MR. SCALERO: Ladies and gentlemen, please silence all pagers and cell phones. In the event of an emergency there are exits located in the rear of the room.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Good evening, ladies and gentlemen. We have a couple of topics we need to have hearings on this evening. I'm going to ask Mr. Scalero, we're going to do one and roll right through them and make this as painless as possible. Appreciate you coming out this evening.

Mr. Scalero?

MR. SCALERO: "Notice of public hearing.

"Notice is hereby given that on Wednesday, May 13, 2015 a public hearing, as required by Section 147(f) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, (The "Code"), will be held by the Incorporated Village of Mineola Board of Trustees with respect to the proposed issuance by the Public Finance Authority (The "Authority"), a commission organized under and pursuant to the provisions of Sections 66.0301, of 66.0303 and 66.0304 of the Wisconsin Statutes, of its revenue bonds, in one or more series (the "Bonds"), in an amount not to exceed \$15,000,000. The hearing will commence at 6:30 p.m., or as soon thereafter as the matter can be heard, and will be held at the Mineola Village Hall, 155 Washington Avenue,

Mineola, New York 11501.

"The proceeds of the bonds will be used (1) to finance and/or refinance capital improvements to or equipment purchases for the school facilities of Chaminade High School, a program within the Province of Meribah, Society of Mary, Inc. (the "Borrower"), located at 340 Jackson Avenue, Mineola, New York 11501, including construction of new academic facilities, improvements to the HVAC, electric and wireless internet systems, and improvements to the Borrower's football/track and field complex; and (2) to finance certain costs of issuing the Bonds.

"All of the above facilities are owned and operated by the Borrower, an organization described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Code.

"The Bonds are expected to be issued by the Authority pursuant to Section 66.0304 of the Wisconsin Statutes, as amended. The Bonds will be limited obligations of the Authority payable only from the loan repayments to be made by the Borrower to the Authority, and certain funds and accounts established by the financing agreement for the bonds. The bonds will not be a general obligation of the Incorporated Village of Mineola, (the "Village"). Issuance of the bonds will not obligate the Village to levy or pledge any form of

taxation for the Bonds or to make any appropriation for the payment of the Bonds.

"The hearing will provide a reasonable opportunity for expression of opinion, for argument on the merits, and for introduction of documentary evidence pertinent to the proposed issuance of the Bonds. Written comments will be accepted by Joseph R. Scalero, Village Clerk, at Mineola Village Hall, 155 Washington Avenue, Mineola, New York 11501, but must be received on or before the time and date of the hearing. The hearing site is handicapped accessible, including parking.

Individuals with disabilities who need mobility, visual, hearing, and/or other assistance for effective participation should direct a request for assistance to Joseph R. Scalero at 516-746-0750 in advance of the meeting.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you.

This type of hearing is a rarity in the Village of Mineola. The last one that was done was in 2010. So I'm going to ask our attorney, Mr. Gibbons, to kind of explain it a little bit, if you don't mind.



MR. GIBBONS: Sure. I'll try to add to what Mr. Scalero said.

MAYOR STRAUSS: That was so clear. I don't know if you need to.

MR. GIBBONS: Chaminade is seeking financing for capital improvements of the school through the Public Finance Authority. The Public Finance Authority is authorized to issue tax exempt, taxable and tax credit conduit bonds for public and private entities throughout the 50 states. Pursuant to Section 147(f) of the Internal Revenue Code, prior to the issuance of these bonds the host political jurisdiction, in this case Mineola, must conduct a public hearing and must approve the Authority's issuance of bonds to finance the project. Although the Authority will be the issuer, the financing can not proceed without the Village of Mineola's approval of the financing.

The Incorporated Village of Mineola is not a party to any of the financing documents relating to the issuance of the bonds and is not named in any of the disclosure documents describing the bonds or in the proposed financing. Therefore, the Village of Mineola has no liability with respect to the issuance of bonds or the repayment of any debt service related to such bonds. In effect, the Village is using its good offices to

enable one of its residents, the Chaminade High School, to avail itself of favorable bonding through the Public Finance Authority.

The Village has undertaken to conduct a public hearing and to take any public comment with respect to the financing, and at the end of the public comment the Board has the opportunity to approve the bond without any liability, financial or otherwise, upon the Village.

And, Mayor, I have submitted to the Village

Clerk a copy of the resolution in proper form, if the

Board of Trustees chooses to approve the application of

Chaminade.

Thank you.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you.

So in essence, folks, the Village has no stake in the game. Jump in here, Mr. Gibbons, if I say something incorrect. No stake in the game. We're not held liable for anything that's being conducted tonight. We just have to host the hearing.

So as good hosts that we are, we're going to ask the applicant to come up to the podium. Please speak clearly and slowly for our reporter so she can document everything that's said. State your name and your address and why you're here, and we'll move along.

Gentlemen, please.

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MR. DUFEK: Mr. Mayor, Trustees, thank you for taking the time to meet with us this evening.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Excuse me. If you could adjust the microphone up a little bit.

MR. DUFEK: Sure. Absolutely.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you.

MR. DUFEK: My name is Thomas Dufek. address is 12 Donna Court, Huntington, New York 11743. I'm a proud member of the Board of Advisers of Chaminade High School and I've worked with the school for close to 30 years.

We had done -- the previous bond issue, Mr. Mayor, that you referred to was a Chaminade bond issue that was done in December of 2010, which is virtually an identical issue to the one we're now proposing, including the fact that the same public funding authority is being used and the same financing bank is being used as well, out in Denver. I was involved in both of those bond issues, and I'm here tonight with Bro. Thomas Cleary, the President of Chaminade, as well as Joe Horan, who has been the Project Manager working on a number of the projects that we're seeking reimbursement for.

We're primarily seeking the reimbursement at a time where the bonds are at a very low rate and,

1	therefore, we have spent a lot of cash on the things that
2	we've done and, while the bond rate is low, we'd like to
3	take advantage of the opportunity to finance longer term
4	assets with long well, no longer terms assets with
5	long term assets, rather.
6	If you have any questions I'm happy to
7	undertake them.
8	MAYOR STRAUSS: I have no questions.
9	Anybody on the Board.
10	MR. PEREIRA: No.
11	MAYOR STRAUSS: Mr. Pereira?
12	MR. PEREIRA: No.
13	MR. WALSH: No.
14	MAYOR STRAUSS: Mr. Gibbons, do you have any
15	questions?
16	MR. GIBBONS: I have no questions.
17	MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you.
18	MR. DUFEK: Thank you very much to the Village
19	for your time. Appreciate it.
20	MAYOR STRAUSS: We appreciate everything that
21	you guys do. It's a great organization.
22	At this time I'll open up to public comment.
23	And if anybody is wishing to make comment on the
24	Chaminade hearing, please approach the podium and speak
25	clearly and state your name and address for the record.

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MAYOR STRAUSS: All right. Mr. Scalero, you want to go on with the second?

MR. SCALERO: Yes, sir.

"Application of Salvatore Ferrara, architect, for the New York College of Traditional Chinese Medicine for a Special Use Permit pursuant to Chapter 550 of the Code of the Incorporated Village of Mineola, entitled 'Zoning,' Section 550.14, entitled 'B-3 Districts,' Subsection (B), entitled 'Special Uses,' for the purpose of operating the New York College of Traditional Chinese Medicine on the fourth, fifth and sixth floor of the property known as 200 Old Country Road, Mineola, New York, known and designated on the Nassau County Land and Tax Map as Section 9, Block 429, Lots 142, 144.

"The Village of Mineola does not discriminate on the basis of handicapped status in administration or

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access to or employment in its projects and activities. Joseph R. Scalero has been directed to coordinate compliance with non-discrimination requirements of the Federal Revenue Sharing regulations.

"At this scheduled meeting of its Board of Trustees reserved decisions from previous meetings, if any, may be acted upon by the Board of Trustees.

"At the aforesaid time and place all interested persons will be given an opportunity to be heard.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you, Mr. Scalero.

Mr. Whalen, anything?

MR. WHALEN: Yes, sir. We had the appropriate -- I'm sorry -- Affidavit of Mailing. There were 85 mailed, 48 were returned and none went unclaimed.

> MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you.

Mr. Gibbons, anything?

MR. GIBBONS: I don't have anything, Mayor.

MAYOR STRAUSS: All right. Excellent.

This will be the format for tonight's hearing. As mentioned earlier, the applicants will make their presentation to the Board. The Board will interact with **(4)**

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the applicants and ask any questions that we may have, and then we'll open it up for public comment. Again, I ask anybody approaching the podium to please state your name, your address and certainly identify yourself as to what you can bring to the applicants and to the table here.

Gentlemen.

MR. WHITE: Good evening, Mr. Mayor and Members of the Board. My name is Matthew White, the attorney for the applicant, 229 Seventh Street, Garden City, New York 11530.

Tonight the applicant is seeking a special permit pursuant to Section 550.14 of the Zoning Code of the Incorporated Village of Mineola for the purpose of operating the New York College of Traditional Chinese Medicine on the fourth, fifth and sixth floors of the building located at 200 Old Country Road. Reit Management and Research, LLC manages the building on behalf of SNH Medical Office Property Trust. And the college is seeking to relocate its facilities from 155 First Street to the building at 200 Old Country Road.

With me tonight are Sal Ferrara, the architect, of Combined Resources Consulting and Design, Inc., James Zeppa, senior property manager for Reit, and Drs. Yemeng Chen and James Bare, the president and dean,



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respectively, of the college. These men are here tonight to answer any questions the Board may have.

MAYOR STRAUSS: All right. Thank you.

MR. WHITE: As background, the college is a fully accredited institution offering instruction in acupuncture and herbal medicine. The college is chartered by the Board of Regents of the University of the State of New York and has been so since, I believe, 1997, or 1996. I'm sorry. The college first saw its enrollment in 1996, when it was located at 142 Mineola Boulevard. As I mentioned before, in 1999 the college relocated to 155 First Street and there it remains today.

The downtown area of Mineola is an ideal location for the college as approximately half of the students commute by way of mass transit, And it is for this reason that the college has enjoyed a benign impact with regard to traffic and parking.

Additionally, the college offers most of its courses on Saturday and Sunday, with a limited amount of classes and clinics conducted during the week. As such, again, this is another component of the college's ability to offer benign impact with regard to parking and traffic.

The proposed build out will provide the college with approximately 135 classroom seats and numerous

treatment rooms for practical instruction. The student enrollment of the school is approximately 150 students, and they attend classes on a staggered schedule. At any given moment the maximum occupancy of the building, as

far as students goes, is usually about 75 to 80 students.

At this time I will defer to Mr. Ferrara, who will describe in better detail than I can the build out, which -- did the Board receive copies of these plans and materials? I know they were submitted. They may have gone to the BZA instead.

MAYOR STRAUSS: We don't have them here.

MR. WHITE: All right. So maybe we'll move them closer, then?

MAYOR STRAUSS: That's fine. That's fine.

MR. FERRARA: Good evening. My name is Salvatore Ferrara. I'm a registered architect in the State of New York. The name of my company is Combined Resources Consulting and Design. We're the design architects.

Our application is basically the fitting out of the spaces which are stacked pretty much over each other along what would be the north and west side of the building. So it's the side on the corner of Old Country Road and Mineola Boulevard, closer towards the north side which faces Winthrop University Hospital.



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The fourth floor, which is up on the board currently, is largely fitted out for classroom space.

The sixth floor is also fitted out for classroom space.

The fifth floor, which is the floor in between, is

largely an office space and some treatment rooms where

they do some of the acupuncture.

The way we have it set up is that the sixth floor, which is a little bit of a larger space, actually has a lounge space for both teachers and for the students. So their congregations largely are held up on that sixth level. The day-to-day operation, which is really the fifth floor, is largely an office function which runs and manages the business of the college. The level below it is also a classroom space, some of which are lecture halls, some of which actually have tables for computer and learning off of the computer.

It's a fairly simple application. We were lucky enough to have not really a whole space that we could put them in, but the ability to stack them up over each other. It's in close proximity to what would be the west staircase in the building. So the students would be basically using, if they had to go from one floor to the next, an internal staircase.

The building, as you know, has a parking lot in the back. The parking lot does enter on the fourth



floor, which is the lower level from which we're entering. So we feel that this is a fairly good mix for them because most of the student population will be coming in off of the railroad. It also is good that we have the back entrance which connects to the railroad platform just through the parking lot.

Their current facility, which is down the block, also gives great familiarity. So we feel as if this is a nice marriage for them to move in the same location and still have an active facility.

Part of what we have here is also a library, which is on the fourth floor. Libraries these days are a combination of books and also study carrels in terms of computers. So we've housed basically all of the necessity of both the learning portion of the building for them on the sixth and fourth floor, and the day-to-day operation on the fifth floor.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Great. Thank you.

MR. WHITE: I have the doctors from the school, if you have any questions with regard to enrollment or class size.

MAYOR STRAUSS: If you're done with your presentation, we'll ask any questions that we may have.

MR. WHITE: Fine. I'm finished.

MAYOR STRAUSS: You answered some of the

questions that I have. 1 The hours of operation on Saturday and Sunday 2 would be what? 3 DR. CHEN: Hi, Mr. Mayor and Trustees. MAYOR STRAUSS: How are you, sir. 5 DR. CHEN: I'm Yemeng Chen, the president of 6 the New York College of Traditional Chinese Medicine. 7 Thank you to have a hearing today. 8 The class, because most student is second 9 career for some people that went for the -- so most class 10 will be the Saturday, and Friday night and Saturday, and 11 some class will be the Sunday. So the total enrollment 12 is 150, but I think the maximum students attending is 13 around 100. 14 MR. WHITE: I believe the Saturday hours --15 approximately nine a.m. to 10:00 p.m. on Saturdays. 16 MAYOR STRAUSS: I missed it in your 17 presentation, Mr. White. 18 How long have you been at 155 First Street. 19 MR. WHITE: Since 2001, I believe. 20 1999, I think. 21 DR. CHEN: MAYOR STRAUSS: 1999? 22 DR. CHEN: 1999. 23 MR. WHITE: I'm sorry. You're right. 24 MAYOR STRAUSS: And as far as I know, the 25

school has been going very, very well. 1 DR. CHEN: Yes. Thank you. 2 MAYOR STRAUSS: You know, it's been a good part 3 of the community down there, and thank you. 4 So in essence you're just moving from one spot 5 to another location. 6 DR. CHEN: Yes, sir. 7 MAYOR STRAUSS: You're not new to the Village 8 So I appreciate you staying here. 9 at all. DR. CHEN: Thank you. 10 MAYOR STRAUSS: Mr. Pereira? 11 MR. PEREIRA: Thank you. 12 Do you have any satellite campuses, or is this -13 DR. CHEN: We have one teaching clinic. We 14 rent a space in Manhattan, 37th Street in Manhattan. And 15 we also have two facility can use for student practice, 16 one is SUNY Farmingdale health care center, and another 17 one is in lower Manhattan, Gouverneur Hospital. 18 MR. PEREIRA: OK. Outstanding. 19 I realize that most of your students will be 20 taking public transportation. It makes sense. And as 21 the Mayor has mentioned, most people probably are finding 22 out for the first time tonight that this college even 23 existed in the Village because you have been outstanding 24

neighbors.

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1	Has the management company are there a
2	number of parking spots in that garage that are.
3	DR. CHEN: Assigned.
4	MR. PEREIRA: that are assigned to you? Do
5	you know how many those are?
б	DR. CHEN: Sixty.
7	MR. PEREIRA: Sixty? Six-zero?
8	MR. ZEPPA: I believe it's 100.
9	MR. PEREIRA: One hundred. OK.
10	And you're not likely to exceed that number on
11	any given time.
12	DR. CHEN: No.
13	MR. PEREIRA: OK.
14	DR. CHEN: No. We're happy with it, but
15	because common parking lot with the law firm, our current
16	landlord is a little bit tight.
17	MR. PEREIRA: I have a couple of questions for
18	the gentlemen from the management company, if you don't
19	mind. Thank you.
20	MR. ZEPPA: Thank you, Mr. Mayor, Trustees. My
21	name is James Zeppa. I'm the senior property manager for
22	SNH Properties Trust at 200 Old Country Road. My home
23	address is 7 Burnett Terrace, West Orange, New Jersey
24	07052.

MR. PEREIRA: Oh, so you have an easy commute

1	to work. Very nice. Perfect.
2	MR. ZEPPA: I manage assets in New Jersey,
3	Manhattan and Long Island, too.
4	MR. PEREIRA: So reverse commutes are
5	MR. ZEPPA: Yes. Yes.
6	MR. PEREIRA: I mean, this doesn't have
7	anything necessarily to do with this applicant per se,
8	but just as a matter of interest, what are they replacing
9	on the fourth, fifth and sixth floor?
10	MR. ZEPPA: They're replacing office space. It
11	was just attorneys space that's vacant.
12	MR. PEREIRA: What would you say is the
13	percentage of vacancy now in terms of obviously this
14	is going to take up a big chunk of that.
15	MR. ZEPPA: We're going to be in the 90's right
16	now.
17	MR. PEREIRA: So you would be close to max
18	occupancy, which is good. We want to hear that.
19	MR. ZEPPA: Yes.
20	MR. PEREIRA: And then you have access,
21	obviously, through that bridge that crosses over, right?
22	MR. ZEPPA: Yes, sir.
23	MR. PEREIRA: So that's where their parking
24	spots are?
25	MR. ZEPPA: That's correct.

1	MR. PEREIRA: For the most part.
2	OK. That's all I wanted, questions for you.
3	And then just one more question for Mr. White.
4	How does this space compare to the previous space in
5	terms of is this larger, did they outgrow their space,
6	did the lease end?
7	MR. WHITE: Yes. It's the same amount of
8	strangely enough I think it's the same amount of seats,
9	classroom seats, just a larger space. So essentially
10	they outgrew the space. They will have modernized with a
11	larger space and, you know, better serve the students.
12	MR. PEREIRA: Excellent. Very good.
13	That's all, Mayor.
14	MAYOR STRAUSS: Great. Thank you.
15	Mr. Cusato.
16	MR. CUSATO: Thank you, Mayor.
17	Just one question: As part of your learning
18	and teaching process, are there actual people that come
19	and get work done if that's the proper or is it
20	just strictly classroom?
21	MR. WHITE: Yes. The middle core has about
22	seven or eight clinical rooms where there's practical
23	clinical work done on patients.
24	MR. PEREIRA: Mr. Cusato's volunteering.
25	MR CUSATO You know. I just may do that.

1	All right. Thank you.
2	MR. WHITE: As part of the learning experience.
3	MR. CUSATO: Thank you. That's my only
4	question.
5	MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you, Mr. Cusato.
6	MR. PEREIRA: Put the first-year students on
7	him.
8	MAYOR STRAUSS: I should have mentioned earlier
9	that Trustee Durham is running late. He had a family
10	obligation and he may take care of. Hopefully he will
11	join us this evening at some point.
12	Mr. Walsh.
13	MR. WALSH: Yes. Thank you.
14	Thank you. How are you this evening?
15	Just a few questions. Is there a cafeteria in
16	this new area that you're going to fill?
17	MR. FERRARA: Yes. There is a student lounge
18	and there is a faculty lounge also. So those are on the
19	sixth floor. So there is a student lounge up here and
20	there is a faculty lounge. So it's not really cooking
21	but it would be, you know, some vending machines and
22	coffee and so on.
23	MR. WALSH: So vending machines, refrigerator,
24	coffee, things like that.
25	MR. FERRARA: Right.

1	MR. WALSH: OK. And you're not going to sell
2	food there.
3	MR. FERRARA: No.
4	MR. WALSH: OK.
5	Just to be curious, is the dentist clinic going
6	to remain up there on the same floor?
7	MR. FERRARA: Yes. That's Winthrop's dental
8	clinic. That is an Article 28 facility. It's a teaching
9	facility as well.
10	MR. WALSH: Right. It's a teaching. And
11	that's also going to remain. It's not being replaced.
12	MR. FERRARA: Not at all.
13	MR. WALSH: I just was curious. OK.
14	About the clinic, I wonder if I could talk to
15	Dr. Chen just for a second.
16	How are you? Good evening.
17	DR. CHEN: Good. How are you?
18	MR. WALSH: And you're actually in the Village
19	since 1996; is that right?
20	DR. CHEN: Yes.
21	MR. WALSH: OK. So you're here quite some
22	time.
23	DR. CHEN: Yes.
24	MR. WALSH: You, in the current location, take
25	patients on; is that correct?

1	DR. CHEN: Yes. There's the teaching clinic,
2	most purpose to train the interns and supervised by
3	licensed acupuncturists.
4	MR. WALSH: So the students are supervised by
5	licensed acupuncturists. And just what is the price for
6	that?
7	DR. CHEN: The first visit is \$40 and following
8	visits 30, three-zero.
9	MR. WALSH: And the following is 30 you said,
10	right?
11	DR. CHEN: Following up, 30.
12	MR. WALSH: OK. And how many years does it
13	take, when someone goes to your school, to become a
14	qualified acupuncture person?
15	DR. CHEN: So there's a national standard entry
16	level would be the three-year program for the master of
17	science of acupuncture, and if you want to study some
18	Chinese herbs will be additional one more year. Four
19	years.
20	MR. WALSH: And how many teachers do you have?
21	DR. CHEN: Part-time and full-time people,
22	around 25.
23	MR. WALSH: Five?
24	DR. CHEN: Twenty-five. Part-time
25	MR. WALSH: OK. Thank you very much. I know

1	you run a good location over there. My wife has been one
2	of your patients.
3	DR. CHEN: Oh. Thank you.
4	MR. WALSH: So she was very satisfied with your
5	work.
6	DR. CHEN: Thank you.
7	MR. WALSH: Thank you very much.
8	MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you, Mr. Walsh.
9	Welcome, Mr. Durham. Glad you could make it.
10	Any other comments from the Board, questions?
11	Anything else, Mr. White?
12	MR. WHITE: Nothing, Mr. Mayor.
13	MAYOR STRAUSS: All right. I'll open it up at
14	this point to public comment. I'll ask anybody that
15	needs to make anything known to the public, please
16	approach the podium and speak clearly.
17	Anybody in the third row? Fourth row? Fifth
18	row? Sixth row? Seventh row?
19	Excellent.
20	Mr. Durham, anything?

MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you, Mr. Scalero.

Gentlemen, this proposal came about over the course of a couple of years. We've had some residents that have some issues with invasive species of plants and it's been causing a hardship on many of our residents. It's not a rampant thing throughout the Village, but certainly it needs to be addressed. So we worked with the Village attorney to come up with a law and that's why we're here tonight and we have a law in front of us and if there's any questions from the Board, we'll certainly entertain them and I'll open it up to public comment, or we can open it up to public comment first if you want to hear what any residents might have to say.

MR. GIBBONS: Mr. Mayor?

MAYOR STRAUSS: Yes?

MR. GIBBONS: May I make one point of

clarification?

MAYOR STRAUSS: Sure.

MR. GIBBONS: We have the proposed Local Law that was read into the record by Mr. Scalero. We also have an ancillary Local Law amending Section 1-6 of the Municipal Code of the Incorporated Village of Mineola, entitled "Penalties for Offenses" to make Section 1-6 applicable to violations of Chapter 400 of the Code.

If there is a violation of the Invasive Plant Species Local Law, they would be subject to the penalties in Section 1-6, and therefore I think we should hear the two local laws together.

> MAYOR STRAUSS: OK. Great.

We're not banning the invasive plants, the species of plants that are listed. All we're looking to do is say you have to contain them on your property. They can't infiltrate anybody else's yard and, if you do, then there's an avenue that those neighbors can seek to get relief.

So I'll open it up to public comment at this Anybody needing to speak?

Please.

MS. BLAKE McDONNELL: Good evening.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Good evening.

MS. BLAKE McDONNELL: My name is Diane Blake



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McDonnell and I live at 399 Mineola Boulevard.

Good evening, Mr. Mayor and Members of the Board of Trustees. I'd like to thank you for holding this hearing on invasive plants. It's an issue that I feel strongly about and I appreciate you're responding to my concern and to that of other Mineola residents affected by this problem.

A little history. I've lived in my home on Mineola Boulevard since 1980 and during all these 35 years I've had to deal with bamboo. When first moving in my former husband and I could not even see our back property line, the bamboo was so dense. Naive as we were, we thought we just had to cut it down and it would be problem solved. We learned, however, that the solution was not so simple. It took an entire summer -with my former husband working hours after work and long days on the weekends -- to dig out every trace of the bamboo. That was no easy task. The stalks were up to 20 feet high and so tough that they could only be cut with the sharpest of clippers. The root clumps were two or more feet in diameter and very heavy. Every week we put out as much yard waste at a time as permitted by the Department of Sanitation.

Once cleared, we thought the task was over. We found, however, that the fight against bamboo is an

ongoing one and it required vigilance. Bamboo, like grass, grows and spreads from underground roots and rhizomes. It is, however, much tougher than grass and it will grow right through blacktop and cement driveways, patios, and even through foundations. Since neighboring properties also had bamboo, it continued to reappear in my backyard.

While my sons were growing up and still living at home they would dig out the bamboo, which not only appeared at the property line but also five to ten feet into the yard itself. In recent years I've had to pay landscapers hundreds of dollars at a time to remove the new bamboo.

A few years ago I noticed an article or two in Newsday about communities on Long Island which passed regulations. I started saving these articles and began to feel hopeful that Mineola might one day do the same. As I'm sure you noted in the packet I sent to each of you, many municipalities now have some form of regulation. The towns of Hempstead, Huntington, Brookhaven and Smithtown have passed laws, as have the cities of Long Beach and Glen Cove. In addition, villages including Malverne, Lindenhurst, Babylon, Northport, Amityville, Hempstead, Westbury and East Williston have also enacted regulations.

I've done a lot of research and spoken to a local horticultural specialist and owner of a nearby gardening business and found there's only three ways to deal with it: Ignore it and let it spread, install impenetrable barriers and trenches about three feet deep so that it can be contained, or completely remove every trace, stalk, root, rhizome, and then sift the soil for remaining traces, or replace the soil with new uninfected soil.

My backyard should be my oasis, my escape, my own little slice of heaven, but I've never been able to really landscape as I would like, nor put up attractive fencing to block the view of rusting chain link fences.

As you probably saw in the photos I enclosed with the packet I sent you, in addition to being so invasive, the bamboo looms high over the fence and is ugly. It seems to me that if the height of a backyard fence is capped at six feet, a bamboo fence of 15 to 20 feet is definitely out of place.

I don't know when or how this plant was first introduced into my area. It is found in backyards on Mineola Boulevard, as well as Burkhard Road. I know this also is not the only location in Mineola where bamboo growth is a problem. Having spoken with other homeowners who tried to remove it from their yards, only to see it

reoccur because adjacent properties did little or nothing to clean out their bamboo jungles, I've come to the conclusion that a Village ordinance requiring proper removal or complete containment is the only permanent solution to a problem which affects not only quality of life but also, very possibly, property value.

Thank you very much for your interest in and consideration of this issue.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you. Thank you for your report and your diligence and your patience.

MS. BLAKE McDONNELL: Thank you.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Anybody have questions?

Anybody else in the fifth row? Sixth row? Seventh row?

Anybody else wishing to speak?

All right. Yes.

MS. HARNETT: I'll try to get the mic right.

Hi. I'm Catherine Harnett, 394 Burkhard Avenue, Mineola.

I've been at that residence 23 years and we've always also had bamboo, not in -- you know, we don't have it on our property, but it's on the property behind us and we're constantly dealing with the shoots. And if my husband wasn't there to, you know, eradicate them right away, they would take over the place.

I'm also concerned because I just think that

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they could be dangerous as far as if it gets far enough where there might be electrical lines underneath or gas lines underneath because, you know, we have structures, you know, garage that have those things. So I'm not sure about that, but it's been a concern because the roots just all of a sudden, ten feet into the yard, will start coming up and that type of thing.

I guess I have a question as far as you were saying about a possible law not banning it but restricting it, and I guess I'd like to know more about that.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Yes. We're looking to create a law to contain it, not totally ban it. If somebody wants to have it on their property at this point they can, but as long as it doesn't invade the neighbors' properties around it.

MS. HARNETT: Would there be any restrictions as to how close it can be to the borderline?

MAYOR STRAUSS: I don't think it has -- any of our restrictions -- I don't think there's any restrictions on any plants now in anybody's backyard. So I would say no on that.

MS. HARNETT: So as long as they can make sure it's contained and not --

MAYOR STRAUSS: On their property.

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1	MS. HARNETT: and shoots wouldn't
2	MAYOR STRAUSS: That's what the intent of the
3	law is, yes, to keep you safe, keep bamboo, if you don't
4	want it, out, or any of the other invasive species out,
5	and gives you an avenue to go down should it happen.
6	MS. HARNETT: OK. All right. Thank you very
7	much.
8	MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you for your
9	participation.
10	Anybody else wishing to make a comment this
11	evening?
12	Yes, ma'am.
13	MS. WONG: Hi. Good evening, Mayor and Board
14	of Trustees, and thank you so much for leaving the voice
15	mail on my cell phone.
16	MAYOR STRAUSS: You're very welcome, ma'am.
17	MS. WONG: Actually, I came here Oh. I'm
18	sorry.
19	My name is Jennifer Wong, 400 Burkhard Avenue,
20	and I've been living in Mineola for at least ten years
21	and I love it here. So I really don't want to move, but
22	there is
23	MAYOR STRAUSS: We don't want you to move
24	either.
25	MS. WONG: But there is a problem with bamboo.

And I believe that they are my neighbor, right, our yards are connected, adjacent to each other, and then the other neighbor is right next to me.

And we realized that there was a bamboo problem several years ago when we were mowing the lawn and something was coming out from the soil and I tried to pull it and I couldn't pull it. And we finally did some research and we realized that it was bamboo.

And throughout all these years the bamboo adjacent to my yard -- I think it's your next door neighbor -- it's coming, it's invading my garage. It's coming into the garage. So what we did was I -- naively, we chopped it off, but it grew back even faster and taller. And I tried everything that I could. One of my next door neighbors said maybe you can use hot water, but ultimately it didn't work. So at this point, I mean, I just don't know what to do. And to be honest, I don't want to have to sell the house and move out of Mineola. But it's like -- I think all of us get to the point that we love our neighborhood and we just want to maintain it. And, I mean, unless you guys are willing to let me adopt a panda and live in the backyard, then I don't mind about bamboo issue. But right now --

MAYOR STRAUSS: That might cause a traffic problem. I have enough of those.



1	MS. WONG: I can contain the panda, I think,
2	better than bamboo.
3	So I really, really hope and pray that you guys
4	can come up with a solution that can really help us.
5	MAYOR STRAUSS: Well we think we have, and
6	we'll see what we can do for you.
7	MS. WONG: Thank you.
8	MR. WALSH: Excuse me, Mayor. Can I ask
9	Ms. Wong a question?
10	This bamboo, it seems to be coming from the
11	same area. Is it coming from one house?
12	MS. WONG: No. I think two houses, right, or
13	more than two houses.
14	MR. WALSH: I mean, was it intentionally
15	planted by the one or two homeowners?
16	MS. WONG: When I first moved in, it's already
17	there. So it's in the property for more than ten years.
18	And they have been living here for so long.
19	MAYOR STRAUSS: Yes, please.
20	MS. WONG: Thank you.
21	MR. PEREIRA: Thank you.
22	MS. BLAKE McDONNELL: I've been in my home for
23	35 years, and the bamboo preceded me by many years. It
24	was already 15 or 20 feet tall in my backyard and in the
25	yards on either side of me. I couldn't see the house

1	behind me because it was so thick with bamboo. And
2	although I've cut mine back and tried to maintain my
3	property without bamboo, it still keeps coming from
4	either side and it's infiltrated into the property behind
5	on Burkhard.
6	I don't know where it started. Maybe somebody
7	thought it would be a natural fence at one point and put
8	it in 50 years ago or something, but it precedes me by a
9	long time and, like I said, I've been there 35 years.
10	MR. PEREIRA: So the house is north to the
11	north and south you have it?
12	MS. BLAKE McDONNELL: North and south.
13	MR. PEREIRA: And then behind you.
14	MS. BLAKE McDONNELL: North has it all along
15	its back. That's Jennifer's backyard. The house south
16	of me has it along its back, and adjacent to me.
17	MR. PEREIRA: Right.
18	MS. BLAKE McDONNELL: That's another family's
19	house. And then I don't know if it spread beyond that.
20	MR. PEREIRA: Beyond that. But at least five
21	or six houses that you know of.
22	MS. BLAKE McDONNELL: Yes. Yes. In my area.
23	MR. PEREIRA: In that area.
24	MS. BLAKE McDONNELL: And I know that there's
25	at least another place in Mineola that has a problem too.

MR. WALSH: Just, if you can just stay there for a second.

The point I was trying to get at is: Do one or two residents want this bamboo on their property, or is it just something that's growing wild all over the place? I mean, do the people on each side of you want to have bamboo?

MS. BLAKE McDONNELL: The person to the north of me, when he moved in, did try to remove it, but unfortunately he just tried cutting it down and it grew back. I mean, he's not been a problem when I wanted to go over and dig from his side to remove mine.

The person to the south of me seems to be very happy with bamboo and has watched me try to cut it back and control it and has just watched me and not shown any interest.

MR. WALSH: OK. Thank you.

MAYOR STRAUSS: All right. Thank you.

MR. GIBBONS: Mr. Mayor.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Yes.

MR. GIBBONS: Just one point that's come up. This law not only requires containment by the property owner, but does require the property owner to take all reasonable action necessary to prevent such plant from invading any other property in the Village.

So to the point of: Can we restrict a 1 homeowner from planting on the property line? I believe 2 that could be read by the Building Department as not a 3 reasonable action and an action likely to lead to the 4 plant invading an adjacent property. 5 MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you. 6 Any other comments from the public? 7 Any comments from the Board? 8 MR. DURHAM: Mayor, my question is do we know 9 the other residents, whether the bamboo was there before 10 they took ownership of those homes, whether the bamboo 11 has been there before? 12 MAYOR STRAUSS: We don't know. 13 MR. DURHAM: We don't know. 14 MAYOR STRAUSS: We don't know. 15 MR. DURHAM: So -- because everybody has said 16 that the bamboo was there before they moved in. So I'm 17 just --18 MAYOR STRAUSS: Well if the homeowner at one of 19 these homes removes it and then it comes back from the 20 other property, then that's where we'll have the issue. 21 Did I say that right? 22 MR. GIBBONS: You did. 23 This is one of those issues where you'd say, 24 "It takes a Village." It's going to take a number of the 25

property owners. 1 MAYOR STRAUSS: Yes. 2 MR. GIBBONS: But if you have a property owner 3 who is not doing his or her part for containment, you're 4 not going to be able to accomplish the ultimate goal 5 here. MAYOR STRAUSS: OK. Well we'll certainly do our best. Any other comments from the Board? 9 MR. PEREIRA: The only comment I have, Mayor, I 10 think this is a step in the right direction and this is 11 not to say that we can't revisit this --12 MAYOR STRAUSS: Correct. 13 MR. PEREIRA: -- in the future if this, 14 obviously, doesn't work out. 15 You know, we're trying to respect the rights as 16 property owners on both sides of the fence, if you will. 17 If someone likes bamboo and they want to keep it, 18 certainly it's within their right, we're saying --19 MAYOR STRAUSS: Yes. 20 MR. PEREIRA: -- as long as it's contained to 21 their property. And on the other hand, if somebody 22 doesn't want bamboo they shouldn't have to have their 23 backyard infested with it. 24 So I'm comfortable with starting here, and I

think this is a step in the right direction, and we'll see where this goes and perhaps we'll revisit it.

Hopefully we won't have to. This will be enough.

MAYOR STRAUSS: Great. Any other comments?

MR. DURHAM: Are we going to -- you know, I'm

just saying, would the people that have it on their

property at the border now, are they going to have to -they're going to have to take and find a way to take and
prevent from --

MAYOR STRAUSS: Correct.

MR. DURHAM: So -- and I believe Ms. McDonnell said the only way to take and do that is install, like, a three-foot barrier below ground? So they'd have to take and go through the property line?

MAYOR STRAUSS: Well they'll have to go along the property line down -- on their property line, I would think, on their side of the fence and go down and take whatever preventive measures.

It's incumbent, I think, on the people who have the bamboo, rather than the people who don't want it to spend hundreds of dollars and go through the aggravation that we've heard here tonight to try to keep something out that shouldn't be coming in.

Any other comments?

MR. WALSH: You know, Mayor, I'd just like to

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say that I know somebody who grew bamboo, and the way 1 that they can contain it is to grow it into a cement container. In other words, they dug a three-foot trench 3 by two-foot wide. They poured a cement container. And 4 the bamboo stayed inside that container. Otherwise it 5 spreads widely. 6 And the only other thing I want to say is I'm 7 glad that they also included poison ivy, poison oak in 8 this law because sometimes people don't take care of 9 their poison ivy and it grows over on their neighbor's 10 property, and that's something that needs to be contained 11 12 also. Thank you, Mayor. 13 MAYOR STRAUSS: Thank you, Mr. Walsh. 14 No other comments? 15 I'll entertain a motion to adopt Local Law re 16 the Invasive Plant Species and the corollary law relating 17 to the penalty provision of our laws. 18 MR.
