are out when the party is going
17	on. When the party comes back the trucks pull into where
18	the bays are and they block off a lot of those parking
19	spaces.
20	How do those people get out of those parking
21	spaces when the trucks are there?
22	What I'm saying is a lot of those spaces can
23	not be utilized for your party.
24	MR. HATAMI: Correct. But again, I have a
25	parking lot next door to me which holds 30 spots.

MR. WALSH: The back. 1 MR. HATAMI: The back. 2 MR. WALSH: OK. 3 MR. HATAMI: When you have valet parking, the 4 30 spots come to about 50, 60, because they double park 5 the car and they triple. Whatever they have to do to 6 fit. MR. WALSH: And the bank is OK with this? You 8 can utilize our parking lot . . . OK. And the bank is OK 9 with you filling up this parking lot. 10 MR. HATAMI: Correct. 11 MR. WALSH: OK. Good. But, you know, I 12 personally go to parties, family parties and such, and I 13 never valet park my car, ever. Many other people are 14 They don't valet park their car. 15 please let me finish. They would park into the 16 neighborhood. And if it was 20 people, that's 20 people. 17 You're talking about 75 people. There are going to be 18 cars that overlap into Marcellus and, you know, 1.9 Wellington at every one of these parties. 20 What do you think about that? 21 MR. HATAMI: OK. About 80 percent of the party 22 that I do are kids under 12 years old. 23 MR. WALSH: Oh. OK. 24 MR. HATAMI: So they do not come in -- we never 25

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have 70 cars or 50 cars. Maybe we have 20, 30 maximum, maximum. And with those parking spots we have plenty,

You have to remember where I'm located. located next to Jericho Terrace. I'm located next to Chaminade. Across the street is the Portuguese.

MR. WALSH: Across the street and down the

MR. WALSH: You don't have to explain it to me.

Compared to what they do, and what I do is not even comparison. I am hosting mostly kids. Maybe we have ten adults in these parties.

The only time that you can question me about the parking -- which the gentleman was right -- is when they come to pick up the kids. Yes. They might park in front of Jericho turnpike, which I'm not objecting it, but I can make a sign, putting it over there, and have people to exit from the parking lot, which I have the exit door, and people go in there. I have absolutely no

MR. WALSH: OK. Now, just slow down one second. You have absolutely no problem with parking. The neighbors may have problems with your parking. But

1	if I can just say, just listening to your statements
2	now and you are correct, there is Chaminade there that
3	brings a lot of cars to the area. The Portuguese club
4	uses the back of their building and the Chaminade parking
5	lot next to them, but that brings a lot of people there.
6	So now you are looking to throw another 75 people with
7	depending upon how many please depending on how
8	many cars there are. We don't know. And it just seems
9	to be a lot to absorb for that neighborhood, in my
10	opinion.
11	MR. HATAMI: You're 100 percent right. But I
12	do not, never, ever have 75 cars.
13	MR. WALSH: No. No. I understand that.
14	MR. HATAMI: Maximum maybe 20. Maximum.
15	MR. WALSH: OK.
16	MR. HATAMI: Because like I said
17	MR. WALSH: Again, that's vague. Please, I
18	understand what you're saying. Thank you very much.
19	How many employees does it take to handle 75
20	children?
21	MR. HATAMI: We have approximately four to
22	five.
23	MR. WALSH: Four to five people up there.
24	Do they walk or do they drive to your location?
25	How do they get to your location?

1	MR. HATAMI: Actually, two of them live right
2	next door to me, Wellington.
3	MR. WALSH: OK.
4	MR. HATAMI: And they walk.
5	MR. WALSH: These first parties that you have
6	had, you said the first one was for your granddaughter.
7	I can see that. You own the building. That's great.
8	But then you had a few other parties.
9	How many people were at those other parties
10	that you've had prior to having permission to have, if
11	you follow what I'm saying.
12	MR. HATAMI: I would say average about 40, 50.
13	MR. WALSH: Forty or 50 people. And you have
14	your statement was let me find this.
15	You had said that, Why don't you do what you're
16	doing with that business until you get the permit, or
17	till you fill out paperwork, or something like that. I
18	don't follow that.
19	MR. HATAMI: Honestly, what I'm telling you is
20	the truth. I
21	MR. WALSH: I don't doubt that.
22	MR. HATAMI: I started doing parties and I went
23	to get application through the town.
24	MR. WALSH: From the Village here.
25	MR. HATAMI: From the Village.

1	And they asked me, What do you need the
2	application for? I told them I want to do parties over
3	there. And they told me, Well, start doing it till we
4	let you know when you need to I don't want to put
5	anybody in trouble.
6	MR. WALSH: No. You're not getting anybody in
7	trouble.
8	Here's what I want to know: You just said
9	somebody from this Village from the Building
10	Department, I imagine told you to go ahead with your
11	parties and then, down the road, you'll get the
12	paperwork.
13	Do you know who that was who told you?
14	MR. HATAMI: I know who it is, but I don't want
15	to mention the name.
16	MR. WALSH: OK. That's another part of this
17	story that seems to be quite vague to me, you know. If
18	you don't want to mention the name, and you don't want to
19	mention it, then why did you mention it? You know.
20	MR. HATAMI: Well, you asked me why I did it.
21	MR. WALSH: No. You came here and told us
22	that.
23	MR. HATAMI: Correct.
24	MR. WALSH: OK. I would say that's about all I
25	have for now. Thank you very much.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you, Mr. Walsh.

Any other comments from the Board?

MR. PEREIRA: Yes, if I may again.

MR. HATAMI: Sure.

MR. PEREIRA: You know, as many people know, I'm a history teacher. And in history that was called revisionist history, when people kind of make up the stuff that happened in the past.

I have a letter here addressed to you, December 30, 2014, from the Building Department, from the Superintendent of Buildings, the only person that really matters. And if I could just read you the last sentence -- I'm sure you have this letter -- it says: Until such time kindly cease and desist, underlined, from hosting these gatherings.

There's nothing confusing about that. I don't care what anybody else told you. This is an official letter sent to you in response to your letter that you sent here. So it's pretty clear that it says: Such activity is a violation of the Village of Mineola Zoning Code and should cease immediately.

There's not a lot of ambiguity. And listen, what's gone is gone, but it's the old, you know, the boy who cried wolf kind of story/fable where you keep telling us one thing but the facts point to something else. And

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you may be very honest. Obviously you're a very successful businessman. You have run a great business and, as I said before, we commend you for that. We do not have any other complaints except, you know, you came before us a couple of years ago for one thing. You didn't fulfill that. Then you kind of fulfilled it. you're coming before us for something else and, as somebody mentioned before, are you going to come before us in two years? Are you going to have adult parties there? Are we going to have weddings all of a sudden? Are we going to have catering trucks? Are we going to have live bands, music? What is this going to turn into? It's difficult for us, and the residents, to take you at your word -- and I'm not certainly suggesting that you're lying -- but it's difficult for us to take you at your word when our experience has been different.

so if you understand the position that we're in, we're here to defend the residents and to defend the business owners. You pay taxes and you have rights. You certainly have rights. But you don't have the right to abuse those rights.

so for me, I certainly would like to have some guaranties from you in writing about the type of parties that you're going to have, the type of parties you're not going to have, the size of these parties, the times of

these parties, and many other conditions. Because you're right, maybe it's 12 to 13 year-olds now. But what about if somebody wants to have a small wedding, a 50 person or 75 person wedding? Now you have a band or a DJ. You have a caterer. You have flowers. You have all kinds of things. You're not going to turn down 10, 15, 20 thousand dollars. That's my concern.

So you may have been told my somebody to continue, and that's fine. That's -- I'm not contesting that. I wasn't there. That's between you and the person who told you that. What I know is legally you got a letter with our seal and the signature of our Superintendent of Buildings that said cease and desist.

MR. HATAMI: Correct.

MR. PEREIRA: OK? So that's the only thing that counts.

MR. WALSH: Mayor, just one more thing.

How many square feet was the addition? Do you know?

You did an addition a few years ago. How many square feet, out of the 2,500 square feet, was that addition?

MR. DICKMAN: It was about 8,000 square feet.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Excuse me, sir. If you could

come up to the podium, I'd appreciate it. Sorry.

MR. DICKMAN: It was approximately 8,000 square feet for the whole building, including the mezzanine at that time. So it was about 5,600 feet on the first floor, which was the size of the building that was there that we renovated. It was lot line to lot line.

MR. WALSH: Thank you.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Mr. Hatami, are you going to have a DJ there? What kind of noise are you going to be generating at night in the summer when people have their windows open?

MR. HATAMI: Right. I understand. All the time that I did party I had one complaint, one gentleman came in. I think he lives next to Chaminade.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Marcellus Road.

MR. HATAMI: Marcellus, right.

And complained about noise. And since then I .

(Mr. Hatami hands document to Mr. Scalero.)

MR. HATAMI: I went in -- that night the air conditioning didn't work. It was about 8:00, 8:30 at night. I wasn't there, but they told me that the air conditioning stopped working so we opened the windows and so on, and this gentleman said that the sound was bothering him at 8:30 at night.

So since then I went ahead and I spent about \$10,000. I put the sound system in that place which

sealed everything. All the windows, and so on, they're soundproof. And I have neighbors next door to me, across from me, so on. I don't know, since then, which was in October, I don't think anybody heard sounds or anything like that.

MAYOR STRAUSS: OK. Thank you.

MR. HATAMI: So there is no DJ or anything like that. We control the sound system.

MAYOR STRAUSS: OK. Any other questions from the Board?

MR. PEREIRA: Just to clarify something about what I said before -- and perhaps this was a bit confusing -- at times what we have allowed applicants to do is, if their application is in the process of being before this Board, then we do allow them to continue their use until they're heard here. But prior to that, in other words when you're in violation and you get a cease -- like a stop work order -- you have to stop. Then, once you put your application in -- in that period that it takes you between the application and to be here tonight -- there then may be some flexibility where we allow you to finish the parties.

But certainly I want to be clear that at one point you got a letter that said, you know, cease and desist, which then prompted you to file your application

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once you got this letter.

MR. HATAMI: Correct.

MR. PEREIRA: OK. I just wanted to be clear. But I do appreciate the sound system that you put in.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Any other comments from the Board?

All right. Thank you sir.

We're going to open it up to the public comment I ask that you jot down any questions that might be asked of you from the public.

Anybody wishing to approach the podium will do so in order. Again I ask you -- you can have a seat, sir -- that you speak clearly, state your name and your address for the record, and direct your questions and comments to us.

Anybody in the third row? Third row. Fourth row?

Yes, sir?

Sir, you need to come to the podium, please. Thank you.

MR. ARELLANO: My name is Cesar Arellano. live at 262 Wellington, which is right across where this building is. And several times we find these cars that they are all over. We don't know what's going on. have some guests that come to the house, they don't even

have a place where to park because the vehicles from the building, they are parked there.

Also, the noise. Now the gentleman said that he put some noise barriers and soundproof the building, but the noise is quite loud.

So definitely our concern with this 75 gathering party there. You mentioned you have 50, or up to 50 people that might park there, and then you said there's only 20 people that drop there. So you have actually more room than you say that you --

MAYOR STRAUSS: Sir, if you could talk to us, that would be great.

MR. ARELLANO: Sure. It seems to me that the figures don't really match, 75, then 20, ten, and the trucks. But we live across. So we are affected greatly. And we like to know that -- make sure that if this is approved that there's not going to be anybody that's parking in the street. I mean, we have restrictions, as a resident, from Monday to Friday we can't even park there and then we're going to have somebody just going there and parking there on weekends when we are --

MAYOR STRAUSS: Sir, we can't stop people from parking legally on the street. Anybody can park there legally. What we're trying to look to address is that nobody abused people's curbs, driveway aprons aren't



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blocked and things of that nature. That's one thing.

But people can park on the street. But that's one of the concerns we have here about the parking issues. That's why we brought them up.

MR. ARELLANO: No. Absolutely. That's justifiable. However, if you're going to have 75 people that's coming here every weekend, that's a problem. It's not like sporadically we do have people from the hospital, and they have restrictions, and they come and they park here and there. But if it's going to be every weekend it is a problem.

MAYOR STRAUSS: OK. When was the last time you had a problem with the noise from that building?

MR. ARELLANO: Well, they haven't had -- I guess that was, like, last October. Not this year, because I haven't seen anything.

MAYOR STRAUSS: OK.

MR. ARELLANO: But I would say -- the other thing is, in the second floor, where they're going to have these parties, there are large windows that looks to our bedroom. And at this point I don't know if they have any -- are they going to put anything that covers the windows? Because we are always looking at the window. And frankly, you know, it's a privacy issue at this point.

1	MAYOR STRAUSS: Sir, are you the first house
2	south on Wellington Road?
3	MR. PEREIRA: But across the street.
4	MR. ARELLANO: I'm the second house.
5	MAYOR STRAUSS: You're on the east side, but
6	you're the second house.
7	MR. ARELLANO: The second house.
8	MR. PEREIRA: Mr. Arellano, if I may ask you,
9	how has the parking how long have you been there?
10	MR. ARELLANO: I live there 28 years.
11	MR. PEREIRA: OK. So before they did the
12	renovation, you were already there.
13	MR. ARELLANO: I was there.
14	MR. PEREIRA: How has the situation changed,
15	for the better for the worse, since 2013?
16	MR. ARELLANO: We used to have a problem with
17	the trucks.
18	MR. PEREIRA: Right.
19	MR. ARELLANO: That was a severe problem. And
20	that I can say that it's better because they got moved to
21	the building.
_ 22	MR. PEREIRA: OK. And how about the parking in
23	general now? Have you noticed a difference since they've
24	expanded the business? Is it the same? Is it
25	MR. ARELLANO: Some of the workers, at some

point they start parking their vehicles there and it was, like, if you didn't put the cars on the street it was just, like, there was no way to park because -- especially in the summertime it gets -- I don't know why -- it gets really busy down that corner there.

So we have three vehicles. So we have to be juggling the vehicles back and forth, back and forth to be able to get into the house. Normally we don't have that problem if there's no additional vehicles. But if they start parking all those vehicles there, then we have to go out and try to park down the block to get a space.

MR. PEREIRA: Understood.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you.

MR. ARELLANO: Thank you.

MR. HATAMI: May I answer?

MR. PEREIRA: No. At the end.

MAYOR STRAUSS: At the end. At the end. If you can write down any questions they may have.

Anybody else in the fourth row?

Yes, ma'am?

MS. DeJESUS: Diana DeJesus, 440 White Road, Mineola. Please forgive the phone.

I actually came here for a whole other reason and I realized this is not the time or place, so I figured I'd chime in with this.



Great Neck Games, if you check their web site, they are advertising 5,200 square feet of usable event space, multi-level space, private parking lot, private restrooms, state of the art lighting and audiovisual system. And their services include corporate cocktail parties, conferences, food and wine tastings, meetings, holiday parties, product launches, screenings, tech events and fashion shows, private events including cocktail parties, etcetera.

So I would just encourage that maybe you clarify.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Yes. They don't do everything on site. They do a lot of their business off site.

MS. DeJESUS: But this is listed under their events space --

MAYOR STRAUSS: OK. We'll take a look at that.

MS. DeJESUS: -- Implying --

MR. PEREIRA: Good to know.

MS. DeJESUS: -- that that could happen.

So I guess that's it.

May I ask one question? I would not veer off subject.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Sure.

MS. DeJESUS: When is the appropriate time to come to speak to the Board about commuter parking?



1	MAYOR STRAUSS: Commuter parking? The first or	
2	third Wednesday, about 7:30.	
3	MS. DeJESUS: OK.	
4	MAYOR STRAUSS: Or you can call my office and	
5	I'll call you.	
6	MS. DeJESUS: OK. Because I've come to many,	
7	but I seem to always catch those hearings, Village Green,	
8	or	
9	MAYOR STRAUSS: Call my office tomorrow.	
10	MS. DeJESUS: OK. Thank you very much.	
11	MAYOR STRAUSS: Fourth row. Anybody else in	
12	the fourth row? Fifth row? Fifth row? Sixth row?	
13	Sir?	
14	MR. SULLIVAN: Good evening. My name is John	
15	Sullivan, 228 Wellington Road, Mineola.	
16	Mayor, how are you? I saw you about 45 minutes	
17	ago stuck in a fire truck on Sayville Road with	
18	Chaminade's traffic.	
19	MAYOR STRAUSS: Yes.	
20	MR. SULLIVAN: I've lived here for 30 years	
21	now. It will be 30 years in July. We've had an ongoing	
22	battle with Great Neck Games on this block with the	
23	parking. It dates back to Warren Brinker and John	
ź4	Colbert, fighting tickets.	

He's holding parties. There are bars set up.

1	There are catering trucks out front. Trustee Durham, I
2	called and complained. I'm one of the reasons that this
3	is going on tonight.
4	I walk my dog. You saw me walking my dog. On
5	Saturday night he has adult parties in there. You can't
6	park on the street. I pay my taxes for 30 years. I
7	can't park between 9:00 and 3:00. I got four cars. OK?
8	We're jockeying cars. I'm a valet parker. I don't need
9	his cars all the way down my block, and they are. And
10	you saw what went on that night.
11	His trucks are parked on Jericho Turnpike
12	during his parties, across the street and in front of his
13	building, illegally on Sundays still, but we don't have
14	code enforcement on Sundays
15	MAYOR STRAUSS: We have law enforcement. You
16	can contact
17	MR. SULLIVAN: For the parking.
18	MAYOR STRAUSS: You can contact 911,
19	absolutely.
20	MR. SULLIVAN: OK.
21	MAYOR STRAUSS: And I encourage you to do so.
22	MR. SULLIVAN: Right. We have trouble pulling
23	out of Wellington. This has been an ongoing battle for
24	30 years. OK?
25	He's holding parties. There's a green catering

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truck outside bringing food in like you see in the city. There's bars set up. This was adults. This wasn't children. These were adults. There were cars -- I'm 228 Wellington. I'm one house off of Jackson Avenue. I didn't get the letter. My neighbors told me about it. I had cars from his party parked in front of my house. I want to park in front of my own house one or two days a week.

We have Chaminade. My sons went there. They have events every weekend, alumni and all of that.

Jericho Terrace has valet parking. My friend George sold his house and went out east because he couldn't live on Horton Highway anymore. I don't want to sell my house.

I've been a here a long time. My kids were born here.

OK? I don't think it's right.

And he's already doing it without a permit.

I'm going to build a three story addition on top of my house, rent it out. And if you come after me, we'll discuss it. Is that fair?

MAYOR STRAUSS: That's why we're here.

MR. SULLIVAN: Right. So -- and I remember the original hearings, speaking to who's now Senator Martins. He wanted a party room back then. And you guys said no, I'm pretty sure. So nothing has changed. OK?

The side of his building where the grass is,

take a ride over there. There's garbage all over. Everybody else's utility strip is clean till you get there. There was a broken bottle on the side of his building for a month. I walk around there every night with the dog.

So like you said, history repeats itself. And that's what we have here tonight, history repeating itself. He's taken it upon himself to run another business out of his business without the authorization. And I don't believe anybody from the Village said that, because I've had dealings with the Building Department through the years. I just don't believe it. Leopards don't change their spots, guys.

Please, we need help. We don't need more cars on Wellington. We can't park in front of our own houses now.

Thank you very much.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you, Mr. Sullivan.

MR. WALSH: Excuse me, Mr. Sullivan. Excuse me. When is it you saw --

MR. SULLIVAN: Saturday nights. He holds the parties at night on the weekends. And the last party he had there was a giant drape about halfway across his showroom. The trucks were across the street and the garage door was open. He has 12 spots, not 19. I can



count. OK? He has 12 lined spots, the two in the back and two of them are handicapped. If you're going to do valet parking, there's only one egress to that parking lot in and out. You're going to get 75 cars in and out of there? Houdini couldn't get 75 cars in and out of there picking kids up. So that's why you see them double-parked on Jericho.

My kids are trying to turn out. My wife is trying to turn out. We can't leave our own block when these things go on. It's just not fair. But it's mostly on the weekends at night. And there are DJs in there. There was a DJ in there the one night. And it's in the front. He cleans all the machines out. You know when it's going to happen because you see them on Saturday, during the day they push all the machines out of the front room, and that's when you have the parties.

And you can refute that. I should have videoed it. That's probably what I should have done, but I called the Building Department. They said they sent somebody to speak to him. And that was all I really heard the end of it. And then, of course, Trustee Durham saw it and here we are tonight. OK.

So this has been going on for a long time and it's on his web site. Contrary to what he told you, kids parties, he's catering everything under the sun that will

bring money. You're right. If you come with money, you can play. And that's not fair to the people who live there. We live there 24/7. We're not there during the day, you know, for a few hours and it's my business and stuff. I owned businesses for a long time. But he's not a good neighbor, I can tell you that much, and never has been in the whole time he's been there.

Thank you.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you, Mr. Sullivan. We'll go back to the fifth row.

Yes, sir?

MR. PONTOLILLO: Mayor, Board of Trustees, my name is George Pontolillo. I live at 240 Wellington Road.

I will try not to repeat things that other people have said, but I'm very concerned with the number of people that he's going to have in that place because I've heard that they're going to have parties with up to a 150 people that that room can accommodate. We can't handle those kind of cars. You guys have already realized that and pointed it out. I mean, he's got a very small parking lot, and we have a lot of parking problems on our block as it is. As John just said, we have restricted parking during the week. You can't put your car in the street between 9:00 and 3:00. I have a





long driveway. I have several cars, and sometimes I have to jockey them, park them in front of my house. And when we have a lot of other people out there parking in front I don't have the opportunity to do that and it becomes an inconvenience.

Some things I'm concerned about with the parties, A, was food being brought in, and where all that garbage is going to end up going? And is alcohol being served? Do we have a liquor license here that's legit to do that kind of thing?

I mean, everybody knows he's already had parties, illegally from what I understand, and we're totally against that. I don't think that that establishment should be doing that. I mean, I've lived on that street for over 42 years. I've lived almost my whole life in Mineola. I came out here when I was five years old. That was Rosner Hardware (phonetic), if anybody remembers. Paul, you might. I don't know.

But when Great Neck Games came in we had trouble for years. And I'm sure you're aware of it. I'm not going to go into it. It got cleaned up a bit when they closed that garage door on the side. But I still try to come out on Jericho Turnpike and make a left turn and can't see because his trucks are parked across the sidewalk and blocking your view. And sometimes they're

parked in the street. And they're huge. Not to mention noise that we used to hear from when they used to load them, particularly on weekends when you can sleep in on a Saturday in the summer and you may have windows open and they're throwing all their stuff in the vans or trucks or whatever you want to call it.

But basically that's all I want to say.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you, Mr. Pontolillo.

Anybody else in the fifth row?

Ma'am?

MS. PONTOLILLO: My name is Paula Pontolillo.

I live at 240 Wellington Road. My husband just spoke.

Everybody has covered pretty much everything that I came here to talk about. I do want to emphasize that our mail carrier said that she went in one day. And there was a lot of music going on. And she was asking what's going on in there. And whoever talked to her said, Oh, go on in. Take a look at it. We have parties in there. And she was told that they could fit up to 150 people in there. And she looked at it and she said it was big enough for a wedding to be in there. The music was going. And the guy told her how much it would cost. And, you know, it's wrong.

First of all, they didn't have approval for it.

And we've lived there 43 years. And they've not been a





good neighbor to us at all. And like I said, everybody's covered pretty much everything that I wanted to say. But I want you to know that we're not happy about it and we don't think that he should be approved or allowed to have parties there.

Thank you.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you.

MR. WALSH: Can I ask you a question?

MS. PONTOLILLO: Sure.

MR. WALSH: Did you just say that your friend told you that she went inside and saw that?

MS. PONTOLILLO: Yes.

MAYOR STRAUSS: And was that party on the first floor or on the mezzanine floor?

MS. PONTOLILLO: I think she said she walked upstairs.

MR. WALSH: OK. Thank you.

MS. PONTOLILLO: She walked up some stairs and she said the room was huge, and the guy told her that it would fit up to 150 people. That's a wedding. It's not a little party, not for a birthday and not for kids. That's a lot of people.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you, ma'am.

Anybody else in the fifth row?

MR. ARAUJO: Good evening. My name is Fernando



Araujo, 255 Wellington Road, Mineola.

I'm here to say I no approve the parties there because he have too many cars over there already. Last time I saw a party there somebody parked in front of my house. He came to the back, to the -- to the -- he throw the wiper into the car, from the back. He left. I saw them change the wiper. Then I saw the wiper in the street, but I saw that after the car leaving. He's outside waiting for the Portuguese club, I pass through. The party is there. The person, they went there. That's why that's too many cars already.

That's it. Thank you.

 MAYOR STRAUSS: All right. Thank you, Mr. Araujo.

Anybody else in the fifth row? Sixth row? Seventh row? Anybody else?

Sir, if you could approach the podium. Come back up. Yes, sir.

 You obviously heard the concerns of the residents. Go ahead, if you want to talk about what they said.

MR. HATAMI: Well, I appreciate that most of you think that I'm a very bad neighbor, and during the last 33 years I give you nothing but grief. But the truth of the matter is right now we have a chandelier in



Jericho Turnpike, in Mineola, that people walk around and praise the building. And I'm proud to present Mineola with that building, and your neighbors, my neighbors. It used to be used as a lot. That you're right, I had trucks. When I came to Mineola 33 years ago I was allowed to park the trucks on the street, and after a few years I --

MR. WALSH: Excuse me, Mayor --

MR. HATAMI: I'm sorry. After a few years, while I was away, they told me that they took the parking signs away and they put down signs that says no standing. So we went in -- at the time Amoco was next to me -- and we rented space from them.

It's one thing that you people don't realize, this is a commercial zone area.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Sir, direct your comments to me.

MR. HATAMI: I'm sorry.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you.

MR. HATAMI: This is a commercial zoned area.

I'm paying \$128,000 a year tax. So if I can't -- if I

can't have a party for 50 kids -- I don't have a wedding

place. I never did a wedding in my life in my place. I

never, never, since I built my building, got a ticket for

my trucks or anything else. As a matter of fact, the





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sign in front of my store that it says "No Standing" was knocked out -- I don't know by a storm or whatever -- and I called the town. I said, please, people are parking in here and my neighbors can not see when they make a left turn. So please bring back the sign. I went three, four times to the town to do so. I do protect the town. I give a lot of business to the community here.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Sir.

MR. HATAMI: I employ the people to work for me from the town. I'm running a decent operation. So I do not have windows facing this gentleman's home. The windows in the warehouse is 24-feet high on the ceiling. Never he can open them or something. Nobody look at anybody's home because you can't get 24-foot high. So I do not have no windows.

I do not park on Wellington. Not one time.

Not one time. You keep forgetting that there are five, six other places that do parties. Just the Cornerstone bar, across the street from me, they have -- they come into my parking lot and park over there. And I don't do parties every Saturday night or Sunday night. I did party maybe -- the whole 2015 maybe I did two parties, at the max. So not every Saturday is my cars. That's where we living in. That's where all the stores and bars and chicken place and Jericho Terrace.

Chaminade, when we come in Saturday morning, we can't walk over there. Do you think the cars belong to my place? I have a wholesale place. People walk in my store maybe two, three people a day. I do not park -- since I put my new building up -- in any street, none of my employees, none of my trucks and so on. I have not got one ticket since I put my new building up.

So I am paying your taxes and you're complaining about my business. I appreciate. I appreciate. I don't have no --

MAYOR STRAUSS: Sir

MR. HATAMI: -- no broken bottle over there.

If it snows, immediately after snow stops we clear up the whole area, the whole entire block over there. If anything happens, we watch for everybody's safety and so on.

so please, have a heart. I understand you have a home. I'm a homeowner. I understand your reasons to be upset and so on. But I am having kids over here. You guys telling me I'm doing weddings over there. You ask me, I'm bringing 75 cars. I'm telling you I have a parking spot. I have valet parking. You can go right now and see the signs that I have. And I watch everything that I can do and I'm telling you guys, we need the revenue in order to survive, and that's the only

way I can get it. So . . .

MAYOR STRAUSS: Sir, I have a question.

MR. HATAMI: Sure.

MAYOR STRAUSS: There was a comment made about bars. You have an adult party. Have you had any adult parties there?

MR. HATAMI: Not to my knowledge.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Not to your knowledge.

Have you served any liquor in the building?

MR. HATAMI: If liquor was served, it was coming in with a licensed caterer that has outside license. I don't have no kitchen facility, none, forever. The only thing I have in my premises is a little microwave oven and a refrigerator.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Now the residents -- we certainly appreciate and we certainly understand about your taxes. Businesses pay a huge amount of taxes in Nassau County, New York State, and certainly the Village. But that doesn't allow anybody the right to trample on our neighbors.

So what assurances can you give, should this be approved, that you're going to be a good neighbor, be a better neighbor than you are.

I know that people can legally park in front of other people's homes. There's nothing we can do about

it. But there comes a point where sometimes the patrons of the business trample on the neighborhood. And I totally agree with you, there are other businesses in the community, in that area of Mineola, that do a decent job of trampling on the neighborhoods that they're around because of the parking issues, and they take liberties and they park illegally. And I myself have called 911 many times for parking issues that I see in the area when our Village Code Enforcement personnel aren't working. And I encourage everybody to do so themselves.

But what assurances can you possibly give that the cars aren't going to be double-parked on Jericho Turnpike or Wellington Road? And I don't know if there are any assurances that you can give, because you can't control everybody that pulls up in their own car. But what would you like to say to the community? Why should we approve this for you, other than because you pay taxes.

MR. HATAMI: Like I said, I'm here 33 years.

That's a long time. I know some of you are here 42

years. And we came a long way. We lived together. And

I promised you guys that you don't see any car, any car

parked from my business, or the parties that I do, on

Wellington or Marcellus. We never, ever, ever use your

driveways as our parking spot. And if you tell me we

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doing it, then you can have all the right in the world to do whatever you want to do.

I personally, even when we have 10, 15 cars, I made sure that we have a valet parking. And the bank, the reason the bank allows me to do that -- you know, they not in love with me. So I'm going to tell you what happened. When they built their building they came in, like, almost 14 inches, 16 inches into my property. And I went over there and I asked them, you know, I'm doing these parties and, please, you know, I'm not going to do anything, please give us OK to park in your facility. And they were very, very happy to agree with us. that's how I got that parking spot. And that parking spot, as small as it is -- and also, in my plan I do have 19 parking spots. I'm not lying to you, because I have proof for it. I have 17 spots and two handicapped spots. If I park my truck on Jericho Turnpike sometimes, it's because we go to have Chinese food, or they going to go to Panera to have food or something. The drivers park the car and they go to have lunch. Never my car is parked outside of my parking lot. We solved that problem long, long time ago.

Yes, I did have problem with Fire Department.

I did have problems closing my driveway, but those are

part of building my building. I did what I supposed to

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do. I obey everything you guys tell me to do. And trust me when I told you it was 100 percent kosher. I did not make stories.

And yes, we do events for 500 people, but I don't do it in my place. We do events for all kind of corporate parties and so on. We go as far as London, we go as far as Bermuda, we go as far as Puerto Rico to do parties. I advertise for it. That doesn't mean I'm doing it in my place. And we do rent space also for 500 people, if you ask me to do so. We have different places that we get lease and we recommend to people. Yes, we do that. And it's all of those in our web site. And it is not imaginable for me to do that kind of party in 2,500 square feet.

You people are all intelligent people and so on and, you know, I understand. I appreciate all the problems. But let's -- you told me that you don't have a clear trust in me. I understand how you feel. But all these years, like you said, I'm a business person. I tried to protect my business, and I tried to protect the place that I'm doing business with. So there's under no circumstances that I will do anything to hurt these people or this neighborhood.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you.

Any other comments from the Board? Mr.



Pereira? MR. PEREIRA: Yes. Thank you. 2 Do you have an elevator that goes up to the 3 mezzanine? 4 MR. HATAMI: We have a freight elevator. 5 MR. PEREIRA: So it's ADA compliant, I assume, 6 and the bathrooms and all of that. Because when you came 7 in for an approval it was a different approval. 8 didn't require public assembly. And again, much of that 9 is outside the purview of this Board. But will there 10 be -- and perhaps your the architect, Mr. Dickman, could 11 answer this. Are there going to be alterations that will 12 have to be made in order to accommodate people with 13 disabilities in the bathrooms, certainly ADA compliant up 14 stairs, Fire Marshal code? All of that will certainly 15 have to change because the use would be changed. 16 MR. HATAMI: Correct. The bathrooms are all 17 The freight elevator has to be adjusted handicap access. 18 in order to bring handicapped people up, yes. 19 MR. PEREIRA: OK. And that's something you 20 have to do --21 MR. HATAMI: Correct. 22 MR. PEREIRA: -- pending approval. 23 You know, I do appreciate, without a doubt that 24 corner and the corner of the bank looks 1,000 times 25

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better than it did five years ago. I don't think anybody will dispute that. That Amoco is not there anymore and the bank certainly looks nice. They put up a beautiful building. You put up a beautiful building. That's what we want. We appreciate that. But as the Mayor said, that doesn't mean that you can certainly -- and you pay \$120,000 or \$130,000. We appreciate that as well. But these people pay taxes as well. And that's what we're here for. We have to balance your needs and wants with our residents' needs and wants.

MR. HATAMI: Right.

MR. PEREIRA: And I also appreciate the fact that you may not be the only culprit on the block. We understand that. But you're the only one here before us today. So -- and you may get some --

MR. HATAMI: Thank you. Thank you very much.

MR. PEREIRA: And you may get some residual blame where perhaps you don't deserve it. But the picture that you're painting is that you don't deserve any blame. It's, you know, It wasn't me. And that's not the complete story. I'm not saying it's always you, but it has from time to time. You know, you have 42 years, 28 years, 30 years of experience. They're not making it all up either. So yes, it could be a car going to the Portuguese center, or to the Cornerstone, or to



Chaminade, but it could be a car going to Great Neck Games also. Let's concede that it could be.

MR. HATAMI: Honestly --

Mr. Pereira, right?

MR. PEREIRA: Correct.

MR. HATAMI: If I'm pronouncing it right.

-- if I had parties there every weekend, every Saturday, and Sunday, and Friday, I wouldn't be even in to talk to you about it. I have parties very, very rare. I want to do it right. I want to put a sign up there that says I'm housing the party. I'm not going to lie about what I'm going to do. I'm going to -- I want to be protected, because I pay tremendous amount of insurance and so on. So I'm not going to risk my building and my business to do something that small scale.

So what I'm doing is trying to raise my income in order to survive in this place, and I'm trying to do it the right way. That's why I'm here tonight. So you guys tell me what the right way is, I'm doing it wrong, and I obey those orders. Like I did before when we build that building, even though we had some difficulties, but I came through and you guys approved to have that place.

So I'm here tonight in good faith. And I want to live with you guys again. And I'm living with you guys. So you guys are all watching me because you walk



every Saturday and so on.

When was the last time that gentleman heard music? You heard him say maybe sometime in October, last October. I showed you what I did to solve that problem. If any other problem I have, please let me know. And I promise you, the parking lot you have absolutely, I guaranty you that have absolutely no problem because I do have the parking lot next door, which means a lot. I can park a lot of cars over there.

I'm not doing weddings over there. I never booked weddings over there. I don't have 150 people capacity. It's impossible to put, in 2,500 square feet, 150 people. I'm not doing any of those things. If the birthday party comes in there is -- sometimes there's a bar mitzvah, there's 30, 40 kids and then there's ten adults, maybe, 15 adults. That's max.

When I set up a bar -- I own a lot of bars, portable bars, light it up, beautiful bars and so on.

You can see it on my web site. I put the bar over there. That doesn't mean I'm serving alcohol. I'm serving beverages to the kids and so on.

I make the place very nice. I put lounge chairs in there. You know, that's what it is. I put lights in there. The place looks beautiful. And I'm not doing anything, you know, to hurt people. I'm not -- if



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I do a gathering of 40, 50 people, yes, you see some kind of traffic going in there, which going to every place. When you have weddings on Jericho turnpike, the cars, you know, to make a turn here to come to Jericho Terrace, have you ever seen it? You know, you have to wait sometimes five minutes before, you know, it clears up. When Chaminade has all those events and so on, you come in Saturday morning, or sometime like that, you can't walk on the street. You can't walk. I'm not doing anything compared to those people. When Portuguese people have those big, big, two, three hundred people parties, they all come to my parking lot. Cornerstone bar always, always. I put the gate over there. sure people stand over there for them not to come and park in my place. They go back of my lot, you know. put a gate over there with a lock so they can't go in there.

So I'm really -- you know, what I'm asking is not that what you guys picturing. I am doing something to help myself, help my place, and help Mineola. I have people from this town. I forgot his name. He's a police officer for so many years. He got retired. We ask him when we have, like, 50, 60 kids, to come over there as a security guard to make sure that nothing happens, or the cars all parked properly, everything else.

1	You tell me what you want me to do and I'll be
2	happy to obey to do it. And again, I want to live with
3	you guys. I want to be here. Even though some people
4	hate me, I want to make those people happy also and
5	MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you, Mr. Hatami.
6	MR. HATAMI: I appreciate all your time.
7	MAYOR STRAUSS: Any other comments from the
8	Board?
9	MR. DURHAM: Can we place restrictions on the
10	number of guests?
11	MAYOR STRAUSS: We can do that in the decision.
12	Any other comments?
13	MR. WALSH: Yes. I just wanted to ask
14	something. First of all, no one up here hates you.
15	We're just here this is what we do. You came here for
16	an application.
17	MR. HATAMI: I understand.
18	MR. WALSH: And we're here and we have to have
19	everyone's concerns, including the neighbors.
20	Are you asking us for a place just for
21	children, and you're willing to state here on the record
22	that you won't have any adult parties there?
23	MR. HATAMI: When you do children let's say
24	you do a bar mitzvah, which we do a lot, there's always
0.5	20 20 poorlo coming in with that adult maybe you know

1	immediate family and so on, and the rest is kids.
2	Twenty, 30 kids, maybe 20, 30 adults.
3	So when you say adult party, what do you mean?
4	Like a 50th birthday party?
5	MR. WALSH: No. I mean that, you know, for
6	example, if there's a place that has there's a place
7	in Williston Park that has parties that cater to young
8	children that have birthday parties, such like that, and
9	the adults usually stay outside. A bar mitzvah or
10	it's different. Maybe there's adults. I'm just trying
11	to find out what kind of party you're having, and you
12	said to your knowledge you haven't had any adult parties
13	there.
14	Would there be a possibility that there could
15	be an adult party without you having knowledge of it?
16	MR. HATAMI: I can not lie to you. I did my
17	41st birthday of my daughter there.
18	MR. WALSH: But that's your daughter. I
19	mean
20	MR. HATAMI: No. I'm just telling you.
21	MR. WALSH: OK. Thank you. That's all.
22	MAYOR STRAUSS: Any other comments from the
23	Board?
24	I'll entertain Mr. Gibbons, do you have
25	anything?

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1	MR. GIBBONS: If it's the Board's intention to
2	close the hearing, we should have a SEQRA determination.
3	MAYOR STRAUSS: OK.
4	MR. GIBBONS: I would recommend a Type II
5	action.
6	MAYOR STRAUSS: All right.
7	MR. GIBBONS: And I would also like to note for
8	the record, by letter dated March 16, 2015, the Nassau
9	County Planning Commission recommended local
10	determination.
11	MAYOR STRAUSS: I'll entertain a motion for

Mr. Ciccone, I'm going to put you on the hot seat again and drag you up to the podium.



But we are really in a good position. And thank you for your efforts.

So I support this budget, Mayor, and I'm ready to adopt it this evening.

MR. CUSATO: Mr. Pereira kind of hit it right on the head. We're in great shape and, Giac, you did a great job, you and your staff, putting all the numbers together.
